A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION directing the Senate County and Municipal Government Committee, the General Assembly County Government Committee and the General Assembly Municipal Government Committee to study the effects of the 1980 Federal decennial census on the counties and municipalities.

1 WHEREAS, The Federal census to be taken on April 1, 1980, will,
2 pursuant to R. S. 52:4-1, become effective in New Jersey upon
3 the Governor filing with the Secretary of State the bulletin issued
4 by the Director of the Bureau of the Census; and,

5 WHEREAS, The issuance of said bulletin is expected in late 1980 or
6 early 1981; and,

7 WHEREAS, The classification of the counties and cities of this State
8 and the applicability of various laws to the counties and municipa-
9 lities of this State are dependent upon their population as
10 enumerated in the latest Federal decennial census; and,

11 WHEREAS, It is essential that the Legislature be informed of the
12 effects of the 1980 Federal census as soon as practicable so that
13 it may propose such changes, if any, in the laws of this State as
14 it deems necessary or desirable; now, therefore,

1 BE IT RESOLVED *by the General Assembly of the State of New*
2 *Jersey (the Senate concurring):*

1 1. That the members of the Senate County and Municipal Govern-
2 ment Committee, the General Assembly County Government Com-
3 mittee and the General Assembly Municipal Government Committee
4 are constituted a joint legislative committee to study the effects
5 of the 1980 Federal decennial census on the counties and municipi-
6 palities of this State and to report its findings, conclusions and
7 recommendations to the Legislature as soon as practicable after

8 the taking of said census, including in its report any legislative
9 bills which it may desire to recommend for adoption by the Legis-
10 lature.

1 2. That the committee shall be entitled to call to its assistance
2 and avail itself of the services and assistance of such officials and
3 employees of the State and its political subdivisions and their
4 departments, boards, bureaus, commissions and agencies as it may
5 require and as may be available to it for said purpose and may
6 expend such funds as may be appropriated or otherwise made
7 available to it for the purposes of its study. The Office of Legis-
8 lative Services shall provide such staff assistance as the joint
9 committee may request.

1 3. That the committee may meet and hold hearings at such places
2 as it shall designate during the recesses of the Legislature.

STATEMENT

This resolution would constitute the Senate County and Municipal Government Committee, the Assembly County Government Committee and the Assembly Municipal Government Committee as a joint committee to study the effects of the 1980 census on the counties and municipalities of the State and to advise the Legislature what changes in the law are indicated.

Similar studies were conducted following the 1960 and 1970 censuses, and those studies, prepared by the staff of the Office of Legislative Services, provided the information necessary for appropriate legislative action.

INTRODUCTION

The 1980 census has a substantial impact on New Jersey's counties and municipalities. Many of the statutes which govern these local units directly or indirectly apply to a county or municipality on the basis of its population. Unless specified in a statute, the population of a county or a municipality is the population as determined by the most recent Federal census. As such, each census has a significant impact on this State's counties and municipalities and the 1980 census is no exception.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution 98 of 1980 established a joint legislative committee composed of the members of the Senate County and Municipal Government Committee and the Assembly Municipal and County Government Committees to study the statutory effect of the 1980 census and to report its findings, conclusions and recommendations to the Legislature. In order to effectuate its purposes, the committee requested the Division of Legislative Information and Research to prepare a research memorandum to identify those statutes which affected counties and municipalities on the basis of population and to enumerate the statutory changes which may be required to ameliorate the effects of the census where necessary.

On the basis of the memorandum the committee requested that legislation be drafted which would prevent changes from occurring when it believed them to be unwarranted. In addition, the legislation amends laws to grant counties and municipalities greater autonomy in taking actions which are currently required on the basis of popula-

tion and repeals statutes which are archaic or applicable to no local unit. The committee also determined that certain areas of the law which contain numerous population specific statutes needed extensive revision and made recommendation to that effect.

This report is a combination of the research memorandum and the committee's recommendations. It is accompanied by the legislation proposed by the committee on the basis of the memorandum. It provides a complete analysis of all the changes that will occur on the effective date of the 1980 census if no action is taken. The committee wishes to emphasize that the changes discussed in the report are not required by Federal law; they all result from the requirements of State statutes.

The report is divided into two sections. The first discusses the implications of the census for counties and the second does the same for municipalities. Each section is prefaced by a discussion of how statutes are treated in the report, an explanation of the kinds of statutes included and a review of those counties and municipalities which are most affected by the census.

The report, while lengthy and complex, represents only the first step in the committee's work. Its recommendations and proposed legislation will significantly alter the impact of the census on counties and municipalities if accepted. The actual effect of the census will be known only after the Legislature has acted. At that time, the committee will issue a final report, detailing all of the actions that counties and municipalities are required or permitted to take on the basis of the census.

COUNTIES

New Jersey's counties are classified by population and whether or not they border on the Atlantic Ocean. As established in C.40A: 6-1 the six classes are:

- a. Counties of the first class which have populations of more than 600,000;
- b. Counties of the second class which have populations between 200,000 and 600,000;
- c. Counties of the third class which have populations between 50,000 and 200,000;
- d. Counties of the fourth class which have populations below 50,000;
- e. Counties of the fifth class which border on the Atlantic Ocean and which have populations of more than 100,000; and,
- f. Counties of the sixth class which border on the Atlantic Ocean and which have populations of less than 100,000.

Statutes are often enacted to apply to all counties within a class. Many statutes, however, apply to only certain counties within a class or even to a single county. Statutes of this kind are specific to the class and population of a county or in certain instances to the population of a county.

The committee has examined all statutes which make reference to the population or class of counties. The statutes discussed in this report are limited to those laws which are affected by the 1980 census. Because certain statutes are specific to population as well as to the class of a county, it is likely that counties which have experienced significant population change since 1970, but remain in the same class, will find that statutes which formerly affected them are no longer relevant and that other statutes are now applicable.

The committee strongly urges county officials to review the statutes described herein to determine their relevance to a particular local unit.

The report discusses both permissive and mandatory statutes and indicates when a county is required to act and when a county may act if it elects to. In certain cases, permissive statutes which provided authorization for counties to act on the basis of earlier censuses no longer apply on the basis of the 1980 census and the report notes these. The report uses the language of the statutes and in certain instances word usage will not conform to the governmental structures of certain counties. This is especially relevant to counties which have adopted one of the governmental forms authorized by the "Optional County Charter Law" (C.40:41A-1 et seq.). In such instances, county officials are requested to refer to the statute to determine the law's applicability to their jurisdiction.

The committee wishes to express its concern about the classification scheme imposed by C.40A:6-1. While the concept of classification is valid, the existing scheme may limit legislative flexibility in responding to the needs of counties. It may prove worthwhile to initiate a study as to whether or not it is in the best interest of the State to maintain a classification scheme based solely on the population of a county and its proximity to the Atlantic Ocean. The applicability of the classification scheme has become more problematic since the last census because of the enactment of the "Optional County Charter Law" which grants a great deal more autonomy to counties which adopt the various forms of government authorized there. As a result, statutes pertaining to counties which were intended to have universal

applicability can no longer be expected to apply either automatically or literally to the five counties which have optional charters. The committee urges the Legislature to initiate a study of the existing classification scheme for the purpose of providing an approach more suitable to the contemporary needs of the Legislature and the counties of the State.

In preparing this report, the committee was confronted with the problem of discussing statutes which are specific to the population of a county as determined by a census other than the 1980 census. Statutes discussed in this report are premised on the 1930-70 censuses and technically continue to govern counties which, on the basis of the 1980 census, have different populations or are in a different class. Alternatively, counties which on the basis of their 1980 population would come under the provisions of a statute do not because another census is specified in the law. The committee generally observes that statutes specifying a particular census have increased significantly during the last decade. It wishes to express its concern that the continued proliferation of laws of this type may undermine the rational basis for classifying counties. Furthermore, census specific statutes may prohibit certain counties from adopting the provisions of a desired statute, while saddling other counties with statutory mandates detrimental to their needs. For the purpose of this report, the committee has noted those laws which specify a census and indicated those counties which would be affected if references to a particular census were eliminated.

Finally, the committee believes that it is imperative to mention that the changes set forth in this report are mandated by State law

and are not required by the Federal Government. It is quite possible that none of the actions discussed herein need take place, if the Legislature acts to amend statutes or alter the classification scheme. Absent any action, however, the statutory requirements set forth in the report do take effect. In those instances when the committee determined that amending the law would be preferable to requiring a county to comply with the statutory changes required pursuant to the effective date of the census, the report so indicates.

C.52:4-1 provides that a census shall become effective on the date on which the Governor files the census bulletin with the Secretary of State. C.40A:6-2 requires that changes in the classification of a county shall become effective on July 1 following the effective date of the census.

Counties changing classification or experiencing statutorily significant population changes on the basis of the 1980 census.

