14th Season | West Chester '91

Denise Zelenak returns to the sidelines for her 14th season as the head coach of Drexel field hockey. She took over the program in 1994 and has resurrected the program while competing in one of the top field hockey conferences in the country. Last season she guided the Dragons to their best season since joining the Colonial Athletic Association as Drexel earned its first ever berth in the CAA Tournament with a 5-3 conference record. Zelenak's squad defeated Hofstra in the first round before falling to eventual tournament champion James Madison in the semifinals. Five players were named to All-Conference teams including First Team All-CAA selections Sarah Gostomski and Carolina Gibernau. In her Drexel coaching career, 10 of her players have received a combined 17 Regional All-America awards, including a trio of National All-Americans. Pamie Zukowski earned All-America honors in 2000 and 2001. Rachael Bloemker was named Third Team All-America in 2005 while last season Gostomski was also a Third Team pick.

Zelenak's tireless efforts have resulted in marked improvements as Zelenak's coaching culminated in the Dragons' first CAA Tournament appearance last season. In 2006, she guided Drexel to a blistering start as the Dragons opened the season with a five-game winning streak. In 2005, Zelenak led Drexel to a 10-9 record, including a 4-1 mark against Philadelphia-area schools. In 2002, Zelenak posted 11 wins overall and two victories in the CAA, narrowly missing the conference tournament but qualifying for the Eastern College Athletic Conference Tournament for the second-straight year. That year also included a first-time win over Boston University and a record-setting six consecutive victories. In 2000,

Zelenak led her team to a school-record 13 victories and the program's first postseason appearance since 1992. Her efforts earned her the 2000 Dita/NFHCA Mid-Atlantic Coach of the Year as one of the five coaches to be honored regionally by the NFHCA.

The fourth head coach in Drexel's 22-year Division I history, Zelenak began her coaching career as an assistant at the University of Pennsylvania in 1990. She spent the next two seasons as an assistant coach at Drexel before returning to West Chester University, her alma mater, for two seasons (1993-94). Zelenak also coached in the U.S. Field Hockey Association (USFHA) Futures program for seven years.

Zelenak, who is entering her seventh season on the All-America committee, was a part of the ECAC committee from 1999-2002 serving as its chair in 2000 and 2001. She also served as a Regional Ranking Committee member for five years. Earlier this year, she earned Level II coach accreditation from the USA Field Hockey and has been recommended for Level III.

Zelenak's extensive field hockey résumé is highlighted by her outstanding achievements on the field as well. At the collegiate level, she was a member of a highly successful West Chester program that ranked in the top 20 in Division I throughout her playing career. Zelenak earned Regional All-America recognition and was an Olympic Festival participant. In 1989, she played for the U.S. National Reserve Team before graduating in 1991 with a degree in health and physical education.

Zelenak's post-collegiate playing career has been equally impressive. A USFHA National Indoor Tournament All-Star in 1994 and 1995, she led her team to the 1998, 2001 and 2008 National Indoor Championship. She also competed from 1998-2001 in the U.S. United Airlines Summer League for the Metro Rush and in 2003 for the Fury. In 2000, she served as the team's player-coach. Zelenak, who has been a member of the U.S. Indoor National Team since 2004, captained the team and led the Americans to a silver medal at the Pan Am Games in 2006. In 2008, Zelenak will once again represent the U.S. in the Pan Am Games.

A former captain of the Puerto Rican National Team, Zelenak competed in the Puerto Rican Olympic Festival and the Central American Games. During her time with the Puerto Rican team she earned 12 caps and recorded three goals. Zelenak served as co-head coach for the United States Men's East Coast Junior Team that won the national championships in 2006 and 2008 at the U.S. training center in Chula Vista, Calif.

A native of Warminster, Pa., Denise and her husband, James, Drexel's admissions director of data modeling and analysis, reside in Wilmington, Del. with their three sons, 16-year-old Paul, 13-year-old Gray and 7-year-old Jack.

Nicky Hitchens Seventh Season Penn '89

Nicky Hitchens is now in her seventh season as an assistant under Head Coach Denise Zelenak. She was promoted to associate head coach in May of 2007. She assists in all aspects of the program, including recruiting, the monitoring of academic progress and alumni relations. Earlier this year, Hitchens was awarded Level II coaching

accreditation from USA Field Hockey.

A 1989 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, Hitchens was a four-year starter for the Quaker field hockey team. During her career at Penn, she was a three-time First Team All-Ivy League selection and was named the 1985 Ivy League Rookie of the Year. She was also the Gail Lipstein Award winner as Penn's top freshman.

