Authority/ **Submission**

Most kids understand that obeying God is a good thing. He's the highest authority, isn't He? It makes sense to have thoughts and actions that match what He wants. That's called submitting to God's authority.

But did you know God wants us to submit to all authorities? Even ones we think are not very good? Romans 13:1-2 says that if anyone is in authority, then God put that person there. That's hard to understand sometimes. But God can use good and bad rulers to carry out His purposes. God has a plan. Everything He asks you to do will work out for your best when you obey and submit to what He says! 🛧

My grandson has a bright-yellow, Sponge-Bob SquarePants umbrella. He wants to take it with him everywhere he goes-just in case! The minute the first drop of rain falls, he whips out his umbrella and stands under it. The raindrops hit the umbrella instead of him! He is protected from every last drop.

God has made an "umbrella" for our lives, too. He puts special people (like Mom and Dad) in a place of authority over us. That means they are in charge. They make decisions about our lives. We stand under their authority just like we would stand under an umbrella. God wants us to **submit** (that means follow and obey) to them.

Nho's the Boss? Who are the people God has put in charge over us? The Bible talks about four groups of people we should follow and obey: Government leaders: such as the president, • judges, or police officers (Romans 13:1,2). Church leaders: your pastor, Sunday school • teacher, church elders (Hebrews 13:17). Family leaders: Your dad, mom, grandparents, • and others (Ephesians 6:2). Job/school leaders: Your principal, teachers, and coaches. When you get older and have a job, this may be your manager, supervisor, or company president (1 Peter ower and authority 2:13,14,18).

There are some very special reasons for this! God has made a promise: If you honor your father and mother, you will live a long life and things will go well for you (Ephesians 6:2-3). I want a long, good life, don't you?

But there are some even better reasons to **submit** to people who are in **authority**. You can't be powerful in prayer unless you follow Jesus' example, which is this: Even though He was God, He stepped down from His throne in heaven, and came to earth to die. When He **submitted** Himself like that, He was lifted up and given **authority** over everything (Philippians 2:5-11). He told us we would do even greater things in prayer than He did (John 14:12-15)! Can you imagine? But being **submissive** is the first step.

Satan did the opposite. Remember Satan's first sin? He started out as an angel, but he was proud in his heart. He didn't want God to have **authority** over him. So he rebelled against God. Because of that, God threw him out of heaven (Revelation 12:7-9)! God hates rebellion. He says it is just like sorcery or witchcraft (1 Samuel 15:23). When we rebel against people God has put over us, we rebel against God.

When we rebel, we step out from under the umbrella of **authority** God has put over us. Then we are on our own. God no longer defends us. Instead, He opposes us (James 4:6). He stops fighting our battles for us and lets us fight on our own.

It's not a good thing to be on your own! When you pray, you fight Satan himself. You *need* God on your side! You need to have power and **authority** over Satan. But power and **authority** in prayer only come when you follow and obey the people who are in **authority** over you.

God has made an umbrella just for you. Stay under it! You'll be able to pray with **authority** like Jesus. And in the same way an umbrella protects you from the rain, you'll be protected as you pray!


Praying God's Words

My father asked if I wanted to do this my way or God's way. Well, my way wasn't working, so the decision wasn't hard! My family prayed together. We decided I should apologize to my gym teacher.

The next day, I apologized and told my teacher that I knew I shouldn't question his authority or try to justify myself. He was amazed. Then things began to change. I went from being the student who was always blamed to the one who received the Student of the Week award! At the end of the year, I was awarded Student of the Year! My gym teacher and I even became friends.

If your way is not working, try it God's way. It really works! 🖈

Speak No Evil

The Bible has a lot to say about how we treat the people God has placed in **authority**. God wants us to pray for them. But did you know He also wants us to give thanks for them, respect them, and **submit** to and obey them? There's even something we're *not* supposed to do: We're not to speak evil about them.

Sometimes it's hard to do all these things, especially when we disagree with the decisions our leaders

make. But praying Scripture really helps. For example, from Proverbs 21:1



you could pray something like, "God, You are King of kings! Please direct my teacher to do what is right for our class."

From I Timothy 2:1-2, you could pray, "Lord, thank You for my mom and dad. Thanks for my teachers (name them), my pastor, and our president (and other leaders you think of). Help them make wise decisions today that bring good to our family, school, church, country, and world."