Upon the effective date of the 1980 census, Hudson County, which has been a county of the first class, will become a county of the second class because its population will fall below 600,000. Somerset County, which has been a county of the third class, will become a county of the second class because its population exceeds 200,000. Because many statutes which apply to counties are specific to the class of a county, much of the information contained in this report pertains directly to Hudson and Somerset Counties.

Ocean County, because its population will increase from 208,470 to 346,038, will find that numerous statutes which presently apply to the county will no longer do so after the effective date of the census and that numerous other statutes are now applicable. This results from the fact that several statutes are specific to counties which

have a population in excess of 300,000 or to heavily populated fifth class counties. Statutes which formerly applied only to Monmouth County, will affect Ocean County as well.

Essex County will also be affected by the adoption of the 1980 census. Because its population will be below 900,000, all statutes which apply only to counties with a population of 900,000 or more will no longer affect Essex County. All statutes which apply to a county with a population of more than 800,000 and less than 900,000 which formerly applied only to Bergen County will, after the effective date of the 1980 census, apply to Essex County as well.

Upon the effective date of the 1980 census, the population of Morris County will exceed 400,000 and, as such, all statutes which affect counties with a population of 400,000 or more will apply to Morris County.

1. County Court System

In 1978 the voters adopted Article VI, section III, paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of the New Jersey Constitution which abolished county courts and merged their functions with those of the superior court. As such, the numerous statutes concerning county courts which are specific to the class and population of a county are no longer applicable and have been omitted from the report.

a. County District Courts

There are several sections of Chapter 6 of Title 2A which govern the number of judges who shall serve on county district courts. All are specific to the class or population of a county except C.2A:6-3 which provides for a specified number of judges to serve on the county

district courts of certain counties named in the statute. It is extremely difficult to discern precisely how many judges shall be assigned to the county district courts of each county. The committee recommends that Chapter 6 of Title 2A be revised to provide greater clarity in determining how many judges may be appointed.

The following statutes provide for the appointment of judges to county district courts, are specific to the population or class, or both, of a county and appear to be operative:

- a. C.2A:6-3 provides that certain counties shall have a specified number of district court judges;
- b. C.2A:6-2.1 requires that a county with a population of not less than 400,000 and not more than 600,000 shall have 4 county district court judges;
- c. C.2A:6-3.8 and C.2A:6-3.9 require that a county of the fifth class with a population exceeding 220,000 shall have 2 county district court judges who shall serve on a full time basis;
- d. C.2A:6-3.11 requires that a county having a population in excess of 700,000 shall have six judges; and,
- e. C.2A:6-3.12 requires that a county of the second class having a population of not less than 400,000 and not more than 460,000 shall have 2 county district court judges and a county of the second class with a population of more than 460,000 and less than 500,000 shall have 4 judges.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

- a. Ocean County, because it is a county of the fifth class with a population in excess of 220,000, shall have 2 judges who shall serve on a full time basis;

b. Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000 shall have 2 judges (it appears that the provisions of C.2A:6-3.12 supercede those of C.2A:6-2.1 which would require Morris County to have 3 judges);

c. Camden County, because its population exceeds 460,000, shall have 4 judges; and,

d. Passaic County, because its population is below 460,000, shall have 2 judges (it appears that the provisions of C.2A:6-3.12 supercede those of C.2A:6-2.1 which would require Passaic to have 4 judges).

b. Juvenile and Domestic Relations Courts

There are several sections of chapter 4 of Title 2A which govern the number of judges assigned to serve on the juvenile and domestic relations court of each county. The following sections appear to be operative and are specific to the class or population, or both, of a county:

a. C.2A:4-4 requires that a county of the first class with a population in excess of 900,000 shall have 6 judges; a first class county with fewer than 900,000 inhabitants shall have 4 judges; a county with a population of more than 430,000 and less than 600,000 shall have 2 judges; that the Governor may appoint 1 additional judge in a county having a population of not less than 305,000 and not more than 410,000 in addition to those authorized by law; and, that in a county with a population of more than 390,000, judges shall serve on a full time basis;

b. C.2A:4-4.3 and C.2A:4-4.3a allow the Governor to appoint 1 full time judge in a county of the second class with a population of less than 265,000;

c. C.2A:4-4.4 requires the appointment of 4 judges in a county of the fifth class with a population in excess of 300,000 as determined by the 1970 census;

d. C.2A:4-4.9 requires the appointment of 2 additional judges in a county having a population of more than 500,000 and less than 575,000;

e. C.2A:4-4.10 requires the appointment of 2 additional judges in a county having a population between 580,000 and 600,000 as determined by the 1970 census; and,

f. C.2A:4-4.11 requires the appointment of 1 additional judge in a county of the fifth class with a population of less than 200,000 as determined by the 1970 census.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Essex County, because its population is below 900,000, shall have 4 judges;

b. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class with a population between 430,000 and 600,000, shall have 2 judges and the Governor shall appoint 2 additional judges pursuant to C.2A:4-4.9;

c. Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class with a population below 265,000, shall have 1 judge;

d. Ocean County, because its population exceeds 300,000, shall have 4 judges if the 1970 census figure is no longer valid for C.2A:4-4.4; and,

e. Morris County, because its population exceeds 390,000, shall have judges who serve on a full time basis.

The committee recommends that the sections authorizing the appointment of judges to juvenile and domestic relations courts

be revised. Several of these sections are permissive, while others require the appointment of judges. Those sections which specify that appointments of judges be made on the basis of the 1970 census may preclude reducing or increasing the number of judges serving in a county, if the local unit has experienced a significant population change in the last decade. The different standards which are applied in these sections tend to reduce the correlation between the population of a county and the number of judges assigned to a county without establishing another discernable criterion for the appointment of judges.

2. County Surrogates

The minimum salaries of surrogates are established by C.2A:5-3.9 and are based on the population of a county as follows:

On the basis of the 1980 census, Hudson and Morris counties shall be subject to the \$21,000.00 minimum, and Gloucester County to the \$18,000.00 minimum.

C.2A:5-9 provides tenure to certain deputy surrogates in a county of the first class. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Hudson County.

C.2A:5-16 provides that special deputy surrogates in counties of the first class may receive a maximum salary of 3/4ths of the surrogates salary plus \$2,000.00. All other counties may pay their

special deputy surrogates a maximum salary of 3/4ths of the surrogate's salary plus \$1,000.00. Hudson County is subject to the second, rather than the first, requirement of that section.

3. Sergeants at Arms and Court Criers

The following statutes concerning sergeants at arms and court criers are specific to the population or class, or both, of a county:

a. C.2A:11-20 permits the superior court judge in a county of the first class to appoint a sergeant at arms upon the approval of the sheriff;

b. C.2A:11-21 authorizes the assignment judge in a county of the first class with a population of less than 800,000 to appoint a sergeant at arms and a court crier, and each superior court judge to appoint a sergeant at arms;

c. C.2A:11-22 requires the county clerk, in a county having a population of more than 400,000 and less than 600,000 as established by the 1940 census, to appoint a court crier for the superior court and establishes a minimum and maximum salary for that appointee;

d. C.2A:11-25 permits judges of the superior court in counties of the first class with a population of less than 800,000 as determined by the 1940 census, and in counties having a population of more than 250,000 and less than 300,000 as determined by that census to fix the salaries of sergeants at arms and court criers upon the approval of the board of chosen freeholders; and,

e. C.2A:11-26 permits the assignment judge in all counties, except those of the first class, to appoint a sergeant at arms and a court crier and to fix their salaries.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Hudson County is no longer subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-20, C.2A:11-21 and C.2A:11-25 and is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-26 because it is a county of the second class; and,

b. Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-22, if the 1940 census figure is no longer valid for that statute.

The committee wishes to note that the sections governing the appointment of sergeants at arms and court criers were adopted many years ago and have not been thoroughly revised. Some sections are based on the class of a county, others on the population of a county, and several on the population of a county as determined by the 1940 census. In certain cases, sections fix salaries for court criers and sergeants at arms at levels which have not been changed since the law's enactment. The chapter is also replete with references to the appointment of court criers and sergeants at arms to county courts. Such employees have presumably been transferred to the superior court. The committee recommends that the chapter be revised.

