### The Word on...



The word confession often means "to admit to or agree with." Romans 10:9 says we "confess . . . [that] 'Jesus is Lord.'" That means we agree that lesus is Lord.

First John 1:9 says God forgives us if we confess (agree with God about) our sins. Do we have to cry or say special words to confess? No—there might be tears, but what God really wants is for us to understand how much He hates sin. Our sin hurts God's heart and separates us from Him.

So if you do something wrong, stop right then and tell God: "I agree with You-that was sin. Please forgive me." He will forgive us if we confess. He promised!

Have you ever wondered why sometimes your prayers aren't answered? Have you told God to forget it—because other kids sometimes get what they ask for, but you don't?

The Bible teaches that how you live will affect whether or not God answers when you ask Him for things. First Peter 3:12 says, "For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and his ears are attentive to their prayer, but the face of the Lord is against those who do evil." In fact, what you do and say

will determine whether or not you will get through to God with your prayer requests. The Bible says, "Who may ascend the hill of the LORD? Who may stand in his holy place? He [or she] who has clean hands and a pure heart" (Psalm 24:3-4).

Hold your hands in front of you. Take a good long look at them. Now answer "yes" or "no" to these questions about the hands you are looking at:

•Did your hands ever hurt somebody when you were angry? •Did your hands ever destroy somebody else's stuff on purpose?

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# JESUS Is the Way

Confessing sins that have broken the communication with God is only for those who already have come to God by accepting Jesus as Savior. Jesus said, "No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). God always hears the prayers of those who are seeking Him, but in order to be able to come straight to God and ask Him for things, we must first accept Jesus as Savior and Lord. First John 3:22-23 says that first comes believing in Jesus. How? Jesus said "repent [turn away from your sins] and believe" (Mark 1:15). If you aren't sure Jesus is your Savior, just ask God to forgive all your sins—and Jesus to come into your heart right now. If you need help or have questions, log

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•Did your hands ever push a smaller kid around?

- Did your hands ever touch another's body where they shouldn't have?
  Did your hands write an answer you
- stole from a student near you?

•Did your hands ever take something, no matter how small, that didn't belong to you?

•Did your hands ever log on to computer sites you know were wrong to look at?

God calls all your "yes" answers *sin* (James 4:17).

Is God always eager to hear your praying and praising when you fold or wave those unclean hands in His face? Actually, He might have been plugging His ears! Why? Because God is holy, and you were trying to enter His heaven—where the angels continuously say, "Holy, Holy, Holy is the Lord God almighty" (Revelation 4:8)—with dirty hands. Your sins have wrecked your getting through to God.

So is it hopeless? No! God loved you so much that He sent His Son Jesus to

pay the price for your sins on the cross. All that is left for you to do is to admit the things in your life that you know from the Bible are sin. Then really be sorry—and tell God so. The Bible calls this **confessing** (1 John 1:8-9).

The cool part of **confessing** is that God then *forgives*. **Confessing** makes your hands clean! And once you have been forgiven and cleansed by **confessing**, you can go right into the presence of the holy God of the universe (Hebrews 10:19), who definitely will listen to—and answer your prayers according to His perfect, all-knowing will. ★

So keep talking to God throughout the day and don't put Him on hold. But if you do put Him on hold, remember to confess your sins and start talking! 🛧


I'm Sorry, GOD

One great way to confess our sins before the Lord and ask for His forgiveness is by praying Scripture. It is important to speak to God straight from your heart-but He also likes to hear His words coming out of our mouths! We can use His very words from the best prayer manual ever written-the Bible! You can use a concordance to look up verses about confession and then pray those verses to God.

Whenever you do something that makes God sad, maybe you can use Bible verses like these to confess (admit) what you did and to say that you are sorry:

Dear Father, I sinned against You by (tell God what you did). I am very sorry for what I did, because "against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight" (Psalm 51:4). Please "wash me, and I will be whiter than snow" (Psalm 51:7). Only You can "create in me a pure heart, O God" (Psalm 51:10). Thank You that "if we confess our sins, [You are] faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9). In Jesus' name I pray. Amen. 🛧

ave you ever felt that when you're trying hardest to follow God, the most terrible things happen? That's how Hezekiah must have felt. He was one of the few Hebrew kings who obeyed God. He smashed Judah's idols, fixed God's temple, and convinced his people to worship Jehovah again. Then he became very sick! An infected sore on his skin left him feverish and in pain.

