#### Praying to Know God's Will

God cares about all the details in your life. He cares about where you go, what you do, who your friends are, and much, much more. Because He cares so much, He wants to help you with every decision. That's why He promised, "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you and watch over you" (Psalm 32:8).

But don't forget to ask Him! When you're not sure about something—whether it's a big thing or a small one—ask to know God's will. He knows everything about you and about your past, present, and future. He will put you on the path that leads in the right direction . . . every time!

Thankfully, there is Someone who knows all these things. God not only created you, but He also has a grand plan for you—a map for your life! He knows what lies ahead of you. He already sees the dangers you might fall into if you take a wrong turn. He knows your destination, and He knows the best paths to take you there.

God has told us, "I will lead the blind by ways they have not known, along unfamiliar paths I will guide them; I will turn the darkness into light before them and make the rough places smooth. These are the things I will do" (Isaiah 42:16). What a relief! God doesn't keep the map to Himself. He will share it with you so you can make good decisions, even when you can't see ahead!

The map God has for you is a part of His will. **God's will** includes everything from how the universe works to what happens in your life. The same God who created and named the stars is not too busy to help you in your day-to-day life (Psalm 147:3-4). Isn't that amazing?

But how do you know **God's will** in *your* life? How do you know who your friends should be, what activities you should participate in, or what you should be when you grow up? Here are two of the best ways to find out:

**Read the Bible.** God's Word is filled with His instructions

for us. He has given us these because He cares so deeply about us. He wants us to know how to live for Him, make good decisions, and be protected. So read it every day! Not reading your Bible is like not reading your map for life.

Talk with God. Psalm 25:4-5 says, "Show me your ways, O LORD, teach me your paths; guide me in your truth and teach me, for you are God my Savior, and my hope is in you all day long." When you pray to know God's will, He might speak to you with His still, small voice. He might show you a Bible verse. He might use circumstances in your life, or the guidance of a person such as a parent, teacher, or pastor. When you ask, remember that God's response will never contradict what the Bible says. Then watch carefully for His answer!

But the most important thing to remember is that it's God who holds the map for your life. As long as you stick close to Him, you'll be on the right path! \*

# Prep Work!

Praying to know God's will is easier if you've done some preparation. Praying these Scriptures as "prep work," will get you ready to ask God about His will anytime, anywhere.

New Thinking: Father, please give me a whole new way of thinking so I will be able to know Your good, pleasing, and perfect will. Help me to use Your Word to light up the path You want me to take (Romans 12:2; Psalm 119:105).

Obedience: I want to make You happy, Lord. Help me obey You when You guide me. Show me how to be faithful in the little things of life so You can trust me with bigger and bigger things later on (Matthew 25:21).

Faith: Giver of wisdom, there are so many things I don't know. Remind me to ask You about those things whenever they come up. And whenever I ask, help me to believe that You will guide me. If I don't hear from You right away, give me the patience to wait for You, because I know You will always come through (James I:5-7).

God is so cool. He doesn't do things the same way every time. That's why it's so important that we pray to know God's will about everything. Here's an example from 2 Samuel 5:17-25:


One day Israel's enemy, the Philistines, approached the place where King David and his men were.

# **Let's Pray for Our Enemies**

Is anything harder than praying for someone who is mean to you? Yet that's exactly what Jesus tells us to do. In Matthew 5:44 He says, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

Think of someone who always says mean things to you. What about a family member or friend who has treated you unfairly? It's natural to want to get back at someone who hurts you, isn't it? But the Bible says that if we hold onto anger, we open the door to evil in our lives (Ephesians 4:26-27). If we want to be like Jesus, we have to learn to love and pray for people who are mean.

Jesus did the hardest thing anyone could ever imagine. When He was suffering and dying on the cross, He prayed for the people who crucified Him.

He said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34).