4. Court Attendants and Constables

The following sections regarding court attendants and constables are specific to the class or population, or both, of a county:

a. C.2A:11-33 provides that the salaries of court attendants assigned to certain courts, to grand juries, and to the sheriff in a county of the first class with a population of more than 800,000 shall be fixed by the board of freeholders;

b. C.2A:11-34 provides that the salaries of court attendants in a county of the first class with a population between 700,000 and

800,000 shall be a minimum of \$4,500.00 and a maximum of \$6,000.00, as fixed by the board of freeholders; and that the salaries of court attendants in a county of the first class with fewer than 700,000 inhabitants shall be fixed by the board of freeholders;

c. C.2A:11-35 provides the sheriff in a county of the first class with authorization to appoint not more than 4 persons as officers in charge of court attendants upon approval of the board of freeholders;

d. C.2A:11-36 establishes a minimum and a maximum salary for court attendants in a county with a population between 175,000 and 300,000, and in a county with a population between 300,000 and 600,000, as determined by the 1940 census;

e. C.2A:11-36.1 and C.2A:11-36.2 authorize the sheriff of a county having a population of not less than 300,000 and not more than 600,000 to appoint 2 court attendants as supervisors, and authorizes the board of freeholders to fix their salaries;

f. C.2A:11-37 allows the assignment judge in a county of the first class to appoint a court officer to attend the county law library if no librarian has been appointed;

g. C.2A:11-38 allows the sheriff in a county of the first class to appoint a court attendant as an elevator operator for elevators used to move prisoners;

h. C.2A:11-40 establishes a minimum salary for constables and other superior court attendants in a county with a population of not less than 200,000 and not more than 300,000 which has adopted Civil Service;

i. C.2A:11-41 establishes a minimum and a maximum salary for constables and other superior court attendants in a county having a population of not less than 200,000 and not more than 300,000 which has not adopted Civil Service;

j. C.2A:11-42 establishes salaries for constables in a county having a population of more than 150,000 and less than 200,000, which has adopted the provisions of this section;

k. C.2A:11-43 requires that constables in a county with a population of more than 150,000 and not more than 300,000 shall assist the sheriff in certain duties and shall receive a certain salary for services to the sheriff; and,

l. C.2A:11-44 establishes a minimum salary for constables and court attendants in a county having a population of not less than 100,000 and not more than 140,000.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class with a population of more than 300,000 and less than 600,000, is governed by the provisions of C.2A:11-36.1, and C.2A:11-36.2 and the provisions of C.2A:11-36 if the 1940 census is no longer valid and it is no longer subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-35, C.2A:11-37 or C.2A:11-38;

b. Somerset County, because its population exceeds 200,000, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-40;

c. Gloucester County, because its population exceeds 175,000, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-36, if the 1940 census is no longer valid;

d. Ocean County, because its population exceeds 300,000, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-36.1 and C.2A:11-36.2 and to the

provisions of C.2A:11-36 if the 1940 census is no longer valid; and,

e. Sussex County, because its population exceeds 100,000, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:11-44.

The committee wishes to note that the statutes governing court attendants and constables need to be revised to correspond with the duties which such officers presently fulfill. The salary requirements set forth in the section also appear to be outdated and in need of revision.

5. Grand Juries

C.2A:71-6 provides that in a county with a population in excess of 250,000, the jury commissioners may select a second grand jury. Ocean County, because its population exceeds 250,000, is subject to the provisions of the section.

6. County Detectives and Investigators

a. Detectives

The following statutes concern county detectives and are specific to the class or population, or both, of a county:

a. C.2A:157-3 permits the appointment of up to 50 county detectives in a county of the first class and fixes their minimum salaries;

b. C.2A:157-4 fixes the minimum salaries of detectives in a county of the second class and establishes the maximum number of detectives who may be appointed in these counties as follows:

c. C.2A:157-5 provides for the appointment of up to 9 county detectives in a county of the third class with a population in excess of 75,000 and fixes their minimum salaries;

d. C.2A:157-6 provides for the appointment of up to 5 county detectives in counties of the third class with a population of less than 75,000 and fixes their minimum salaries; and,

e. C.2A:157-8 provides for the appointment of up to 12 county detectives in a county of the fifth class with a population of 300,000 or less, up to 15 county detectives in a county of the fifth class with a population of more than 300,000 and fixes their minimum salaries.

Each of the above sections permits the appointment of not more than a specified number of detectives, deputy chiefs, captains and lieutenants from among the detectives appointed in each county.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class with a population of more than 500,000, is authorized to appoint a maximum of 28 detectives and is no longer subject to the provisions of C.2A:157-3;

b. Passaic County, because its population is between 400,000 and 460,000 is authorized to appoint up to 24 detectives;

c. Camden County, because its population is between 460,000 and 500,000, is authorized to appoint up to 28 detectives;

d. Morris County, because its population is between 400,000 and 460,000 is authorized to appoint up to 24 detectives;

e. Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class with a population of less than 400,000, is authorized to appoint up to 12 detectives;

f. Sussex, Warren and Hunterdon Counties, because their respec-

tive populations exceed 75,000, are authorized to appoint up to 9 detectives and are no longer subject to the provisions of C.2A:157-6; and,

g. Ocean County, because its population exceeds 300,000, is authorized to appoint up to 15 county detectives.

b. Investigators

The following statutes are concerned with investigators and are specific to the population or class, or both, of a county:

a. C.2A:157-11 provides for the appointment of up to 30 investigators in a county of the first class and fixes their minimum salaries;

b. C.2A:157-12 provides for the appointment of up to 30 investigators in a county of the second class with a population of more than 400,000, and up to 15 investigators in all other counties of the second class, and fixes their minimum salary;

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class with a population of more than 400,000 may appoint up to 30 investigators in the manner provided in C.2A:156-12;

b. Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, may appoint up to 30 investigators in the manner provided in C.2A:157-12; and,

c. Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class, may appoint up to 15 investigators in the manner provided in C.2A:157-12.

7. County Prosecutors

a. C.2A:158-1.1 provides that in all first, second, fifth and

sixth class counties, and in a third class county with a population between 60,000 and 72,000, or in excess of 120,000, both of the latter as determined by the 1970 census, the prosecutor shall be a full time officer;

b. C.2A:158-10 establishes a minimum and a maximum salary for county prosecutors which is determined by the population and location of a county as follows:

Between 100,000 and 265,000 (on Atlantic Ocean)	\$10,000.00	\$17,000.00
Less than 100,000 (on Atlantic Ocean)	\$ 8,500.00	\$15,500.00

c. C.2A:158-15 permits the appointment of a maximum number of assistant prosecutors which is determined by the population and location of a county as follows:

Between 265,000 and 600,000 (not on Atlantic Ocean)	6
Between 100,000 and 265,000 (not on Atlantic Ocean)	3

d. C.2A:158-15.1a provides exemptions to C.2A:158-15.1 which stipulates that assistant prosecutors shall be full time officers when a prosecutor is required to be a full time officer. The exemptions are:

1. a county of the fifth class with a population of less than 150,000 as determined by the 1960 census;
2. a county of the sixth class;
3. a county of the third class with a population of less than 61,000 as determined by the 1970 census; and,
4. a county of the third class with a population between 120,000 and 175,000 as determined by the 1970 census.

e. C.2A:158-16.1 fixes a minimum and a maximum salary for assistant prosecutors in a county of the third class, as an exception to C.2A:158-15.2 and C.2A:158-16 which establish the salaries of assistant prosecutors as a percentage of the prosecutor's salary; and,

f. C.2A:158-18.1 permits the appointment of up to 12 legal assistants in a county of the first class with a population of 800,000 or less and fixes a minimum and maximum salary for these employees.

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Hunterdon County, because its population exceeds 72,000, would not be required to have a full time prosecutor, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for C.2A:158-1.1 and because its population exceeds 75,000 is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$8,500.00 and \$24,000.00.

b. Hudson County, because its population is below 600,000, is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$15,000.00 and \$22,000.00, is permitted to appoint up to 6 assistant prosecutors and, because it is a county of the second class, is not subject to the provisions of C.2A:158-18.1;

c. Ocean County, because its population exceeds 265,000, is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$12,000.00 and \$19,000.00;

d. Cumberland County, because its population exceeds 130,000, is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$11,000.00 and \$18,000.00;

e. Sussex County, because its population exceeds 100,000, is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$10,000.00 and \$17,000.00, and may appoint up to 3 assistant prosecutors;

f. Salem County, because its population exceeds 61,000, would not be subject to the exemption provided in C.2A:158-15.1a, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for that section;

g. Gloucester County, because its population exceeds 175,000 would not be subject to the exemption provided in C.2A:158-15.1a if the 1970 census is no longer valid for that section;

h. Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class, is subject to the provisions of C.2A:158-15.2, and C.2A:158-16 and is no longer subject to the provisions of C.2A:158-16.1; and,

i. Warren County, because its population exceeds 75,000, is required to pay its prosecutor a salary between \$8,500.00 and \$24,000.00.

In addition to the statutes discussed above, C.11:22-2 allows the prosecutor in a county with a population which exceeds 300,000 to appoint up to 12 agents, investigators or special officers who shall serve in the unclassified service. On the basis of the 1980 census, the provisions of this section apply to Ocean County.

The Committee strongly recommends that the statutes governing the appointment and salaries of county prosecutors and their staffs

be revised. C.2A:158-7 requires that any expenses necessary for the operation of a prosecutor's office shall be paid by a county upon order of an assignment judge and it is under this section that both the number of employees in the prosecutor's office and their salaries are, in fact, determined. As such, the sections which authorize the appointment of assistant prosecutors and legal assistants and those which provide for their compensation are irrelevant in most counties. In addition, C.2A:158-1.2 requires that the salaries of full time prosecutors be the equivalent of the salary of a county court judge. Consequently the vast majority of salary ranges established pursuant to C.2A:158-10 are meaningless.