Why don't you try? Turn these Scriptures into prayers: Exodus 22:28; Proverbs 24:21; Ecclesiastes 10:20; Titus 3:1. ★

A HOT DECISION

Long ago, a king ordered his people to worship a golden statue. Three young men—Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego—wondered what to do. They knew God wanted them to obey their ruler. They also knew God never allowed idol worship.


First, here's what they *didn't* do. They didn't yell, run away, complain, or argue. They didn't show disrespect.

What they did do was tell the king politely that they

couldn't worship any god besides the true God. They told him they would rather die than disobey God.

Guess what happened? The king threw them into a blazing furnace, but God saved them! They didn't even smell like smoke (Daniel 3)!

Usually, we don't have to make choices like this. But remember: if someone in charge asks you to disobey God's Word, don't be disrespectful. Pray. Obey God. Then trust Him with what happens.

Let's Pray for Unreligious People

Most people believe in God. Even if they aren't Christians, almost 85 percent of the world believes in some kind of god. Many people see the stars and oceans, plants and animals, and think "Someone made this! Someone big, wise, and powerful! God must have made all this!"

But 938 million people in the world do not believe in any god at all. These people are called *unreligious*. Some unreligious people are called *atheists*. An atheist is a person who doesn't believe God is real. Other unreligious people are called *agnostics*. An agnostic thinks you cannot know for sure if God is real. A third type of unreligious person doesn't really care if God is real or not.

Many unreligious people live in countries in Asia such as China, North Korea, Japan, and Vietnam. Others live in Europe in countries such as France, Italy, Russia, and Great Britain. Cuba also has many unreligious people. Unreligious people live all over

How to Pray for Unreligious People:

Creator God, show Yourself to unreligious people through what You have made. Help them see that the world did not happen by chance (Romans 1:20).

King of kings, move the hearts of leaders in unreligious nations to let people preach Your truth and give out Bibles. Help all the people to hear about You and believe (Proverbs 21:1; Romans 10:17).

3 Eternal God, help unreligious people feel how empty their hearts are because they do not know You. Make them hungry for You, so they will seek You, reach out for You, and find You (Psalm 63:1; Acts 17:26-28).

Precious Savior, help unreligious people not to be fooled by wealth. Help them see that true riches are found only in You (Matthew 13:22; Revelation 3:17-18).

5 Lord, help young people everywhere to love the truth so they can be saved. Help them to see Your eternal power and all the things that make You God so they can know You (2 Thessalonians 2:10; Romans 1:20).

Walk the Talk

Inside Out

Did you know that it's possible to obey with your actions on the outside, but not **submit** your heart on the inside?

Let's say your mom asks you to take out the trash during your favorite TV show. You do what she asks right away, but in your head you're thinking: "This is so stupid. Why can't I take the trash out *after* my program?" Did you obey on the outside *and* inside? Disrespectful thoughts are the sign of a rebellious heart.

Here's what you can do. Find time to get alone with Jesus to sort it out. He will forgive you and help you be more respectful next time. Make a list. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you think of anyone in **authority** you have not been **submitted** to, both inside and out. Pray

> about each one He brings to mind. Here's a sample prayer to help: Father, forgive me for my sin of rebellion toward ______. I pray for (him/her), and thank You for (him/her) because this pleases You (1 Timothy 2:1-4). Help me submit to this person just like it says in Your Word. In Jesus' name. Amen.

The next step: If possible, go to the people on your list. Ask them to forgive you. Tell them that you have asked God to help you **submit** to their **authority** inside and out.

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

card disrespect that comes into your home through other ways—TV, books, newspapers, radio, CDs, videos, etc.

Provide a box to collect the cards for one week. At the end of the week, get together to read the cards and discuss what you learned. Were you surprised by what you saw in your culture? In yourselves? Did disrespect from family members decrease as the week went on? Why or why not?

Spend time in confession and prayer as a family. As the Holy Spirit leads, let family members confess disrespect they spied in themselves. Pray blessings on anyone who was the object of disrespect during the week. Finally, pray for each other and for society. Ask the Holy Spirit to bring you into **submission** to the **authorities** He has placed over you. ★