Turning over in bed, Hezekiah faced the wall. The prophet Isaiah



brought him a scary message from God, and Hezekiah didn't want Isaiah to see him crying.

As Isaiah left the palace bedroom, his words stabbed like a dagger. "Be prepared," he said, "You're going to die soon."

Tears stung Hezekiah's eyes. Maybe the young king thought about everything he still wanted to do. Maybe he thought about his attempts to set things right after his father's (King Ahaz) wicked

> reign. Maybe he worried about his people. Their worst enemy, Assyria, threatened to attack any day.



"Lord," he prayed, "I love You with all my heart. Haven't I always tried to obey You? Why do I have to die?"

Then Isaiah returned. "God sent another message!" he announced.

Startled, the king raised up. "What is it?"

"Jehovah says, 'I have heard your prayer and seen your tears. In three days you will be healed, and I will let you live 15 more years. I will also deliver Jerusalem from Assyria so everyone will know I am the only true God!'"

"How can I be sure this is true?" Hezekiah wondered, getting his hopes up.

Isaiah told the king's servants to prepare medicine that would draw out the infection from the king's sore. Then he gave Hezekiah a choice of miracles to prove that God would keep His promise. Isaiah pointed to a building Hezekiah could see through his window. Its steps were a Babylonian-invented step clock, like a sundial. As the sun moved across the sky, the shadows it made moved one more step every half hour.

"Do you want the Lord to make the shadow jump forward 10 steps or backward 10 steps?" Isaiah asked.

"Backward," Hezekiah said. "That's tougher." Isaiah prayed, and that's just what God did! Step by step, the shadow slid quickly backward: 10...9...8...7...An incredible miracle!

Hezekiah got well in three days but didn't give God the credit. Instead, he became proud of the success God gave him. He showed off his wealth and well-equipped army to ambassadors from Babylon, another enemy of Judah. In that one weak moment, Hezekiah took a giant step backward in his friendship with God.

The Lord became angry, and Hezekiah felt terrible. He truly loved God, so he **confessed** his pride and told God he was sorry. The Lord forgave

him, but years later the nation lost everything and became slaves to Babylon.

Even when we're trying to follow God, pride and other sins can creep in. If we **confess** them and ask Him to forgive, He will. **Confession** isn't a giant eraser, wiping out all the consequences of sins. But it clears up our friendship with God.  $\bigstar$

# Let's Pray for Hurting Children

Listen to Jasmina. She lives in Bosnia where there was a war. "My family will never be the same. We try to forget, but it's so hard. I still have terrible nightmares." Although the war is over, Jasmina says, "The things that happened are always in my mind." Many children were killed in the war. Children who lived through the war have terrible memories of seeing people killed, watching homes and villages be blown up, and burying dead family members.

Now listen to Michael. He lives in the United States. "My mom and dad left me alone and I had nowhere to go. I lived on the streets until the police picked me up and put me in a home." Imagine being all alone. No place to sleep, no TV, no fridge full of food, none of your clothes or things, and no parents or anyone to help and protect you. Life on the

street is cold and dangerous. Just ask a street child in Brazil where the police have tried to get rid of homeless kids by killing them.

# Each week pray for children at risk. Pray for . . .

**MONDAY-** Children who have to find food for themselves in garbage dumps. Ask God to send Christians from the local churches to bring food and God's love to these children. **TUESDAY-** Children who cannot go to school because they have to work. Pray that God will provide a way for their family to have enough money so the child can go to school. WEDNESDAY- Children like Jasmina who live in places where there is or has been a war. Ask God to keep them safe and send peace to the country. **THURSDAY-** Children who are abused. Pray that God will send adults who can help them out of the abuse situations and help the children to learn about God's perfect love, which never ends or fails. FRIDAY- Children like Michael who

live on the streets. Ask God to send His angels to protect them and let them know they are not alone. Ask Him to find people who will start homes for these children, so they can be safe and learn about lesus. **SATURDAY-** Children in shelters, safe houses, group homes, or foster homes. Pray that they would be well cared for and that local church members would help them. Pray that children who need new families would find parents to love them. **SUNDAY-** Children at risk who don't know Jesus as their Savior.