8. Education

The following sections are concerned with county vocational schools and are specific to the population or class, or both, of a county.

a. C.18A:54-11.4 provides that in a county of the second class with a population of not less than 460,000 and not more than 500,000 as determined by the 1970 census, the board of education of a school or regional school district shall pay the tuition of any district resident attending a county vocational school organized pursuant to C.18A:54-11.1;

b. C.18A:54-16 provides that county vocational school boards shall be composed of the county superintendent of education and 4 appointed persons. The appointed members of the board in a county of the first and second class, or in a county of the third or fifth class with a population in excess of 120,000, shall be named by the director of the board of freeholders (the section provides that in certain counties of the first class the county supervisor shall make these appointments but that position no longer exists). The section further

provides that in any county of the first class which has adopted the county executive form of government authorized pursuant to the "Optional County Charter Law", the board shall be comprised of 7 members who shall be appointed by the county executive.

C.18A:54-16.1 requires that in a county of the third class with a population greater than 70,000 but not less than 120,000, the board of education of a county vocational school shall be composed of 9 members who shall be elected by the voters;

d. C.18:54-23 requires a third class county with a population of not less than 60,000 nor more than 100,000 as determined by the 1960 census, and a county which has established a county vocational school system pursuant to C.18A:54-13 to accept pupils from without the county only if room is available and provides for the payment of tuition by the sending district for these pupils; and,

On the basis of the 1980 census:

a. Passaic County, because its population is below 460,000, would not be governed by the provisions of C.18A:54-11.4, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for that section;

b. Camden County, because its population is between 460,000 and 500,000 would be subject to the provisions of C.18A:54-11.4, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for that section;

c. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class, is required pursuant to C.18A:54-16 to have a board of education composed of 4 members to be appointed by the director of the board of freeholders;

d. Sussex County, because its population exceeds 100,000, would not be subject to the provisions of C.18A:54-23, if the 1960 census is no longer valid for that section, and may not establish a vocational

school pursuant to C.18A:54-13; and,

e. Hunterdon County, because its population is between 70,000 and 120,000, is required pursuant to C.18A:54-16.1 to have a 9 member board to be elected by the voters.

In addition to the statutes discussed above, the State, pursuant to C.18A:38-34 may appoint county attendance officers in Hudson County because it is a county of the second class, and the employees of boards of education within Hudson County are not authorized to establish a pension fund as provided in C.18A:66-95 et seq. for the same reason.

9. Elections

a. Superintendent of Elections

The following statutes are concerned with county superintendents of elections and are specific to the class or population, or both, of a county:

a. C.19:32-1 creates the office of superintendent of elections in counties of the first class and establishes a minimum and a maximum salary for superintendents;

b. C.19:32-26 permits any county of the second class, except those with a population between 275,000 and 325,000 or a population between 350,000 and 400,000, as established by the 1950 census, and a county of the fifth class with either a population in excess of 200,000 as determined by the 1950 census or with a population below 200,000 as determined by the 1970 census to establish the position of superintendent of election. The section fixes the salary of a superintendent of elections in a county of the fifth class at \$4,000.00 and establishes a minimum salary of \$4,000.00 for a superintendent of elections in a county of the second class;

On the basis of the 1980 census, Somerset County, because it is

a county of the second class, may establish the position of superintendent of elections. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class, is not required to have a superintendent of elections. However, the county may continue the position pursuant to C.19:32-26.

C.19:32-26 was declared unconstitutional as special legislation in Mooney vs. Atlantic County (122 N.J. Super. 151) (1973). The statute had, through numerous amendments, lost whatever consistency it once had and had become increasingly arbitrary. The committee recommends that C.19:32-26 be amended to permit any county to establish the position of superintendent of elections.

b. Commissioner of Registration

C.19:31-2 provides that in a county of the first class with a population of more than 900,000 as determined by the 1970 census all employees of the commissioner of registration appointed for terms of more than 6 months in any year shall be in the classified service, and that employees appointed on the same basis, except for the chief deputy, chief clerk, confidential secretary and chief custodian, in a county of the first class with a population of more than 800,000 but less than 900,000 shall also be in the classified service. If the 1970 census is no longer valid for C.19:31-2, the provisions of the section which apply to a county of the first class with a population of more than 900,000 will no longer apply in Essex County because its population is below that number. Essex County would then be required to comply with the provisions of the section which affect counties of the first class with a population of more than 800,000 but less than 900,000. C.19:32-2, which provides for the appointment of employees of the superintendent of elections, contains the same provisions as C.19:31-2

regarding employees of the commissioner of registration in Bergen and Essex Counties.

In addition, C.19:32-2 requires that the total annual expenses of the commissioner of registration, the superintendent of elections and the custodian of voting machines in a county of the first class shall not exceed \$1,050,000.00. This limitation does not apply in Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class. As such, the county, if it elects to continue the office of superintendent of elections, would be subject to the provisions of C.19:32-27 which has no spending limitation.

C. Salaries of election officials

C.19:45-7 fixes minimum and maximum salaries for members of county boards of election which are specific to the population of a county as follows:

55,000 to 115,000	\$3,200.00	\$4,500.00
Less than 55,000	\$2,800.00	\$3,800.00

Hudson and Somerset counties shall be subject to the second category, and Sussex County to the third.

C.19:6-17 authorizes the county board of election in a county of the first class to appoint a clerk to the board and for the board in a county of the first class with a population of less than 800,000 to appoint 4 additional office employees. These provisions of this section no longer apply to Hudson County because it is a county of the second class.

d. Election Prodedures

There are many sections of Title 19 which provide special procedures for elections in a county of the first class. Because Hudson County is a county of the second class, it will be required to follow the procedures established for counties of all other classes. Because the sections which make special provisions for counties of the first class are so numerous and because, in many instances they are primarily technical, the committee determined that it would be inadvisable to provide a description of these sections in the report. It has, on file, a list of the relevant sections which is available to interested parties.

In addition to those sections which apply only to counties of the first class, C.19:23-22.1 and C.19:23-22.5 apply to: a. counties with a population of 700,000 or more; b. to counties with a population of not less than 300,000 and not more than 450,000; and, c. to counties with a population of not less than 150,000 or more than 200,000. The sections require municipal clerks to file with the county clerk the names and addresses of candidates for office and for the county to assume the expense of printing ballots but to be reimbursed by municipalities within the counties. The provisions of these sections apply in Ocean County, because its population exceeds 300,000, and no longer apply in Somerset County, because its population exceeds 200,000 or in Morris County because its population exceeds 400.000.

10. Institutions and Agencies

a. County Penal Facilities

C.30:8-12 and C.30:8-13 require that in a county of the first class male and female prisoners shall be kept in separate quarters

when possible and that female prisoners shall be attended by female guards who shall earn the same salaries as male guards. C.30:8-13.4 requires that salaries of certain employees of county penal facilities in a county of the first class with a population of less than 700,000 not be decreased. C.30:8-13.5 allows a county of the first class with a population of less than 700,000 to grant tenure to corrections officers. C.30:8-15 allows the board of freeholders in a county of the first class to appoint a warden and a physician for the county jail or penitentiary. Because Hudson County is a county of the second class, all of the sections cited above no longer apply.

C.30:8-18 grants control of the county jail to the sheriff in a county of the second class and in a county of the fifth class with a population of 200,000 or more. The provisions of the section apply to Somerset County which is a county of the second class.

b. County Hospitals

Article 1A of Chapter 9 of Title 30 authorizes a county of the first class to establish various kinds of hospitals. Because Hudson County is a county of the second class, it is no longer authorized to establish erect or maintain hospitals pursuant to these sections. In addition, C.30:9-1 allows the board of freeholders in a county of the first class to appoint superintendents and physicians for county hospitals and C.30:9-12 allows the board to provide for a term of 5 years for superintendents of county hospitals for the insane. These sections no longer apply in Hudson County.

Article 1A of Chapter 9 of Title (C.30:9-12.1 et seq.) authorizes counties with a population of over 400,000 to establish, erect and maintain various kinds of hospitals. Morris County, because its

population exceeds 400,000, is authorized to establish hospitals pursuant to that article.

C.30:9-61 allows all counties, other than those of the first class, to establish hospitals for persons suffering from communicable diseases. That section applies to Hudson County. C.30:9-44.1, which allows a county of the first class to use its hospital for communicable diseases as an almhouse, no longer applies to Hudson County.

C.30:9-12.22 permits a county with a population between 265,000 and 330,000 to establish institutions for the disabled or aged. The provisions of the section no longer apply to Burlington County, because its population exceeds 330,000.