As a senior, she was named the 1988 Ivy League Player of the Year. A two-time All-American and three-time Penn MVP, she led her team to three Ivy League Championships and was a member of the 1998 NCAA semifinalist team that was ranked fourth in the nation. Hitchens is still ranked second all-time at Penn in goals and third in career points. She graduated from the school with a degree in anthropology.

In 1999, Hitchens was selected to the Ivy League Championships Silver Anniversary Honor Roll. The Honor Roll honored the top female athletes in the first 25 years of Ivy League Championship play. Hitchens was inducted into the University of Pennsylvania Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000, the first year she became eligible.

A two-sport athlete at Penn, Hitchens was also an outstanding lacrosse player. She received All-Ivy League honors and was named Ivy League Rookie of the Year in 1986.

Hitchens is still active as a player in field hockey. She is currently a member of the club teams E.Nigma and Team Za. In 2004 she was a member of the U.S. National Indoor Team. In 1998, 2001 and 2008 she played on the team that won the National Indoor Championships. In 2006, she began coaching Mystx, a local club team.

Heather Schnepf First Season Iowa '08

Heather Schnepf joins the Drexel Field Hockey staff after a standout career at the University of Iowa. Schnepf's duties with the Dragons will include working with Drexel's defensive unit as well as assisting in the program's recruiting and alumnae relations.

Schnepf led the Hawkeyes to a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances and was twice named the Big Ten Defensive Player of

the Year. She recorded 11 goals, 13 assists and 16 defensive saves in her collegiate career and was a First Team All-American as a senior. She was also a member of the Midwest High Performance Team and the USA-B squad that faced Sony Japan, the Canadian National Team and the USA-A squad.

Last season, Schnepf served as a student assistant coach at Iowa as she completed her bachelor of science in athletic training. She has previously served as a coach at various field hockey camps the Futures program since 2004.

Schnepf is a native of Medford Lakes, N.J. and graduated from Lenape High School where she also earned First Team All-America honors.



Volunteer Asst. Coach **Jen Corsilli** Fifth Season Holy Cross, '04

Jen Corsilli is in her fifth season as an assistant at Drexel. In her first two seasons, Corsilli served as a graduate assistant coach while completing her master's degree. She came to University City after a successful career as Holy Cross' starting goaltender. She led the Crusaders to two- regular-season Patriot League titles and a league

championship title in 2000. She was named All-Conference three times.

Corsilli has also been active as a coach in the USA Field Hockey Futures program.



2008 SEASON OUTLOOK

The 2007 season marked a number of firsts for Drexel field hockey since joining the Colonial Athletic Association. The Dragons reached the CAA Tournament for the first time where they defeated Hofstra to advance to the semifinals. Drexel had two players named First Team All-CAA and two more selected as Second Team All-CAA as Head Coach Denise Zelenak led the Dragons to a 12-9 overall mark and a 5-3 record in conference action. With the return of 2007 First Team All-CAA midfielder Carolina Gibernau along with Second Team pick and three-year starter in goal, Colleen McAndrew, the Dragons look to build on the tremendous strides made by the program last season.

The Forwards

With top five all-time scorer Emily Horvat's graduation the Dragons will be younger up front in 2008. Drexel will likely send out a front line that will include three sophomores: Susan Ciufo, Christina Mastropaolo and Kim Tunell. Susan Ciufo, a CAA All-Rookie Team selection last year, will likely be a valuable offensive weapon again this season. As a freshman, she tallied five goals as she started in all 21 games. She scored twice, including the game-winner, in the Dragons' victory over Northeastern to clinch their first-ever berth in the CAA Tournament. Christina Mastropaolo was another freshman who had a promising season in 2007. One of the conference's fastest players, Mastropaolo contributed four goals in her first season, including two game-winners, while playing in every game and starting 18. Her acceleration and field vision could make her a focus of the Drexel offense in just her sophomore season. Kim Tunell had a solid first season at Drexel as she totaled four goals coming off the bench. Her quickness and stickhandling will likely be a major asset to the Dragons in 2008. Also at forward will be senior Catherine Chiara. Last season, Chiara battled injuries





after a break-through sophomore season that saw her score nine goals, the most for a Drexel player since 2002. This season, Chiara enters the season healthy and ready to regain the form she showed in 2006. Bronwyn Cox is a fifth-year senior who will lend her experience to the offensive unit. She has two goals and seven points in her career. Brittney Hausman redshirted in 2007 and could also see time at forward for the Dragons in 2008.

