

Surrender

surrender means to give up or hand over something. So when you surrender to God, you let go and let God be in charge. Even though everything about you already belongs to God (because He created everything in the first place), surrendering shows Him you really believe that. Surrender is a way to tell God that there's nothing more important than Him.

When you surrender to God, prayer is always the place to begin. That way, you and God can talk through what you need to surrender and how to do it. You may find that you need to surrender things like dreams for the future or expectations about how things will turn out . . . maybe even parts of yourself. Just remember as you pray that God is good and wants only good for you. If He asks you to give up or hand over anything, He's got something much better in mind for you! *

Jesus said: "If people want to follow me, they must give up the things they want. They must be willing even to give up their lives to follow me. Those who want to save their lives will give up true life, and those who give up their lives for me will have true life" (Matthew 16:24-25, New Century Version). When we give ourselves up to Him, God is so pleased that He "trades us up" to something bettersomething that we can't even imagine.

When I was a teenager, I learned about surrender in prayer. I began playing the trumpet when I was 13. I became the best trumpet player in the school band. I thought playing the trumpet would be my career.

I was tempted. I could make a lot more money! Maybe I would even become famous and travel all over the world! So I prayed about it. Even

though I really wanted to be in the rock band, I surrendered it to Jesus. I didn't want to join the band if Jesus had a different plan. I prayed, "Lord, I want only Your will for my life." Guess what? He showed me that the band was not His will for me!

Later, I found out why. God wanted me to go to Bible college. I received a scholarship to lead a trumpet trio that traveled across America! Not only did I play the trumpet, but Jesus trained me to be a leader. Today I lead a ministry that tells people about Jesus in more than 100 countries. My wife and I have traveled more than 40 times around the world! Playing in a rock band would be nothing compared to the joy I have today serving God like this! I'm so glad I surrendered myself to God in prayer so many years ago.

What about you? Are there things you need to surrender to God in prayer? Remember, saying "uncle" to God is never a loss. It's always a win! *

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
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Mission Statement

Signs and Wonders

ne day, as my family and I were on the familiar trip to school, I saw a billboard with Joe the Camel advertising a new kind of cigarette. I said to my mom, "Mom, if smoking is wrong and bad for your body, then why would people try to get you to buy cigarettes?" My mom told me how some people are more interested in money than in a person's health. I thought for a

minute and asked if we could pray that the sign would fall over.

My mom gave me a look that said Yeah, right, but she agreed to pray with me about it. So each morning as we passed the billboard, we prayed. The prayer was simple. We just said, "Lord, we know that this sign advertises something that isn't

good for our bodies, so could you just take it down or make it fall over?"

My sisters and my mom and I all took turns praying. After about a week of this, we saw that a small corner of the billboard was beginning to tear. A few days later we looked and I said, "Mom, that tear is getting bigger!"

She looked up. I was right—the tear was bigger, a lot bigger. Each day, more and more of the billboard ripped off. After about two weeks of asking for the Lord's help, the rip got so big that you couldn't even read the sign anymore.

The next time we drove by the billboard, it was totally blank. Someone had pulled the rest of it down and there was a number at the bottom of the sign to call if you wanted to put your advertisement there.

My mom was totally amazed, but I thought, "Yeah, God!" I asked for help and the Lord did just what I asked Him to do.

This happened when I was six, and I'm 12 now. As I think about it, I probably had more faith when I was little, I think so many times we hear the Lord telling us to do something, but we say no because we aren't quite sure if it will work. When God says something, you have to say, "I'll do whatever you want me to" and then do it, even if it seems impossible. Because nothing is impossible with God. *

Getting My His Way

Surrender is easier if you know that God is the Good Guy—and His way is the best way—all the time!


Make a list of God's characteristics (qualities or traits that make Him special). Ask God for help, and look up these Scriptures to get you started: I John 4:16; Lamentations 3:22-23; Romans 2:4.

List ways God has proved He is good (in the Bible and in your family). Examples: told Noah to build an ark; came to die for our sins; provides you with a home, clothes, food. But don't stop there—think of more!

Are you asking God for something and finding it hard to surrender your will to His? Ask Him to help you imagine what might happen if you get your way instead of His.

Here's a sample of a surrender prayer:

Lord, I know that Your ways are not my ways. You have a wonderful plan for me. You are working through things that happen in my life for the end result of good. Help me know You better so that I want to surrender my will to Yours (Isaiah 55:8; Jeremiah 29:11; Romans 8:28; I John 4:7-8)!



I love the way my father totally trusted God. He told me he'd made enough mistakes in his life. "I must obey God no matter how difficult His instructions may sound," Father always said. He said it again on the day we took the hike to Mount Moriah.

That morning he hugged me awake. "I've saddled the donkey," he said. "The servants are waiting. Let's go." His words sounded cheerful, but his eyes looked strangely sad.

