
Everything you need to know

Are you a committed member of the Muslim, Christian or Jewish community? Are you a dynamic young person, approximately 18 to 26 years and see yourself as a future leader of your community? Are you keen to learn leadership skills including teamwork, vision and overcoming challenges? If so, you may be eligible to join the multifaith Future Leaders Program.

A <u>free</u> learning opportunity

Participants begin with a free three-day leadership training workshop from 2-4 February 2009. The workshop will be an opportunity to join in hands-on leadership training activities with other young people from different faith communities. Participants are expected to form a network of connections to support each other in future leadership endeavours.

The three-day workshop offers a packed program of activities designed to engage people of different backgrounds in learning new skills,




exploring commonalities and making meaningful connections. You will learn personal and group skills through activities that engage mind, body, heart and spirit.

Whether you are Muslim, Christian or Jewish, you probably understand the strengths, challenges and possibilities for your own community. But chances are you have had little opportunity to find out how other communities



function or to talk with other young people who share your commitment to being an active member of multicultural Australia.

The Future Leaders Program is a unique opportunity to learn the kind of leadership skills everyone needs to make a contribution to communal life while getting to know people from different backgrounds.

The emphasis is not on faith or practices but on



learning leadership skills. The uniqueness of this program is the opportunity it offers to learn with young people from other faith backgrounds and gain from their perspectives on leadership and community.

The program is funded through the Victorian Government's Interfaith Grants program to build leadership skills among different faith communities for the future.
