Have you ever thanked God for His body, the church? It's often the furthest thing from our minds, especially when we're in the midst of the messier aspects of church life. Yet such thanksgiving is biblical—and often healing. List at least five things about your church that you can thank God for.

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11. Life in the body will always be varied: We will sin against each other, and we will demonstrate grace toward each other. The path through our hurts is not to pretend nothing has happened or to give in to cynicism, but to adopt Paul's prayer for the Ephesian church for ourselves and our fellow church members:

For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom his whole family in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.
