


ABOUT YOUTH WERE

If you want to help build a Asian & Pacific Islander Youth voice on a national level, and make resources more available for youth on a local level, join us.



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

WHAT IS THE YOUNG ASIAN MEN'S STUDY?

The Young Asian Men's Study (YAMS) is a federally-funded research project designed to evaluate the effects of a community-level intervention aimed at promoting safer sex behavior among Asian & Pacific Islander (API) young men who have sex with other men (YMSM) aged 15-25. University of California San Francisco's Center for AIDS Prevention Studies (CAPS) helps support many of the program's activities.

WHAT DOES YAMS DO?

Qualitative Research

During the first of two phases of the study, YAMS conducted qualitative research to learn more about young API MSM, their families, peers, and communities in Seattle, Washington and San Diego, California. Seattle was randomly designated the intervention site and San Diego the comparison site.

Intervention Components:

YAMS launched a 5-component intervention in Seattle starting January 2000: Capacity Building, Social Marketing, Community Health Advisors Network, Social Events, and Small Groups Workshops.

Data Collection

YAMS assess individual and community changes made by the intervention by conducting surveys in Seattle and San Diego before, during, and after the intervention.

All together, there were nearly 35 dynamic individuals, each who brought his/ her experiences, insights, and ambitions. By the end of the meeting, we shared our visions, expectations, and goals for the National Asian & Pacific Islander Youth and HIV/AIDS Network and collaborated to determine the mission of the group.

The presence of all API leaders in

one room was definitely in itself uplifting. I met motivated youths that were really passionate and outspoken, along with youth supporters who were determined to work with and encourage the youth leaders. My favorite part of the meeting was on Saturday, after we separated into groups for young women and young men who have sex with men (MSM) issues. I was a part of the women's issues group. All the people in our group opened up and shared their personal experiences of issues that they have encountered either growing up as an API woman or working in this field. It really made me feel like I belonged here, being a young API woman myself, and it made me realize the importance of what we are doing.

Between the sessions. representatives of organizations spoke about their organization and the resources they provide. We browsed around the enormous table covered with brochures, information packets, and toys regarding the programs offered by the organizations. We all exchanged our resources. I had the opportunity to talk to people from different areas about what issues they encounter in their surroundings. Furthermore, the conference room was filled with side conversations of people exchanging information and really learning from one