11. Boards of Chosen Freeholders

There are 3 sections of Title 40 which determine the number of members to serve on the board of freeholders of a county. C.40:20-20 requires that the number of freeholders shall be determined on the basis of the population and class of a county as follows:

Between 265,000 and 500,000 and not a county of the 5th class	7
Between 125,000 and 265,000	5
Less than 125,000 and not a county of the 6th class	3
County of the 5th class with a population of more than 200,000	5
Counties of the 6th class	5

The provisions of C.40:20-20 do not apply to any county which has adopted the "Optional Charter County Law". Under that law the county charter determines the number of freeholders to serve on the

board. C.40:20-20 also does not apply to any county which is governed by Article 2A of chapter 20 of Title 40, which fixes the number of freeholders in these counties at 7.

On the basis of the 1980 census, Middlesex County is required to increase the number of its freeholders to 9, and Burlington County is required to increase the number of its freeholders to 7. Both counties were required to increase the number of freeholders upon the effective date of the 1970 census but the Legislature enacted C.40:20-20.3 which allowed each of these local units to retain their freeholders at the number required pursuant to the 1960 census. C.40:20-20.3 is not applicable to the 1980 census, and Burlington and Middlesex are required to increase the number of freeholders.

The committee recommends that the sections which determine the number of freeholders that a county shall have be amended to allow the voters of each county to determine, by referendum, the number of board members.

The salaries of freeholders are determined by C.40:20-72 which establishes a maximum salary for these officers on the basis of the population of a county as follows:

Over 200,000 and not more than 400,000	\$15,000.00
More than 400,000	\$18,000.00

The salary maximums established pursuant to this section do not apply to counties which have adopted the "Optional Charter County Law".

On the basis of the 1980 census, Somerset County, because its population exceeds 200,000, is authorized to pay a maximum salary of

\$15,000 to its freeholders, and Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, is authorized to pay its freeholders a maximum salary of \$18,000.

12. County Officers and Employees

a. Clerks

C.40A:9-76 fixes minimum salaries for county clerks which are based on the population of a county as follows:

Over 400,000 but not more than 600,000	\$21,000.00
Over 190,000 but not more than 400,000	\$18,000.00
Less than 190,000	\$15,000.00

On the basis of the 1980 census, Hudson County, because its population is less than 600,000, shall pay its clerk a minimum salary of \$21,000.00; Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, shall pay its clerk a minimum of \$21,000.00; and, Gloucester County, because its population exceeds 190,000, shall pay its clerk a minimum salary of \$18,000.00.

C.40A:9-75 permits the county clerk of a county with a population in excess of 400,000, which does not have a registrar of deeds and mortgages, to establish in the clerk's office a court division and a registry division. The provisions of this statute apply to Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, if it does not have a registrar of deeds and mortgages.

b. Registrars of Deeds and Mortgages

C.40A:9-81 requires a county with a population of more than 250,000 which does not have an office of register of deeds and

mortgages to hold a binding referendum to determine whether or not to establish the office. The provisions of the section shall apply to Ocean County because its population exceeds 250,000, if it has not already established that office.

C.40A:9-92 establishes minimum salaries for registrars of deeds and mortgages which are based on the population of a county as follow:

Over 600,000	\$24,000.00
Over 400,000 but not more than 600,000	\$21,000.00
Over 190,000 but not more than 400,000	\$18,000.00
Less than 190,000	\$15,000.00

On the basis of the 1980 census, Hudson County, because its population is below 600,000, shall pay its registrar a minimum salary of \$21,000.00; Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, shall pay its registrar a minimum salary of \$21,000.00; and, Gloucester County, because its population exceeds 190,000, shall pay its registrar a minimum salary of \$18,000.00.

c. Sheriffs

C.40A:9-104 fixes minimum salaries for sheriffs which are based on the population of a county as follow:

Over 600,000	\$24,000.00
Over 400,000 but not more than 600,000	\$21,000.00
Over 190,000 but not more than 400,000	\$18,000.00
Less than 190,000	\$15,000.00

On the basis of the 1980 census, Hudson County, because its population is below 600,000, shall pay its sheriff a minimum salary of \$21,000.00; Morris County, because its population exceeds 400,000, shall pay its sheriff a minimum salary of \$21,000.00; and, Gloucester County, because its population exceeds 190,000, shall pay its sheriff a minimum salary of \$18,000.00.

C.40A:9-117.2 authorizes the sheriff of any county with a population of more than 900,000, as determined by the 1970 census, to appoint up to 85 sheriffs. Its provisions would no longer apply to Essex County, because its population is below 900,000, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the section.

C.40A:9-117.5 authorizes the sheriff of a county of the first class with a population of more than 600,000 and less than 700,000 as determined by the 1970 census to appoint a chief warrant officer. Its provisions would no longer apply to Hudson County, because its population is below 600,000 and it is a county of the second class, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the section.

d. Police and Firemen

C.40A:14-18, C.40A:14-110 and C.40A:14-131 apply to all counties, except those of the first and second class, and fix minimum salaries for municipal policemen and firemen, and county or county park police officers. Because Somerset County is a county of the second class, the provisions of the sections do not apply to that county or to any municipality therein.

C.40:14-106.1 permits a county of the first class, as determined by the 1970 census, to allow members of a county police force, except county park police, to exercise police powers as generally provided

for police officers. Its provisions would not apply to Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the section.

Chapters 9 and 14 of Title 40A contain several additional sections which are applicable to certain county officers, employees, firemen and police officers and are specific to the class or population, or both, of a county. While such laws have general applicability, the number of individuals affected by them is limited and the committee determined that discussing them here would not be germane to the report's intent. The committee believes that it may be necessary, in those instances when the population of a county or its class at the time of the enactment of these sections differs from its population or class as determined by the 1980 census, to adopt legislation validating and continuing the sections.

13. Pensions

Certain chapters of Title 43 provide authorization for certain counties and municipalities, on the basis of their population, class or title, to establish pension plans. Most existing county and municipal pension plans were adopted years ago and several are closed to new members. Few, if any, localities within recent years have acted to establish pension plans pursuant to Title 43. For this reason, the committee determined not to include a description of these statutes in the report.

The committee is, however, concerned about counties and municipalities which have adopted certain of these pensions plans, because in several instances the local unit is no longer of the class,

population or title specified in the authorizing sections. The committee also wishes to note that those chapters of Title 43 which provide for county and municipal pension plans contain numerous sections which provide benefits to certain persons under particular circumstances. In both instances, the committee believes that it may be necessary to adopt legislation validating and continuing the pension plans of certain local units and the sections which provide benefits to certain members of these plans.

14. Miscellaneous Statutes

C.9:10-4 authorizes the board of chosen freeholders of a county of the second, third or fifth class to require the superintendent of the county detention home to serve as an assistant probation officer. Its provisions apply to Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class.

C.22A:1-2 requires the sheriff of a county, other than a county of the first class, to compute the mileage which jurors must travel. Its provisions apply to Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class.

C.23:4-38.1 prohibits any person in a county of the first or second class from setting certain traps to capture fur-bearing animals. Its provisions apply to Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class.

C.27:16-25 requires a county of the first class to provide electricity to county roads within a municipality in which the county maintains an electric plant occupying at least 100 acres. Its provisions do not apply to Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class.

C.40:19A-1 authorizes a county of the third class to establish certain county offices outside the county seat. Its provisions do not apply to Somerset County because it is a county of the second class.

C.40:33-15 et seq. authorize a county with a population between 355,000 and 450,000 as determined by the 1970 census, to reorganize its county library system. The provisions of these sections would be available to Burlington County, because its population exceeds 355,000, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the sections.

C.40:23-6.1 allows a county with a population in excess of 200,000 to establish summer camps for underprivileged children. Its provisions apply to Somerset County because its population exceeds 200,000.

C.40:23-6.20 provides that a county with a population in excess of 400,000, other than a county of the first class, shall not be required to pay a building permit fee to a municipality for the erection or alteration of a county building. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class, is subject to the exemption provided in the section.

C.40:37A-90 allows a county improvement authority established in a county of the second class having a population of more than 265,000 and less than 350,000, in a county of the third class having a population of not more than 65,000, in a county of the third class having a population of 150,000 but less than 300,000, to exercise the powers of a common carrier. If Burlington County were to establish an improvement authority it could not act as a common carrier because the county's population exceeds 350,000 and an improvement authority in Ocean County, because it is a county of the fifth class with a

population in excess of 300,000, would also be prohibited from acting as a common carrier.

C.44:2-9 provides that a steward of an almshouse in a county of the third class shall be appointed by the board of freeholders. Its provisions do not apply to Somerset County, because it is a county of the second class.

C.44:5-16 allows any county with a population of less than 925,000, as established by the 1970 census, to make annual appropriations for charitable hospitals and for the maintenance of poor and indigent residents of charitable hospitals. Its provisions would be applicable to Essex County, because its population is below 925,000, if the 1970 census were no longer valid for the section.