The Midfield

Though Drexel graduated All-American Sarah Gostomski, fellow First Team All-CAA selection Carolina Gibernau returns in 2008. The Uruguay native had a big sophomore season as she flashed her smooth ball-handling skills and passing abilities throughout 2007. She served as the Dragons' primary option on penalty strokes as she converted all four of her chances. She was the team's second leading scorer with six goals and six assists while also serving as a defensive presence in the midfield. Also at midfield will be the team's leading scorer from 2007, Amanda Kicera. The senior burst onto the scene with team-highs of seven goals, seven assists and 21 points after entering her junior season with just four career points. Kicera has a knack for finding the right place to be in front of the cage where she does most of her damage on deflections and rebound opportunities. Also returning at midfield is Jordan Freese. As a sophomore, Freese started 15 games and recorded three assists. Jen Cairone made 15 appearances at forward off the bench last season but could see time at midfield this season. She is one of Drexel's most improved players since her arrival and her hard work could result in increased playing time as a junior. Megan Niro and Laura Quenzer both redshirted in their first year at Drexel will look to crack Zelenak's rotation at midfield in their first year on the turf.

2008 SEASON OUTLOOK



The Backs

Casey Mouser, the captain of Drexel's defense, graduated but another converted forward appears to be in line to lead the Dragons' backline in 2008. Jennifer Bolger moved from forward to back midway through last season after the Drexel defense was depleted by injuries. The 2006 All-CAA Rookie Team member flourished in her new role as a physical, smart defender who has a knack for good positioning. The junior also possess a powerful shot as evidenced by her five goals in 2007. Joining Bolger in back will be Whitney Enck. Last season, Enck became one of the team's most trusted defenders after not having much experience on the field in her previous seasons. Enck's three defensive saves led the team as she was named the team's most improved player. In 2008 she will likely be counted on again for her strong clears and solid on-ball defense. Amanda Coffey served as a part-time starter in her freshman season and is looking to contribute even more in her second year. She is a capable distributor from the back and could see time at the center back position. Sarah Heller enters her junior season looking to make her way into the defensive rotation as well. Joining the back line this year will be Megan Keller. The Horsham, Pa. native transferred from Syracuse and will have three years of eligibility with the Dragons. Redshirt freshman Mariel Marinelli spent last season adjusting to the collegiate game and may play a part in Drexel's plans in 2008.



The Goalies

Three-year starter Colleen McAndrew will look to cap a solid career at Drexel with a big senior season. Last year the Bethlehem, Pa. native was named Second Team All-CAA after holding six of Drexel's eight conference opponents to one goal or less in the regular season. Her four shutouts last season give her 11 for her career as she is just six away from Drexel's all-time record. Her quick reflexes and fearless play have helped McAndrew rank among the best in the cage in Drexel history. Behind McAndrew will be redshirt freshman Heather Abbott. The highly touted recruit out of Malaga, N.J. spent 2007 learning under McAndrew and will likely serve as a back-up in her first season on the field.



The Schedule


The Dragons will open regular-season action in California with a pair of non-conference games. On Aug. 30, Stanford will host Drexel while two days later California will challenge the Dragons. Drexel will open its home season on Buckley Field with a visit from Rutgers on Sept. 5. VIDAS ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Renovations to Drexel's athletics fields were completed in 2006. The field complex at 43rd and Powelton Ave. now boasts a synthetic Sprinturf field, and an Astroturf field in addition to resurfaced tennis courts and a newly renovated softball field.

Drexel athletes compete on state-of-the-art fields equipped with exterior lighting. This allows teams to play night games and have morning and evening practices to better accommodate the schedules of student-athletes. Thanks to the efforts of alums Robert Buckley ('58) and Vince Vidas (B.S. '59, M.S. '64), whose fund-raising and support enabled these improvements, Drexel's field complex is now one of the best outdoor collegiate athletics venues in Philadelphia.



Vidas Field

The lower field, which bares the name of Drexel legend Vince Vidas, was converted from a natural grass field in 2005. Vidas Field plays host to all home men's and women's soccer and lacrosse competitions. The field has already played host to the Drexel Invitational Soccer tournament, the 2007 CAA Men's Lacrosse Semifinals, the 2008 CAA Men's Lacrosse Finals and it served as a practice site for the 2006 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Final Four.

