The semi-annual Parish Leadership Conference will take a new turn this year. The conference will be entirely devoted to planning and will officially "kick-off" the new archdiocesan planning process.

Dear Pastors, Parish Directors, Parish Leaders, Chaplains, and Faithful Parishioners,

As you know, I have appointed a Planning Commission to begin a process of looking at both parish and school planning. Their work will build on the first two cycles of archdiocesan planning that took place back in 1989 and 1996. The Commission will also be examining ministry to other institutions, such as, jails, hospitals, and nursing homes.

I will write a pastoral that will help guide the planning process at all levels. The Commission will provide educational and formational materials and activities to be used at the parish and cluster level and input sessions at the district level. The members of the Commission will base their recommendations on the importance of accessibility to the Sunday Eucharist for all the faithful.

As you plan your calendars for the future, please keep the following time-frame in mind:

August, September, and October 2003

- Planning materials, including the Archbishop's pastoral, will be distributed for parishes or clusters of parishes to use as part of the consultation process in September.
- District input sessions will be held by the Planning Commission for parish councils and staffs in early October.
- Parish Leadership Day will be held September 27. The focus of the day will be planning for the future. (see related article)

October-December 2003

- The Planning Commission will compile the information garnered from the district input sessions, dialogue with the district deans and the parish consultants, archdiocesan pastoral council, and other appropriate groups.
- The Planning Commission will begin development of tentative recommendations to be presented to parish councils in January and February of 2004.

January and Early February 2004

- The Planning Commission will hold district hearings for parish and school leadership to get feedback on the tentative recommendations.
- The Planning Commission will have hearings with the archdiocesan pastoral council and archdiocesan council of priests.

Late February-Early March 2004

- The Planning Commission will revise its tentative recommendations based on what it heard from parish leadership and the pastoral and priest councils.
- The Planning Commission will present its recommendations to me.

March 2004

- I will do a final consultation with archdiocesan council of priests and archdiocesan pastoral council.
- I will promulgate the plan and appoint an Implementation Commission.

I want to thank you in advance for your anticipated participation in the planning process. It is a wonderful opportunity for us, guided by the Holy Spirit, to help form the shape of the Church's mission for the future in southeastern Wisconsin.

Collaborative Bereavement Ministry

An excellent example of collaborative parish ministry was demonstrated recently at a bereavement ministry program hosted at St. Gregory the Great Parish, Milwaukee. Representatives from St. Gregory Parish; St. Rita Parish, West Allis; St. Alphonsus, Greendale; Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, Milwaukee; and Blessed Sacrament Parish, Milwaukee, shared bereavement ministry resources they have found beneficial.

The meeting began with introductions and a reflection, followed by a round table discussion. The discussion focused on what each parish provides for funerals and their follow-up support for the bereaved. The information reported was inspiring! The meeting concluded with preliminary planning for two collaborative events: an evening of reflection for the bereaved and enrichment opportunities for bereavement ministers.

Office For Women

As we look forward to the summer, I invite you to consider various ways to enrich your spirituality. Some possibilities include taking time for a retreat, a day of reflection, reading about women in scripture and our faith tradition, reflecting on the new encyclical entitled "Ecclesia De Eucharistia" (available on the Vatican website http://www.vatican.va) or reading and discussing a topic in Catholic Social Teaching. Or your group may want to evaluate their goals and objectives in the context of prayer.

Another option might be to read a book. Some suggestions include *Nickel and Dimed, On (Not) Getting By in America*, by Barbara Ehrenreich, a Metropolitan/Owl Book, Harry Holt and Company, New York, or *Not Counting Women and Children* by Megan McKenna, published by Orbis Books.

Nickel and Dimed, is a New York Times bestseller and Notable Book of the year. Many Americans work full-time for wages that are below poverty level. Barbara Ehrenreich is an author who felt strongly about welfare reform which promised that work would provide a better life. She wondered how anyone could survive on six or seven dollars per hour, and she decided to try to live on that amount. The author moved across the country from Florida to Minnesota and to Maine, living in very modest places, and worked in a variety of jobs including "waitress, hotel maid, house cleaner, nursing home aide and Wal-Mart salesperson." Ehrenreich discovered that this work was exhausting and that you needed more than one job to provide basic necessities. An easy read that is eye-opening and informative.

Megan McKenna is a storyteller who uses stories from scripture and who is well known for her workshops and retreats. In this book, she shares her insights and poses questions that invite discussion. Some chapter titles include "Not Counting Women and Children," "Women in the Geneology of Jesus," and "Abigail, Teacher of Peace." Sound interesting? Both books are available through the Office for Women.

This half-day conference will focus on education and pastoral outreach regarding end-of-life care and Catholic social teaching. Fr. Andrew Nelson will give a keynote address and break out sessions will be offered on topics such as: palliative care; Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care; practical tools for parish leaders; and other topics based on the 2002 statement "Now and at the Hour of Our Death," from the Wisconsin Catholic Conference.

alleviating suffering and disease. These very same treatments present families with agonizing decisions about end of life care.