Isn't that amazing? He could have asked God

to punish them.
But instead, He
asked God to
forgive them!
So, the next

So, the next time someone is mean to you, stop and pray a

blessing instead of being mean in return. Why? Because God uses the hard things in life, like being mistreated or being made fun of, to make us more like Jesus. We can respond to unkindness with more unkindness, *or* we can let Jesus use us to pray

for change in the hearts of those who do wrong. (If someone continues to hurt you, however, get help from a trusted Christian adult who can join you in praying and helping you.)

Remember that the most important prayer you can pray for enemies is that they will come to know Jesus Christ personally.

If all enemies prayed for one another, do you think we would have any wars? What would happen if we started to pray for terrorists or for the bullies at school? God loves everybody—even people who do evil things. He wants everyone to be a part of His kingdom. He can use your prayers to make that happen!

### Don't Even Ask!

Did you know that you don't even *need* to ask **God's will** about some choices?

It's kind of like in your home. Do you *need* to ask your mom if you can hit your sister? You already know what she'll say! Is it necessary to ask your dad if you should do your homework? Ridiculous, right?

Just as you know your parents' will about hitting and homework, you can know **God's will** about things that are important to Him. How? By reading the Bible.

Here's one way to do it. Ask the Holy Spirit to show you **God's will** through His Word. Then choose a passage and read it slowly. What is the passage about? Write that down, or think about it for a while. Ask God about any parts that are unclear. Then ask Him to show you how it applies to your life. Whatever He shows you is His will.

Here are some passages to get you started:

Philippians 4:8; Ephesians 6:1-3; Galatians 6:10; 1 Timothy 6:6-10 ★

## **Exploring God's Will Together**

The Thorpes, an Illinois family, desperately needed beds for their three children. Having outgrown the crib and small beds, the kids were sleeping on the floor. The family wanted to follow **God's will** in every area of their lives, so they gathered to pray about this need.

As they prayed, the parents remembered the verse, "Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another" (Romans 13:8). Since they were trying to get out of debt, they sensed God reminding them that charging new beds on a credit card wasn't His best for them. "Then, Lord, show us Your way and please provide beds," one of the kids prayed. "Or open a way for us to find a good deal on used beds at a garage sale," petitioned the oldest.

One night a few weeks later, the parents were out on a date. While the kids were at home, a furniture store delivery truck pulled up and unloaded three brand-new beds.

"Who are these beds from?" the children asked.

"We can't tell you; it's anonymous," the delivery man replied.

When their parents returned, they were just as surprised as the kids. The family dropped to their knees in the living room and thanked God together that He had provided for them according to His will. The beds

lasted many years, and the family never did find out who sent them!

Seeking **God's will** as a family can be an exciting adventure with surprising results. Here are some things to remember as you do:

**Pray God's Word.** On many issues, God doesn't leave us to guess what His will is—He reveals it through the pages of Scripture. Keep the Bible close at hand as you pray about **God's will** as a family. When there are decisions to make, ask God to point you toward relevant Scriptures. Pray with those Scriptures in mind, and you'll be much more likely to pray according to **God's will**.

Commit your plans to the Lord. Proverbs 16:3 tells us, "Roll your works upon the Lord [commit and trust them wholly to Him; He will cause your thoughts to become agreeable to His will] and so shall your plans be established and succeed" (Amplified Bible). What a great promise! He will shape our very thoughts when we ask His will.

Amy Carmichael, a famous English missionary who served in India, often prayed like this: "Holy Spirit, think through me until Your ideas are my ideas." God never failed to guide her as she cared for thousands of orphans and rescued children from temple prostitution.

Don't let your kids think that if

you miss God's will the first time, you miss God. If you are moving toward Christ and endeavoring to pray His will, He will meet you and your kids there. He promises never to leave you or forsake you (Hebrews 13:5). Even if you make a mistake, He allows for and redeems our mistakes. And don't worry if, as your family prays, you have different ideas of how God is leading. Just keep praying, and ask God to bring your hearts and minds into agreement with His will and bring unity.

Remember and encourage your kids that **God's will** isn't a burdensome thing—it's the greatest discovery of freedom in all of life. It's a marvelous adventure to walk with Him and do what He has planned for you.