Buckley Field

Drexel's field hockey team plays on the new Astroturf field located on the North side of the Vidas Athletic Complex.

The field also features a new scoreboard, as well as bleachers, which can seat up to 500 spectators. In addition to game day activities, Buckley Field is often used as a venue for field hockey and lacrosse clinics. The field also played host to an exhibition match against the British National Men's Lacrosse Team.

Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center

The latest additions to the field house complex are the Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center and the renovation of both the men's lacrosse locker room and coaches' offices. The center allows Drexel's sports medicine staff to provide student-athletes with immediate medical

attention and treatment at the athletics field complex.



In addition to the top-of-the-line sports medicine center and locker room facilities, Drexel's field house also houses the Kopp Lounge. The lounge is a unique venue where today's fans gather to support their Drexel teams while paying homage to some of the program's all-time greats. A mural depicting Drexel's history of success in field sports adorns the east wall of the lounge. The east side of the room opens to a patio overlooking Vidas Field. The Kopp Lounge plays host to alumni gatherings, post-game celebrations and fan rallies.



THE DASKALAKIS ATHLETIC CENTER

The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center houses Drexel's intramural and intercollegiate athletic programs. The DAC opened in February of 1975 and covers a three-acre area on the north side of Market Street between 33rd and 34th streets in the University City section of Philadelphia. The facility includes a collegiate-sized, six-lane swimming pool and a separate three-board diving well on the lower level. The Independence Blue Cross Wellness Center houses exercise rooms, Nautilus, free-weight and cardiovascular training areas, a multi-purpose classroom, a dance studio and a conference room on the lower level of the building.



The DAC Sports Medicine Center

The Sports Medicine Department of Drexel University Department of Athletics provides high quality medical care to all student-athletes participating in Drexel Intercollegiate Athletics. Head Athletic Trainer Michael Westerfer is in his fourth full season overseeing Drexel's training staff. Westerfer completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Temple University then earned his master's degree in exercise science from the University of Massachusetts in 1996. Prior to his arrival at Drexel, Westerfer served as the assistant athletic trainer at Temple where he coordinated all phases of health care for five athletic teams. He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and is a Pennsylvania Athletic Training Licensure.

Drexel's Sports Medicine Center at the Daskalakis Athletic Center is staffed by an experienced sports medicine team that provides the student-athletes with a vast amount of medical services, ranging from injury prevention and treatment of athletic injuries to postsurgical rehabilitation. The athletic training staff consists of four full-time certified athletic trainers and a graduate assistant athletic trainer. In addition to the athletic trainers, the sports medicine team consists of two team physicians, an orthopedic surgeon and a primary care physician, and a physical therapist in order to ensure that the student-athletes have the best medical care possible. The team physicians serve in a daily consultant role and are available oncampus to evaluate and treat student athletes in a private examination office in the DAC athletic training room on a weekly basis. The department's physical therapist facilitates the studentathletes' rehabilitation from major injuries and is available oncampus to evaluate and treat student athletes in the DAC Sports Medicine Center. This facility includes dedicated treatment, taping, and hydrotherapy, rehabilitation, office space and doctor's examination room areas equipped with state of the art modalities and equipment.

The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room

The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room, which opened in March 1997, serves as the strength-training epicenter for all Drexel University student-athletes. Director of Strength and Conditioning Michael Rankin oversees a staff of certified strength and conditioning coaches who manage the physical development of all 16 varsity teams. Rankin who holds degrees in kinesiology and education, is in his sixth season at Drexel. He is recognized as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a Certified Personal Trainer through the National Strength and Conditioning Association. In 2007 Rankin was selected as one of two finalists for the NSCA Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year Award.

The Strength and Conditioning Program at Drexel University is dedicated to pursuing excellence. A variety of techniques are incorporated and designed to help our student-athletes improve speed, agility, power, endurance and flexibility. This is achieved through the implementation of current and sound research in the field of strength and conditioning. The program offers student-athletes an environment in which to excel both as individuals and team members. Recent upgrades to the weight room provide student-athletes with a variety of strength training machines and free-weight equipment. The 2,040 square-foot facility also features three lifting platforms for performing explosive Olympic-style lifts and more than 25 work stations for performance training. This environment is designed to instill leadership, work ethic, discipline, dedication, and determination which will carry over on the field of play.



