<b>Immediacy:</b> God, I'm tired of praying for John to become a Christian. I'm ready to wash my hands of the whole thing! <b>Lament:</b> It's terrible that our world turns its back on You. Why won't people listen? And why won't You act in John's life?
Confession: I confess that I'm tired of asking You for this; I've become "weary in doing good."  Recall: God, You care about John more than I ever could. I know You're committed to reconciling the world to Yourself. Not only that, but You've done it and continue to do it. Thank you for Your grace in working on our behalf!