C.44:5-17 and C.44:5-18 authorize a county with a population of more than 925,000, as determined by the 1970 census, to provide for the support of indigent patients in certain hospitals and to make annual appropriations not exceeding \$10,000 for that purpose to each qualifying hospital. The provisions of these sections would no longer apply to Essex County, because its population is less than 925,000, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the sections.

C.48:19-13.1 authorizes water companies in a county of the third class to charge fees to persons in unincorporated communities. Its provisions do not apply to Somerset County because it is a county of the second class.

C.52:14-15.9a requires disbursement officers in a county of the first class to get authorization from the board of freeholders before making payroll deductions for employee insurance. The provisions of the section do not apply to Hudson County because it is a county of the second class.

C.54:3-2 requires that a county board of taxation shall have 3 members, except that a county board of taxation in a county of the first class shall have 5 members. Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class shall have a tax board composed of 3 members.

C.54:3-6 establishes the salaries of members of county boards of taxation which are based on the population of a county as follow:

On the basis of the 1980 census, members of the tax board in Somerset County shall receive a salary of \$8,625.00; members in Ocean County shall receive \$9,250.00; members in Warren and Hunterdon shall receive \$7,375.00; and, members in Monmouth shall receive \$11,125.00.

C.40:23-6.26 authorizes the board of freeholders in a county with a population in excess of 500,000 to enter into contracts with municipalities within the county to provide facilities or services which the municipalities may furnish or provide. The provisions of this section apply to Monmouth County because its population exceeds 500,000.

C.40:23-8.2a allows a county with a population in excess of 300,000 to make appropriations to certain junior colleges. The provisions of the section apply to Ocean County because its population exceeds 300,000.

MUNICIPALITIES

New Jersey has 567 municipalities each of which is incorporated under the title of city, borough, town, township or village. Each municipality operates under a form of government which establishes its governmental organization and structure. In many instances the title of the municipality denotes its form of government. For example, a municipality incorporated as a borough may operate under a borough form of government. However, the title and the form of a municipal government do not necessarily correspond.

Since 1875, the Legislature has enacted several laws which permit municipalities, regardless of their titles, to choose among a variety of forms of government. The optional forms of government are the Commission Form of Government (C.40:70-1 et seq.), the "Municipal Manager Form (1923) of Government" (C.40:79-1 et seq.) and the "Optional Municipal Charter Law" (C.40:69A-1 et seq.). On the basis of these laws, many municipalities incorporated under a specific title have opted for different forms of government. Many of the State's most populous municipalities, for example, are incorporated as cities or townships, but have adopted one of the forms of government provided in the "Optional Municipal Charter Law".

In those instances where a municipality has adopted an optional form of government, the local unit may be subject both to statutes which apply to municipalities incorporated under that title (city, borough, town, township, village) and to statutes applicable to the adopted form of government. In general, statutes regulating the form of government supercede laws applying only on the basis of title of incorporation, but only to the degree of incompatibility or inconsistency. A city, for example, which has adopted one of the forms of government authorized by the "Optional Municipal Charter

Law" is subject to the relevant sections of that statute and to those laws which apply to cities and which do not contradict the "Optional Municipal Charter Law."

Municipalities which are cities are classified into categories which roughly parallel the classification scheme in affect for counties. As provided in C.40A:6-4 the four classes of cities are:

- a. cities of the first class which have a population of more than 150,000;
- b. cities of the second class which have a population of not less than 12,000 and not more than 150,000;
- c. cities of the third class which have fewer than 12,000 inhabitants; and,
- d. cities of the fourth class which border on the Atlantic Ocean and serve as seaside or summer resorts.

Laws applicable to cities are specific to the class of a local unit and in many instances to the population of the city.

In addition to the forms of government discussed above, the Legislature, upon petition, permitted certain municipalities to adopt a form of government not authorized in the statutes. Those municipalities operate under special charters. In these instances, the laws which govern the municipality by virtue of its title are applicable to the degree that they do not conflict with the provisions of the special charter.

Organization

The committee has examined all statutes which make reference to the population, form, title and class of a municipality. The report provides a discussion of the laws which apply to municipalities on the basis of the 1980 census and lists those municipalities which are

affected by a particular statute. The statutes included are both permissive and mandatory and the report indicates when a municipality is required to act and when it is authorized to act. In certain cases, permissive statutes which provided authorization for a municipality to act on the basis of a previous census no longer do so on the basis of the 1980 census and the report identifies these instances. The language used to describe a statute is, when possible, taken from the law and in specific instances the word usage may not conform with the governmental structure of a municipality. This is especially relevant to those municipalities which have adopted any of the optional forms of government authorized by law.

In preparing the report, the committee was confronted with the problem of discussing statutes which are specific to the population of a municipality as determined by a census other than the 1980 census. Statutes of this kind technically continue to govern municipalities which, on the basis of the 1980 census, have populations that no longer correspond to the population stipulated in the law. Census specific statutes may prohibit certain municipalities from adopting the provisions of a statute, while continuing to impose statutory mandates which may be detrimental to the needs of other local units. For the purposes of this report, the committee has noted those laws which specify a census and indicated the municipalities which would be affected if the references to a particular census were omitted.

Because a substantial number of statutes make reference to the population, form, title or class of a municipality, 4 tables are provided at the conclusion of the narrative to assist municipal officials in identifying statutes relevant to their jurisdictions.

or more will no longer affect Trenton City or Camden City.

Because many statutes which affect municipalities and cities are specific to the population levels discussed above, much of the information contained in this section of the report pertains to Newark City, Jersey City, Trenton City and Camden City.

1. Governmental Forms

A. The "Optional Municipal Charter Law" (40:69A-1 et seq.)

a. C.40:69A-43(e) requires a municipality which has adopted any of the mayor-council forms of government and which has a population of more than 250,000 to establish a board of alcoholic beverage control. The statute permits a municipality with a population of 15,000 or more which has a mayor-council form of government to establish a board. Jersey City, because its population is below 250,000 is not required to have a board and, if it elects to continue its board, its members shall receive no compensation. In addition, on the basis of the 1980 census, Monroe Twp., Mount Olive Twp. and Marlboro Twp. are authorized to establish a board of alcoholic beverage control and Saddle Brook Twp., because its population has fallen below 15,000, is no longer authorized to have a board.

b. C.40:69A-43(f) provides that in a city of the first class which has adopted a mayor-council form of government and which has a population of more than 250,000, the mayor, with the advice and consent of the council, shall make appointments to boards, authorities or commissions when general law authorizes the governing body to make appointments. The provisions of the subsection do not apply to Jersey City because its population is below 250,000.

c. C.40:69A-44 provides that in a city of the first class with

All tables provide the 1970 and 1980 populations of the municipalities. The first groups municipalities by county and ranks them in descending order by population. The second lists all municipalities in descending order of population as determined by the 1980 census and identifies their form of government and the county in which they are located. The third categorizes municipalities by their title of incorporation and identifies their form of government and the county in which they are situate. Municipalities are listed in descending order of population as determined by the 1980 census within each category. The fourth groups all municipalities by their forms of government and identifies the county in which they are located. Municipalities are listed in descending order of population as determined by the 1980 census within each group.

Municipalities Experiencing Statutorily Significant Population Changes

Upon the effective date of the 1980 census, Jersey City, which had a population in 1970 of 260,350, will have a population of 223,532. All statutes which apply to a municipality or a city with a population in excess of 250,000 will no longer affect Jersey City. Newark City, which had a population in 1970 of 381,930, will have a population of 329,248. All statutes which apply to a municipality with a population of more than 350,000 will no longer affect Newark City. Any statutes which affected a municipality or city with a population between 250,000 and 350,000, and which formerly applied only to Jersey City, will be applicable to Newark City.

The populations of Camden City and Trenton City will both be below 100,000 on the effective date of the 1980 census. All statutes which apply to municipalities or cities with a population of 100,000

a population of more than 250,000, which has adopted a mayor-council form of government, the business administrator shall, subject to the direction of the mayor, supervise the administration of departments. The provisions of the section do not apply to Jersey City because its population is less than 250,000.

d. C.40:69-60.1 applies to municipalities which have a population of more than 100,000 and which have adopted the mayor-council form c. plan of government and provides for the appointment by the mayor of up to 2 deputy mayors, and 5 aides, and a personal secretary and an executive secretary. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Trenton City because its population is below 100,000.

e. C.40:69A-60.3 allows the director of the department of administration, in a municipality with a population of more than 400,000 which has adopted the mayor-council form c. plan of government, to appoint an assistant business administrator. The provisions of the section do not apply to Newark City because its population is below 400,000.

f. C.40:69A-60.5 authorizes each member of the municipal council of a municipality which has adopted a mayor-council plan c. form of government and which has a population of more than 250,000 to appoint up to 1 aide who shall receive a maximum salary of \$7,500.00. The provisions of this section do not apply to Jersey City because its population is below 250,000.