The ACHIEVE Center

The Drexel ACHIEVE Center is located on the lower level of the Daskalakis Athletic Center. It is the place on campus where student-athletes can utilize computers, academic coaching, study groups, life skills workshops and much more. "The ACHIEVE," as it is known to the student-athletes, is also a place where student-athletes meet for private advising, tutoring and study halls. The staff is devoted to helping Drexel's student-athletes reach their academic potential and excel both in the classroom and on the playing field.

The Drexel Athletic Club

The Drexel Athletic Club is a non-profit organization funded by private donations in support of the Dragons' 16-sport NCAA Div. I athletic program. Contributions greatly assist in enhancing the entire program, and increasing its visibility locally, regionally and nationally. The club helps to provide student-athletes with the best possible intercollegiate athletic experience. ABOUT DREXEL UNIVERSITY

History

Founded in 1891 by Philadelphia financier and philanthropist Anthony J. Drexel, The Drexel Institute of Art, Science and Industry became Drexel University in 1970. Today, Drexel is Philadelphia's technological university. It continues to move up the rankings as one of the best national doctoral universities.

Campus

Drexel's 60-acre campus is located within walking distance of Center City Philadelphia. The campus includes 25 academic buildings, eight residence halls and four outdoor recreation fields. Ten fraternity and sorority houses, as well as other off-campus housing, are located adjacent to campus in the historic Powelton Village section of University City. An 18-acre outdoor athletic complex, with two lighted artificial turf fields, nine tennis courts and a softball field, is located just west of Powelton Village. On July 1, 2002, Drexel formally acquired the former MCP Hahnemann University, which now includes the Drexel University College of Medicine, College of Nursing and Health Professions and School of Public Health. Drexel's most recent addition to its campus is the College of Law, which opened its doors in the fall of 2006.

Students

More than 12,000 full-time undergraduates roam Drexel's University City campus. The school's student body in its entirety is comprised of nearly 20,000 total students from 49 states and 118 different countries

Faculty

The school also has a highly qualified faculty, and with a 10:1 student to faculty instructional ratio students ensured a quality education. Approximately 94 percent of Drexel's full-time faculty members hold a Ph.D. or the highest degree granted in their field of study. Many of the faculty members of Drexel's engineering school are registered professional engineers. Faculty members are engaged in cutting-edge research in subjects ranging from biomedical technology to business methods and educational outreach. These innovators also take the time to teach undergraduate level courses and serve as advisors.



Technology

A leader in curricular and technological innovation, Drexel became the first university to require all students to have microcomputers in 1983. In 2000, Drexel became the first major university to operate a fully wireless campus. In 2002, the University launched Drexel One Mobile, the first wireless Web portal service for students. Since then Drexel has regularly been recognized as a paragon of technological innovation within the context of higher education.

Several major publications have recognized Drexel as a paragon of technological, scientific and business education.

- · *C/O* magazine presented Drexel with 2006 CIO 100 award for being among the nation's top 100 organizations that have distinguished themselves by creating business value through the effective and innovative use of information technology.
- · LeBow College of Business's undergraduate business program is 58th in Business Week's inaugural rankings of the country's best undergraduate business schools. The College ranks 14th in median salary of graduates, 24th in enrollment, 27th in academic quality, 48th in average SAT score and 15th in cost.
- · The Princeton Review ranked Drexel among America's "Top 25 Most Connected Campuses" in 2006.
- · The Intel Corporation ranked Drexel No. 22 out of 100 in the country on its "Most Unwired College Campuses" survey.
- · In March 2006, the Financial Times ranked the LeBow College of Business's MBA in pharmaceutical management program as one of the top 25 distance learning programs.
- · Entrepreneur Magazine ranked the LeBow College of Business entrepreneurial program among the nation's top 25 in entrepreneurial emphasis.

Academic Programs
The University offers 73 bachelor's programs, 41 master's programs, 31 doctoral programs, a doctor of medicine program, a juris doctorate and 13 graduate-level certificate programs. Drexel's colleges include: The College of Arts and Sciences; LeBow College of Business; Drexel University College of Medicine; Engineering; Information Science and Technology; Media Arts & Design; Nursing and Health Professions; The College of Law and Goodwin College of Professional Studies. The schools are: Biomedical Engineering. Science and Health Systems; Education; and Public Health.