Pray that Christians everywhere will learn more about "children at risk" and want to get to know, help, and pray for the<mark>m.</mark>

# **Making Things Right**

Do you sometimes think you're better than others? Ever let a swear word slip out? Maybe your brothers or sisters bug you and you've wished something bad would happen to them. Sometimes we try to just forget about these "little" sins.

But *every* sin separates us from God. So here's how to make things right:

X As soon as you realize you've sinned, tell God you're sorry and ask Him to forgive you. Ask Him what you can do to make things right with someone you might have hurt (like saying you're sorry, or

being more kind).

X At bedtime, ask the Lord to remind you of your wrongs, and confess them.

**X** If you're **confessing** the same sins over and over, it may be that the enemy has a foothold in your life. Ask a parent or other adult to help you **confess** the sins to God, tell Him you're sorry, then tell the enemy to be gone, in Jesus' name.

X Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit, to help you to do right. The power to obey comes from His Spirit living inside you. God loves you and wants to help you obey Him! 🛧

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

# **Family Confession Activities**

To help your kids experience in a hands-on way how **con-fession** works and benefits them, try these two activities:



## **Clean Heart**

Take a whiteboard and draw a big heart on it with a red dry erase marker. Then ask your children to name some things they might do that would be "sin," or wrongdoing, that displeases God—like being mean to their little sister, lying,

disobeying, etc. Write the sins in black with a water-based or washable marker on the board inside the heart. (Kids are generally a lot more willing to admit these than adults are.)

Then together read aloud 1 John 1:9, which says, "If we **confess** [or admit] our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness [or wrongdoing]." Lead your children into a few moments of silent **confession** by asking them to put their hand over their heart and pick one thing that comes to mind that they could honestly **confess** before God. (You should do this, too. Ask God to show you the sin you need to **confess** according to Psalm 139:23, "Search me, O God" or "shine your searchlight on my heart" and then tell God you're sorry for that.) Demonstrate how God gives us a clean heart by then

spraying the heart with window cleaner. The "sins" in black will be quickly washed away, leaving the heart clean and white again. Then thank God together that you are forgiven!

## **Unclogging the Pipe**

Psalm 66:18 says, "If I had cherished sin in my heart [that means holding on to sin, refusing to repent, and trying to hide it], the Lord would not have listened." God longs to hear from His children, but the lines of communication get clogged up with unconfessed sin—things like resentment, unforgiveness, wrong thoughts and actions. Not only will God not hear us, but **unconfessed** sins block us from hearing Him as well. **Confession** reopens the communication lines so we can hear God as we pray.

To help your kids understand this truth, get a white plastic 4" PVC elbow (or transitional) piece of pipe. You could also use an empty paper towel tube. Put it to your ear to demonstrate that this is like the "hearing" pathway, back and forth, between us and God. Then stuff something dark in the pipe (like brown play dough, dark socks, or even wadded up brown construction paper with "sins" written on it) to plug up the pipe. Try to talk and listen through it. Then remove the dark stuff from the pipe, showing how when the pathway is cleared by **confession**, we can hear God's voice, He will hear our prayers, and we'll enjoy fellowship with Him.

I've found kids really get the concept from this activity and have an increased desire to keep short accounts with God. —Adapted from *When Children Pray*, by Cheri Fuller



# PRAYER FOR YOUR KIDS

You have the wonderful privilege to pray for your child or maybe a group of children. Pick a verse to pray each day for your child. Pray the verse to God using your child's name in place of the underlined words.

### Cleanse a Guilty Conscience

Hebrews 10:22: "Let <u>us</u> draw near to God with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having <u>our</u> hearts sprinkled to cleanse <u>us</u> from a guilty conscience and having <u>our</u> bodies washed with pure water."

### Check for Hidden Sin

Psalm 139:23-24: "Search <u>me</u>, O God, and know <u>my</u> heart; test <u>me</u> and know <u>my</u> anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in <u>me</u>, and lead <u>me</u> in the way everlasting."

### **Repent of Evil**

Job 36:10: "He makes <u>them</u> listen to correction and commands <u>them</u> to repent of <u>their</u> evil."

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