B. Commission Form of Government (C.40:70-1 et seq.)

C.40:73-9 permits boroughs with a population of less than 5,000 which operate under the commission form of government to exempt tax collectors and treasurers from residency requirements. This statute would now apply to Mount Ephraim Borough since its population is below 5,000. Other than this, no changes in the affect of statutes will result from the 1980 census for municipalities which have adopted the commission form of government. The population limits provided in C.40:72-1, C.40:72-1.1, C.40:72-6.1, C.40:72-9 and C.40:73-5 affect the same municipalities in the manner established by the 1970 census.

C. Municipal Manager Form (1923) (C.40:79-1 et seq.)

a. C.40:81-1 establishes the number of councilmen who shall serve on the municipal council of a municipality which has adopted a municipal manager form of government and is based on the population of a municipality as follows:

On the basis of the 1980 census Teaneck Twp., because its population is below 40,000, shall have 5, rather than 7, councilmen.

The committee recommends that C.40:81-1 be amended to allow the voters of a municipality to determine, by petition and referendum, the number of councilmen a municipality shall have within certain statutory limitations.

2. Titles of Incorporation

A. Boroughs

a. C.40:77-1 permits a borough with a population of more than 5,000 which has adopted the commission form of government to establish a board of tax assessors. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Mount Ephraim Borough because its population has fallen below 5,000.

b. C.40:87-2 allows a borough of more than 10,000 to divide into wards. The provisions of the section apply to Hopatcong Bor. and Wanaque Bor. because their populations exceed 10,000 and no longer applies to Maywood Bor., Pitman Bor., Bound Brook Bor. and Runnemede Bor. because their populations have fallen below 10,000.

c.40:87-15 allows boroughs with a population of less than 10,000 to have the elected tax collector serve as clerk. The provisions of the section apply to Maywood Bor., Pitman Bor., Bound Brook Bor., and Runnemede Bor. because their populations have fallen below 10,000 and no longer apply to Hopatcong Bor. and to Wanaque Bor. because their populations exceed 10,000.

d. C.40:87-15 also provides that in a borough with a population of less than 2,500, the clerk and treasurer may be exempted from municipal residency requirements unless either officer holds a second borough office for which residency is required. Because their popula-

tion have fallen below 2,500, the provisions of the section apply to Essex Fells Bor., Laurel Springs Bor. and Brooklawn Bor. The section no longer applies to Saddle River Bor., Ogdensburg Bor. and Sea Girt Bor. because their populations exceed 2,500.

B. Towns

C.40:132-13 allows the governing body of a town with a population of more than 15,000 to appoint a superintendent of streets. The provisions of the section no longer apply to Dover Town because its population has fallen below 15,000.

C. Townships

a. C.40:144-1 allows a township with a population of more than 7,000 to divide into wards. Because their populations exceed 7,000 the provisions of the section are applicable to:

b. C.40:144-11 applies to townships which have divided into wards, and provides that in townships with a population of more than 10,000 the council member elected at large shall be known as mayor. Because their populations exceed 4,500, and, if they have not abolished the position of road supervisor, the provisions of the section apply to:

d. C.40:145-8 provides that in townships with a population of more than 2,000, the salary of the assessor shall be fixed by the governing body. Because their populations exceed 2,000 the provisions of the section apply to:

Because their populations have fallen below 2,000, the provisions of the section do not apply to Cranbury Twp., Oldmans Twp. and Winfield Twp.

C.40:145-13 requires that in townships with a population of more than 24,000 which are not governed by the municipal manager form of government, the term of office of attorney, building inspector, municipal physician and treasurer shall be 4 years. Because their populations exceed 24,000, the provisions of the section apply to:

The provisions of the section no longer apply to Maplewood Twp. or New Hanover Twp., because their populations are less than 24,000.

f. C.40:145-32 authorizes the appointment of a deputy township clerk in townships with a population of more than 24,000. The provisions of the section apply to those townships to which the provisions of C.40:145-13 (above) are applicable.

g. C.40:146-2 provides that in townships with a population of more than 4,500, except those in a county of the sixth class, the township committee shall consist of 5 members. The provisions of the section apply to those townships to which the provisions of C.40:145-2 (above) apply with the exception of Upper Twp. because it is situate in a county of the sixth class.

h. C.40:146-2.1 provides that in townships with a population of more than 3,500, as determined by the 1960 census, which are located in a county of the fifth class with a population of less than 300,000 as determined by that census, the township committee shall be composed of 5 members.

Given the provisions of C.40:146-2, this section does not apply to any Atlantic County Townships, and no longer has relevance for Buena Vista Twp., or Mullica Twp. which are controlled by the provisions of C.40:146-2. In addition, the Ocean County townships of Stafford Twp. and Plumsted Twp. are now controlled by C.40:146-2. If the 1960 census is no longer valid for the section, the section will not apply to any other township in Ocean County, since the population of that county exceeds 300,000.

i. C.40:146-3 allows the voters of any township with a population of less than 4,500 or of any township in a county of the sixth class to increase the size of its township committee from 3 to 5 members. The provisions of the section no longer apply to those townships listed under C.40:145-2 (above) with the exception of Upper Twp., which is in any case now required to have a 5 member committee under C.40:146-2 (above).

The committee recommends that those statutes which fix the number of members of a township committee be amended to give voters the right to establish, by referendum and petition, the number of committee members within certain statutory limitations.

D. Cities

C.40A:6-4 establishes the classification scheme for cities discussed at the beginning of this section. On the basis of the 1980 census, Woodbury City and Burlington City, because their populations have fallen below 12,000, are cities of the third class, rather than cities of the second class.

Many of the statutes which affect cities and are specific to their class are discussed in this report. There are, however, many which are not included. The statutes are replete with references to cities which are specific to their classification and the committee determined that it would be inadvisable to include them all. The committee has on file a list of the relevant statutes which is available to interested parties.

3. Municipal Courts

a. C.2A:806 authorizes the appointment of up to 5 additional municipal court judges in a municipality with a population in excess

of 200,000, of 2 additional judges in a municipality with a population between 75,000 and 85,000 in a county of the first class, and of 1 additional judge in a municipality with a population between 55,000 and 75,000 in a county of the first class.

The provisions of this section no longer authorize the appointment of an additional judge in Bayonne City or Union City because Hudson County is a county of the second class.

b. C.2A:8-6.1 authorizes the governing body of a municipality with a population of not less than 90,000 nor more than 200,000 to appoint 1 additional magistrate. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Camden City because its population is below 90,000.

c. C.2A:8-6.2 authorizes the governing body of a county seat with a population of more than 40,000 in a county of the second class with a population of more than 500,000 to appoint 1 additional magistrate to the municipal court. The provisions of this section apply to Jersey City, because it is a county seat with a population of more than 40,000 and Hudson County is a county of the second class with a population of more than 500,000.

d. C.2A:8-6.3 authorizes the appointment of 2 additional magistrates in a municipality having a population of not less than 75,000 nor more than 103,000 in a county of the second class. The provisions of this section apply to Trenton City and to Camden City because their populations are below 103,000, but over 75,000, and no longer apply to Clifton City because its population is below 75,000.

e. C.2A:8-6.4 authorizes the appointment of 1 additional judge in a municipality with a population of not less than 40,000 nor more than 45,000 in a county of the first class with a population of more

than 900,000.

The provisions of the section no longer apply to Montclair Town or to West Orange Town because their populations are below 40,000 and the population of Essex County is below 900,000.

4. Civil Service

a. C.11:22-2(s) and C.11:22-2.1 permit the appointment of a director of a municipal public library who shall serve in the unclassified service in a city of the first class with a population of not less than 350,000 and establish the qualifications of that employee. The provisions of these sections no longer apply to Newark City because its population is below 350,000.

b. C.11:22-44.6 provides that all employees of neighborhood health centers in cities with a population of between 103,000 and 112,000, as determined by the 1970 census, shall be in the classified service. The section would no longer apply to Trenton City because its population is below 103,000, if the 1970 census is no longer valid for the section.

5. Education

a. C.18A:24-19 establishes limitations on the amounts of bonds which school districts may issue, and provides exceptions to the limitations for school districts in a city of the first class with a population in excess of 250,000 and for a city of the second class with a population in excess of 100,000. The exemption for a city of the first class no longer applies to Jersey City because its population is below 250,000 and the exception for a city of the second class no longer applies to either Trenton City or Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

b. C.18A:52-1 allows a board of education in a municipality with a population in excess of 10,000 to employ lecturers for evening classes. Because their populations exceed 10,000, the provisions of the section apply to:

c. C.18A:54-37 exempts from taxes for the county vocational school system municipalities in a county of the first class having a population of less than 700,000 as determined by the 1970 census which for a minimum of 20 years have maintained a vocational education program. The provisions of the section would not apply to any municipality in Hudson County, because it is a county of the second class, if the 1970 census figure were no longer valid for the section.

