
# Intercession

Wouldn't it be fun to act like a lawyer—right now, today?

When you pray for other people, it is called *in-ter-ces-sion*.

That means you come between two sides to help settle differences—just like lawyers do. So when you intercede in prayer for someone, you are coming between that person and God, pleading the person's case with Him.

The Bible tells us that only Jesus can bring God and people together (I Timothy 2:5). But we can stand with Jesus and ask God to be kind and merciful to people who need Him. That's what intercession is all about.



# My Prayers Make a Difference!

### I've been praying

for the world since I was about three. I'm just one kid, but my parents and my pastor say that my prayers make a *big* difference. And I *know* they do!

I pray by myself, with my family, in Sunday school, or in prayer meetings at my church. Sometimes a bunch of us kids will hang out and we get a map and pray for kids all over the world. This helps me to be thankful that I know Jesus and that I live in a Christian home.



When I was eight years old, there was an Ebola virus (a powerful disease) in Zaire, Africa, that was killing thousands of kids. It was spreading fast. So I sat down and prayed a long time and really cried out for those kids.

After a while, I began to be peaceful and happy. I just knew God was hearing and answering my prayers. It was kind of a new thing for me actually to feel like that for other kids because of what was happening to them. My pastor told me that what I did was true "intercession" (praying about situations or people we may not even know, with a really caring heart).

Well, three days later, I saw a newspaper headline in big bold letters saying, "Ebola Virus in Zaire Arrested" (that means it was stopped). It made the news on TV and radio and in newspapers all over the world.

I know that my prayers helped save a lot of kids' lives. Thank You, Jesus! ★

# Just Like JESUS

When we "intercede" for others, we should pray just like Jesus did for us. Jesus did not pray only for needs. He prayed that His friends would love each other and get along. And He prayed that they would be made holy by the Word of God. One way to be sure we're interceding for others the way Jesus did is to pray God's Word.

Here are some Scriptures you can use when you pray for others:

## For someone who needs to know Jesus:

"Heavenly Father, I pray for (friend's name), that he/she will come to know how much You love him/her and that he/she will believe that Jesus died for his/her sins" (Romans 5:8).

# For someone going through a hard time:

"God, You are the Lord of peace. Please give (friend's name) peace in every way. Be with him/her today" (2 Thessalonians 3:16).

Here are some other Scriptures to pray for someone who is in need: Romans 8:28, Philippians 4:8, Ephesians 6:10, Psalm 119:9, and Isaiah 41:10. In a notebook, write any other Scriptures you find that might be good to pray for people in different situations.

# MUSCLE BUILDERS

Here are some ideas to help you build your "faith muscles":

Pray specifically. Don't just say, "Bless all the missionaries everywhere in the world." You won't know how God answers. Instead, find out what one missionary needs. Then pray for that person and see how God answers.

Tell one or two friends that you believe God answers prayer. Then ask how you can pray for them. Check with them often to see how He's answering.

Start a prayer notebook. Write the date and what you asked, then later fill in God's answer. Keeping a record of how He works will strengthen your faith.



## Let's Pray for Kids in the 10/40 Window

Everyone knows what a window is, right? But there's one window that's totally different. It's called the 10/40 Window. This is the name for an area of the world, and it includes many countries (see the map).

The 10/40 Window is the part of the world where people have the least opportunity to hear about Jesus. Many of the people there live their whole lives and never hear the name of Jesus once. Most of the poorest people in the world live in the 10/40 Window. It is also the home of some of the major nonChristian religions such as Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism.

There are millions of children who live in the 10/40 Window and, like their parents, most of them don't know Jesus. Many of these children don't have enough to eat. Some are refugees, which means

that their families have had to leave their homes because of war or other problems. Some children live on the The 10/40

**Target Practice** 

Just like in other things, you can be a more effective **intercessor** when you have a goal and are focused on it and organized about it. Making "prayer targets" can help you do that.

Take several large sheets of paper and cut each into a circle. Draw four circles inside each circle to resemble a target.