I jumped out of bed, threw some water on my face, and scrambled to catch up. As we hiked up the mountain, we talked about

friends, dreams, and things Jehovah had taught my father as he prayed. We slept under the stars two nights. On the third day, our steps slowed.

"Where are we going?" I asked for the umpteenth time. "And why?"

"To sacrifice to God," Father said. He pointed forward with his walking stick. "There's the place ahead."

"Sacrifice?" I frowned. We had no animals with us.

"I know this doesn't make sense to you, Son."

Father turned to the servants. "Stay here. Isaac and I are going over there to worship. Then we'll come back."

Lifting a bundle from the donkey, Father strapped the wood on my shoulders. Then he stuck his knife in his sash and grabbed the fire-starting flint.

I looked around. "We have flint and wood, but where's the lamb for the offering?"

"God will provide," Father murmured as we plodded on.

When we reached the place, Father said, "Isaac, sometimes God asks us to do things we don't understand. He has asked me to surrender what I love more than my own life. I must sacrifice you, Isaac, the son I awaited for so long." He lowered his head and tears splattered into the dirt.

My heart beat faster. Other religions required child sacrifices, but not Jehovah!

God has given a new idea to people who pray for the world. The idea is for everyone to focus on praying for people in the 40/70 Window. Look at the map to find the 40/70 Window. It covers 62 nations!

Centuries ago, much of this region was Christian. But communism and other human belief systems took over. These belief systems taught that God is not real (or that people cannot know for sure if God is real). The good news about Jesus dying on the cross got choked out.

Then in 1989, communism fell apart. Now people in that part of the world are free to believe whatever they want to about God. A lot of them still call themselves Christians because of old traditions. But they have never asked Jesus into their hearts. Most have never even heard the gospel. Many of the religious traditions they follow include idol worship. The Muslim religion is also very common in these countries.


Since 1989, millions of Christians all over the world have been praying for the 10/40 Window.

Put a Lid on It!

A situation that requires surrender isn't usually something you know about ahead of time. It may come up suddenly, out of nowhere. You find out that your family needs to move, for instance. Or a friend starts acting like an enemy. Or the dentist says you need braces.

You can get ready for those unexpected times by making a "surrender box." Find a box you really like. It could be a cookie tin, a heart-shaped candy box, a cylinder-shaped oatmeal box, or a shoebox. Make sure it has a lid. Paint designs on the box, or glue on beads, seashells, or other favorite things. Make it special. Put

it someplace where you'll see it all the time.

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When God asks you to surrender something to Him, write it on a piece of paper. Now put the paper in the box, closing the lid. Lift it high and tell God, "Take this! It's Yours! You're good, I trust You, so I

surrender!"

If staying surrendered is hard—often it is— hold your box up to God again and ask for help. Keep the lid


on the box so you can't take back what you've surrendered. And thank Him that He's still in control!

More Than Meets the Eye

The Bible says that God's ways are not our ways and His thoughts are not our thoughts. We don't see things the way He does. For instance, to us it might look like we have to give up a lot when we surrender ourselves to God. But God will only ask us to surrender something when He wants to give us something far more valuable in its place.

Here's a fun way to see how there's more than one way to look at things. With a black crayon, pencil, or marker, color all of the boxes below. If you look at it one way, you will only see blackened-in boxes. If you look at it another way, you will see someone's name—someone who really knew how to surrender.

Fill'er Up

hen God calls us to surrender, it often comes as a surprise—just like Abraham was surprised when God asked him to surrender Isaac. Often, like Abraham was, we're asked to surrender something that's not bad. It may even be something very good. Surrender requires us to give up what God asks us to, when He asks us to. Here is an activity you can do to help children better understand what surrender is like and why it's important.

Next time your children tell you they are thirsty, give them a full glass of water (or whatever beverage you usually offer them). But before they have a chance to sip it, stop them. Ask them if they trust you. They may act surprised or confused. That's okay. Ask them again if they trust you. If they say they do, then ask them to go to the sink and pour out the drink. They may or may not be willing to do this. If they are hesitant or upset about your request, remind them that you love them, want what's best for them, and always will provide for their needs. Reassure them that

you would never intentionally trick them or hurt them. Then ask them again if they trust you and if they will pour out the drink. If they pour out the drink, great. If they are not willing, don't force them.

Go to the refrigerator and bring out a beverage that is a special treat—maybe a soft drink, chocolate milk, or a fruit smoothie. Explain that right from the start you wanted to give them this special drink. If they dumped

the water, fill their glass with the special beverage. If they didn't, explain to them that you are sorry that there's not room in their cup for the special beverage this time, but you'll give them another opportunity soon (then repeat the object lesson the next time they ask for a drink).

Discuss how pouring out the cup is like surrendering to God.

But we cannot hold onto what we want—even if it's good—and receive what God wants at the same time. It's one or the other. It's always worth it to "pour out" our will in order to allow God to pour His good, pleasing, and perfect will into us.
