NEW VICE PRESIDENT OF ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Fall, a time that marks new beginnings at colleges across the country, will herald a major change at Southwest College.

Not that the past year was one of complacency—we achieved candidacy with our regional accrediting body, received our first NIH grant, moved the Medical Center to a new environmentally friendly facility, put over seventy courses on-line, grew our student body, added faculty, brought a high-speed network, internet access and LCD projectors into every classroom, and re-financed the campus mortgage.

I'm very proud to announce that we are taking a big step toward becoming the visionary institution that opened nearly ten years ago. After a six month search, the College chose Joel Lanphear, Ph.D. to be our first Vice President of Academic Affairs. Dr. Lanphear will work together with Dr. Thomas Kruzel, our Vice President of Clinical Affairs, and our faculty, students and staff to help bring naturopathic medical education to a new level of quality innovation and integration. Dr. Lanphear has been involved with medical education and administration since the late 1970's. He has depth in curriculum development,

faculty development, program development, accreditation, and outcome assessment.

Dr. Lanphear brings a passion for building programs that train medical professionals. He has worked at existing medical schools, has rehabilitated ailing programs, and helped create new schools. With 25 years of educational leadership, policy development, teaching and personnel administration, Dr. Lanphear will bring us experience. He was director of surgical education and an Associate Professor of Surgery and Medical Education at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston. From 1976 to 1978 he served as Assistant Dean for Management and Planning at University of Wyoming, College of Human Medicine and later became Acting Dean. He also directed curriculum implementation at Michigan State University, College of Medicine and served in the Department of Education for the Guam government.

With Dr. Lanphear's experience and expertise, he is often called upon to give workshops on communication skills and styles, teaching techniques and learning styles,

presentation skills, and organizational management. He has been a consultant to several organizations on electronic curriculums, risk management, establishing organizational goals, working with groups, leadership skills and assessing personal styles.

Dr. Lanphear graduated from Western Washington State University. He then went on to earn his Master of Education degree from the University of Hawaii and a Doctorate in instructional development and technology from Michigan State University. He shares our enthusiasm about the position that Southwest College of Naturopathic Medicine is at in our evolution and feels he can help create, build, and brand the College for the future. In addition, both Dr. Lanphear and his wife Karen, a yoga instructor, are interested in natural medicine, exercise, nutrition, herbs and healthy living.

"I am very excited to be associated with this tremendously talented group of people and am eager to begin this new and exciting challenge," said Dr. Lanphear. ■

- There has been movement towards complete national licensure of the profession. Licensure is an important step in the process of total integration of this medicine and will provide access to all Americans regardless of the price.

HELPING TO MEET THE COSTS OF EDUCATION – SCNM helps students meet the cost of their naturopathic medical education by raising funds and increasing scholarship opportunities for new and continuing students at Southwest College. The committee recently announced the availability of scholarship awards for the Fall 2002 Incoming Class: two Outstanding Underrepresented New Student Awards, two Outstanding New Student Awards and one Books/Supplies award. The scholarship awards range from \$100-\$500. "The SCNM Scholarship Committee has worked very hard to be able to offer these and other scholarships to our students.

We value our students and hope that these monies will go a little way in supporting their educational goals," states Carol Horn, Financial Aid Director and Scholarship Committee chairperson.

The incoming student scholarships awards are academic based with regard to undergraduate grade point average and prerequisite grade point average and are chosen on a competitive basis.

The scholarships for continuing students will be made available in the fall and will be based on a range of criteria including but not limited to: leadership, academic excellence and service to naturopathic medicine. To apply for a scholarship award, applicants must submit an application available in the Enrollment Office. Scholarships will be awarded early in the Fall Quarter 2002.



Cardiovascular Disease in Women

FIRST ANNUAL WOMEN'S INTEGRATIVE MEDICINE CONFERENCE

On Saturday, June 1st, the (WIMD) Women's Integrative Medicine Department at SCNM held its first annual conference. The topic was **Cardiovascular Disease in Women**.

The conference started out with our own alumnus Decker Weiss, N.D., who shared startling statistics regarding morbidity secondary to cardiovascular disease (CVD) and the unreliability of past testing methods for detecting CVD in women.