Now ask God to show you some areas He wants you to pray for-maybe your school, church, or neighborhood. In the center circle of each target, write one of those areas. Next, in the outer circles, write some other things that are related to each area. For example, on the target with "school" in the center circle, you could write things like: "Teachers would have patience

with kids"; "Kids who don't know Jesus as Savior"; and "Safety and protection for everyone" in the outer circles.


> Put the targets on a wall and pray for the things writ-


your daily prayers. It will look great in your room, and it's easy to make! Gather photos of your family members and friends (you might also want to get pictures of your pastors and Sunday school teacher as well). Then gather pictures of people who might have needs right now such as salvation, healing, or God's help in a specific situation. Also collect pictures of community and world leaders, entertainers, and athletes who need your prayers (magazines

and newspapers are a good place to find these).

Paste the photos on poster board or a large sheet of construction paper, using your own ideas for design or organization. You can change your collage by adding new pictures to the sides or over the top of other photos.

Place the collage where it will remind you to intercede for the people on it. Remember to pray for each person by name and be specific about what you ask. Then wait and see what God does! And be prepared: When people find out about your prayer collage, they may be asking you to include their photo! 🛧

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### Rain or Shine:

### A Family Bible Study on Elijah

Having a family Bible time together is a great way to show your kids how to study God's Word, and studying **intercessors** in the Bible is a great way to reinforce prayer. Pick a time when your family isn't rushed. Choose a comfortable setting. Have each family member bring a Bible (children's picture Bibles are fine for preschoolers). Most of all, be flexible in your approach and have fun.

### Background information (for adults and older children):

"Elijah was a man just like us. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops" (James 5:17-18).

Elijah was a prophet. But he was foremost a man of prayer. **Intercession** was woven into the fabric of his life. Whether it was out of compassion for the pain of another person, zealousness for God's reputation, faith in God's promise, or fear for his own life, Elijah prayed first and asked questions later.

Since Elijah was a man just like us, we can learn something from how he prayed. With your family, read the following passages and use the questions to spark discussion.

### 1 Kings 17:17-24

- How do you think Elijah felt when the widow's son died (vv. 17-18)?
- If you were Elijah, what would you

have done? Why do you think Elijah first asked God a question (v. 20)?

- Why do you think Elijah stretched himself out on the boy while he prayed (v. 21)?
- How many times did Elijah pray the same thing (v. 21)? Why do you think God often wants us to repeat our prayers?

### 1 Kings 18:1-2,41-46

- Why did Elijah pray for rain when God had already told him it would come (vv. 1,42)?
- What do you think Elijah might have been thinking while he sat and prayed with no sign of rain?
- How many times did Elijah send his servant back to look for rain (v. 43)? What does this say about Elijah's faith?
- When the servant reported the tiny cloud that finally gathered, what did Elijah do immediately (v. 44)? Would you have acted so quickly?
- When was a time you prayed and had lots of faith in God? When was a time you only had a little faith? What do you think made the difference between the amount of faith you had each time?

#### 1 Kings 19:1-18

- What was Elijah afraid of (vv. 1-3)? How does Satan sometimes discourage you after God has answered your prayers?
- Why do you think Elijah said to God, "Take my life" (v. 4)?

- What did God do for Elijah when Elijah was weak and scared (vv. 5-8)?
- How do you think Elijah was feeling in verse 10?
- What do you think God was trying to do by asking Elijah twice, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" (vv. 9,13).
- After Elijah experienced the presence of the Lord in the small, whispered conversation, what do you think was different for him?
- When God sent Elijah on to yet another mission, do you think Elijah was ready for it?

You and your family can study other Bible **intercessors**. Paul was a remarkable example of an **intercessor** who was mindful of God's kingdom (Romans 15:5-6,13; Ephesians 1:15-19, 3:16-19; Philippians 1:9-11; Colossians 1:9-13; 1 Thessalonians 3:12-13; Philemon 1:6). Daniel was a strong example of sacrificial **intercession** on behalf of his people (Daniel 9). ★



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