6. Elections

a. C.19:4-2 requires that in cities of the second class with a population of less than 100,000, persons shall not vote in municipal elections unless they have been residents of the city for 30 days prior to the election. The provisions of this section apply to Trenton City and Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

The committee recommends that statutes which establish special residency requirements for voters in certain cities be repealed.

b. C.19:31-2 requires that in municipalities with a population of more than 12,000, evening registration shall be available for at least 3 working days preceding the close of registration and that out of office registration shall be made available. Municipalities with fewer than 12,000 shall have evening registration on the day of the close of registration. Municipalities with populations that have exceeded 12,000 with the 1980 census are:

7. Boards of Health

a. C.26:3-3 provides that the board of health in any municipality, except a township, shall be composed of not less than 5 nor more than 7 members, and that in a city with a population in excess of 100,000, the board shall be composed of not less than 5 nor more than 10 members. The boards of health of Trenton City and Camden City shall be composed of not more than 7 members because their popula-

tions are below 100,000.

b. C.26:3-6 provides that the governing body in a municipality other than a township shall fix the term of members of a board of health, and that in a city with a population in excess of 100,000 the term of a member shall not exceed 4 years. The term limitation of 4 years no longer applies in Trenton City or Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

c. C.26:3-9 provides that in a township with a population of not more than 20,000, the board of health shall be composed of specific township officials, unless the governing body adopts, by ordinance, the provisions of C.26:3-3. C.26:3-10 provides that in townships with a population of more than 20,000, the board of health shall be composed of not less than 5 members nor more than 7 members who shall serve for terms not exceeding 4 years, unless the governing body adopts, by ordinance, the provisions of C.26:3-3. Because their populations exceed 20,000, the provisions of C.26:3-10 apply to:

8. Municipalities Title 40

a. C.40:10-2 authorizes any county seat with a population of more than 100,000 to join with the county in erecting and maintaining war memorial buildings. The provisions of the section no longer apply to Trenton City or Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

b. C.40:11A-4 allows a municipality which has established a parking authority pursuant to this section and which has a population of 100,000 or more to appoint 2 additional commissioners to the authority. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Trenton City or Camden City if they have established parking authorities pursuant to this section, because their populations are below 100,000.

c. C.40:48-4.1 through C.40:48-4.8 allow the governing body of any municipality with a population of more than 250,000 and less than 300,000 to enter into contracts to provide reduced bus fares for senior citizens. The provisions of these sections no longer apply to Jersey City because its population is below 250,000.

d. C.40:48-8.1 through 40:48-8.14 allow a city on the Atlantic Ocean with a population in excess of 50,000 to adopt ordinances under

certain circumstances for certain taxes. The committee recommends that these sections be repealed because there are no cities bordering on the Atlantic Ocean with a population in excess of 50,000. The Atlantic City luxury tax is levied under C.40:48-8.15 et seq.

e. C.40:48C-1 et seq. allows a municipality with a population in excess of 350,000 to adopt ordinances to impose certain taxes, including a payroll tax. The provisions of these sections no longer apply to Newark because its population is below 350,000.

f. C.40:60-51.12 allows the governing body of a municipality with a population of more than 30,000, in a county of the first class with a population of 800,000 or more, to lease municipal property to the Police Athletic League or the Police Benevolent Association. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Garfield City, Livingston Township and Nutley Town because their populations have fallen below 30,000. The committee recommends that this section be repealed because C.40A:12-15 authorizes municipalities to enter into leases for purposes similar to those authorized by C.40:60-51.12.

g. C.40:61-22.18 authorizes a city in a county of the first class to create public streets in private parks under certain circumstances. Because Hudson County is a county of the second class, the provisions of the section no longer apply to:

Bayonne City
Hoboken City
Jersey City
Union City

h. C.40:62-46.1 et seq. allows a city of the second class in a county of the second class to establish transportation services.

The provisions of the section apply to Bayonne City, Hoboken City and Union City, because Hudson County is a county of the second class.

i. C.40:175-21 provides that in a city with a population of not less than 100,000 or more than 200,000 which has established a board of public works, the mayor may vote on any resolution of the board to break a tie of the board. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Trenton City or Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

9. Police and Fire

Chapter 14 of Title 40A includes many statutes which apply to certain police and firemen and are specific to the class, title of incorporation, form of government or population of a municipality. It does not appear that any of these statutes are affected by the 1980 census, except, perhaps, certain statutes which were saved from repeal by the 1971 revision of this chapter. Many of these statutes saved from repeal date back to the 19th and early 20th centuries, and it is difficult to determine their current effect, if any. The committee believes, that it may be desirable for the Legislature to review those statutes for their current effect and to repeal those which are no longer effective. That task is beyond the scope of this report.

10. Pensions

See pg. 34 for a discussion of county and municipal pension plans.

11. Miscellaneous Statutes

a. C.10:5-14.2 authorizes a municipality with a population of at least 200,000 in a county of the first class, upon the approval of the Attorney General, to establish an Office of Civil Rights. The provisions of this section no longer apply to Jersey City because

Hudson County is a county of the second class.

b. C.33:1-5 permits a municipality with a population of 15,000 or more to establish a board of alcoholic beverage control and provides for the compensation of board members in a municipality in a county of the first class. Because their populations are 15,000 or more, the provisions of the section apply to:

Because their populations have fallen below 15,000, the provisions of the section no longer apply to:

The salary provisions of C.33:1-5 no longer apply to any municipality within Hudson County because it is a county of the second class.

d. C.33:1-5.1 through C.33:1-5.4 authorize a municipality with a population of 100,000 or more, which has established a board of finance, to establish a municipal excise commission which shall be the board of alcoholic beverage control. The provisions of these sections no longer apply to Trenton City or Camden City because their populations are below 100,000.

e. C.44:8-146 through C.44:8-152 provide for the hospitalization and care of indigent persons in municipalities in a county of the first class. The provisions of these sections no longer apply to municipalities in Hudson County because it is a county of the second class.

f. C.48:16-2 prohibits any municipality with a population of less than 20,000 in a county of the first class from establishing a fee of more than \$50.00 for the right to operate an autocab.

Because their populations are below 20,000, the provisions of the section apply to:

Dumont Bor.
Elmwood Park Bor.
Millburn Twp.
Rutherford Bor.

The limitation imposed by the section no longer applies to Cliffside Park Bor. because its population exceeds 20,000.

The provisions of the section no longer apply to any municipality within Hudson County because it is a county of the second class.

g. C.51:1-43 requires municipalities with a population of 60,000 or more to appoint a municipal superintendent of weights and measures and permits other municipalities to appoint such an official. Dover Twp., Middletown Twp. and Irvington Twp., because their populations exceed 60,000, are required to appoint a superintendent of weights and measures.

APPENDIX

The appendix is composed of 4 tables which are provided to assist in determining which population specific statutes are applicable to a particular municipality. All tables list the 1980 and 1970 populations of each municipality. The county location, title of incorporation and form of government are identified by code numbers on each table. The county identified by each code number is listed on page 64 of the appendix. The form of government identified by each code number is listed on page 65 of the appendix. The title of incorporation for each code number is listed on page 66 of the appendix.

Table A ranks all municipalities in descending order of population as established by the 1980 census. It will be most useful in determining the relevance of a statute generally applicable to all municipalities within a particular population range. Table A also identifies the county location, title of incorporation and form of government of each municipality.

Table B groups all municipalities by the county in which they are located and ranks all municipalities in a county in descending order of population. It will be most useful in determining the relevance of a statute which is specific to the population of a municipality and its county of location. It also identifies the form of government and title of incorporation of a municipality and can be used to determine the applicability of a statute which specifies county location and title of incorporation or form of government.

Table C categorizes municipalities by their title of incorporation and lists all municipalities within each category in descending order of population. It will be most useful in determining the applicability of a statute which is specific to both population and

title of incorporation.

Table D groups municipalities by their form of government and lists all municipalities within each group in descending order of population. It will be most useful in determining the relevance of a statute which specifies both population and form of government.

Several municipalities located in different counties have the same name. In these cases, it is important when using the tables to identify the county location of a municipality.

Four municipalities are changing the form of government under which they operate. On July 1, 1981 Cherry Hill Twp. will change from a township form of government to the mayor-council plan B form of government as provided in the "Optional Municipal Charter Law" (OMCL). Because this is an immediate change, it is listed in the tables as operating under the mayor-council form B plan of government.

On January 1, 1982, Ringwood Bor. will change from a borough form of government to the council-manager form E plan of government provided in the OMCL. On January 1, 1982, Roxbury Twp. will change from a township form of government to the council-manager form F plan of government as provided in the OMCL. On January 1, 1982 Greenwich Twp. (Gloucester County) will change from a township form of government to the small municipality plan C form of government as provided in the OMCL. Because these changes are not immediate, all of these municipalities are listed in the tables as operating under the form of government under which they currently operate.