Myron Licht, D.O. followed by presenting the current laboratory markers that are necessary to both detect and follow CVD in women as well as current medications that are used for women with CVD.

The last speaker before lunch was Robert Herb, PhD, who did a fabulous job of presenting the effects of hormone replacement therapy in women with CVD, based on a thorough literature review.

A delicious lunch was sponsored by the Arizona Naturopathic Medical Association (AzNMA) and provided by Whole Foods.

Randall Robinson, N.D., updated all of the attendee's on the changes in our scope of practice as well as prescribing.

Tori Hudson, N.D. concluded the conference with current research in areas of nutrition, botanicals and exercise for women with CVD and for women who want to prevent CVD. As always Dr. Hudson provided a thorough presentation with clinically applicable data and taught attendee's how to integrate this information with the conventional care our patients may already be receiving.

Training Physicians of the Future

MEDICAL CENTER – STRIVING TO BE THE BEST

The Southwest Naturopathic Medical Center now trains over 100 student clinicians per year and provides medical services to over 1200 patients per month. Staffed by 22 naturopathic physicians and a PhD clinical psychologist, the medical center provides clinical training for naturopathic medical students.

DEVELOPING THE PHYSICIANS OF THE FUTURE

The physicians of the future must possess an understanding of a wide variety of therapeutic modalities while taking into consideration the body, mind and spiritual aspects of the disease process.

Before entering the clinical training program, naturopathic medical students must first complete 2 years of basic medical sciences and pass both a clinic entry examination as well as their national basic science board exams. The last 2 years of their education students begin to treat patients under the supervision of an experienced naturopathic doctor.

We are presently exploring ways to increase the number of residency positions at the medical center. This year, first year residents are: Patricia Gaines from Bastyr University, Sandro D'Amaco, Eric Udell, Sarv Varta Khalsa, and Forrest Beck from Southwest College. Dr. Frank Tamburri, currently completing his first year of residency, has been selected as Chief Resident for 2002-2003.

CLINICAL FACULTY

The Southwest Naturopathic Medical Center's clinical faculty is composed of physicians whose combined practice experience totals over 230 years. The clinical faculty provides a wide variety of medical expertise and experiences. In addition to working with students individually, to provide excellent patient care.

INTEGRATION OF MEDICINE

Recognizing that it is in not only the patient's best interest, but those of society as a whole, naturopathic medicine has strove to integrate itself into the mainstream.

Southwest College's affiliations with local hospitals are increasing at a significant rate. These partnerships are incredible learning opportunities for our students pursuing clinical training and their N.D. degree, for clinical or research fellows conducting research and for house staff facilitating patient care.

FUTURE EXPECTATIONS

Expansion of our training facility and development of additional training sites are eminent as our student and patient populations continue to grow. Future plans also include the development of a Department of Environmental Medicine, a Chinese medicine and acupuncture program, cardiovascular medicine and coronary artery disease prevention program and further development of the mind-body and biofeedback program.

Clinical research, especially out-comes research, continues to be a focus at the medical center. Southwest College recently obtained its first NIH grant in conjunction with Gaia Herbs for the standardization of the herb Echinacea.

SAGE FOUNDATION

The Sage Foundation was launched in April of 2001 to provide medicines, medical equipment and funding for a variety of clinics throughout the greater Phoenix area. These clinics provide medical care for low-income patients who are unable to afford medical insurance but do not qualify for Medicare, welfare or Arizona Access funds. We provide physicians and student clinicians for Las Fuentes Medical Clinic in

Guadalupe, Arizona Pathways, a drug and alcohol rehabilitation center, Being Alive, an HIV support clinic, Springdale Residential Care Center and the Seventh Avenue Clinic.

PHILANTHROPY: FAITH AND VISION FOR THE FUTURE

The new medical center, which opened its doors in December 2001, has benefited from the generosity and foresight of a number of donors. As we are a non-profit institution and do not receive any federal or state funding, donations are an investment in the future of natural medicine while allowing us to serve a wider population who would otherwise not be able to afford medical services.