Drexel Co-Op

One of the trademarks of a Drexel education, since its establishment in 1919, has been the school's co-operative education program which gives students a chance to work in the "real world" as part of their college education. The only mandatory co-operative education program in Pennsylvania and one of three in the United States, Drexel's 88-year-old experiential learning program is among the nation's oldest and largest. More than 4,000 Drexel students are placed with 1,500 employer organizations in the business, government, health care industry and education sectors in 27 states and 12 international locations to fulfill their co-op requirements. Drexel's co-op program was ranked among the nation's top 10 experiential-learning programs by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Student Life

More than 160 student clubs, societies, and organizations bring likeminded people together for social, professional, or service activities. Our thriving fraternities and sororities have active schedules and housing in Powelton Village. The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center has a fully equipped wellness center, swimming pool, and basketball and squash courts. Varsity sports teams, intramural sports, and club sports provide a multitude of chances to play or cheer on a team. This summer, Drexel University began construction of a new state-of-the-art student recreation center to be located in front of the Daskalakis Center along Market Street. This glass facility with natural lighting will provide the Drexel campus with a transformational facility to service the health, fitness and recreational interests of students, faculty and staff. The facility will feature 18,000 square feet of fitness and weight equipment and a Wellness Resource Center to educate the campus on lifelong health

and fitness. The facility will also provide a new gymnasium for basketball and net sports, an elevated jogging track, a climbing wall, two squash courts, as well as social space and a juice bar for Drexel persons to interact with and meet new people before and after a workout or on their way to class or the office.

Philadelphia

The city of Philadelphia offers Drexel students plenty of places to learn, play, and experience the arts. Philadelphia encompasses Fairmount Park, the largest urban park system in the country; is home to hundreds of neighborhoods, each with its own distinct personality and attractions. There is something for everyone in "The City of Brotherly Love" from the zoo, to the art museum, majestic boathouse row to the city's passionate sports culture. Drexel students can take advantage of Philadelphia's many attractions through region-specific courses (often including field trips), a comprehensive transportation network, and Drexel's campuses, which are all close to the heart of the city. If you do choose to live on campus, you'll have even more to look forward to with residence hall-sponsored excursions and the daily activities that take you into Philadelphia's neighborhoods and communities.

Moving Ahead

One of the main reasons for Drexel's recent innovation and expansion is President Constantine Papadakis, Ph.D., who has been the president of Drexel University since 1995. Since becoming president, Papadakis has seen undergraduate applications, the endowment and co-op employers triple and full-time undergraduate enrollment, research funding, philanthropy, net assets and number of co-op students double.

Alumni

After modest beginnings in 1891, today's Drexel University boasts more than 90,000 alumni worldwide and is known internationally as one of America's best technical universities. Some of Drexel's best-known alumni include: former NASA astronaut Dr. James Bagain ('73); television producer Chuck Barris ('53), creator of "The Newlywed Game" and "The Gong Show;" Robert J. Hall ('67) former publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Philadelphia Daily News; Hon. Sandra Schultz Newman ('59) Justice of Pennsylvania Supreme Court; Malik Rose ('96) forward for NBA's New York Knicks; N. Joseph Woodland ('47) inventor of the Universal Product Code (UPC) also known as the "bar code" and ESPN sportscaster Chris McKendry ('90).

Drexel and Beyond...

In 2004, 2,095 students earned bachelor's degrees. Of these Drexel graduates, 50 percent found gainful employment within six months of graduation and 86 percent of them obtained employment in their field of study. Eight percent are pursuing graduate or professional school.



ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES AT DREXEL

The ACHIEVE Center

The ACHIEVE Center, which stands for Athletes and Coaches Having an Impact on Education, Volunteerism and Employment, is utilized exclusively by student-athletes for academic coaching, study groups, study skills and NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills seminars, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and career management workshops. The ACHIEVE Center is one of the premier academic study, advising and assistance programs of its kind. Developed by Dr. Rebecca Gigli in 1997, the Center is in place to help studentathletes manage the rigors of their simultaneous roles as students and athletes. Gigli, who has been nationally recognized for her visionary work, staffs the ACHIEVE Center with dedicated advisors and mentors who are committed to helping student-athletes achieve their full academic potential.



The ACHIEVE Center's goals include the following:

- To facilitate a high retention rate
- To provide quality academic and support services to all student-
- To work effectively in developing partnerships with professional staff and faculty
- To serve as liaisons with the academic community and advocates for student-athletes
- To promote Drexel's athletic reputation and public image through involvement within the local community
- To prepare student-athletes to be adaptable in all aspects of their lives through the delivery of "Life Skills Education"
- To achieve continued academic excellence in the conference
- To assist coaches with the recruitment of student-athletes
- To provide experiential learning opportunities for graduate students

Renovations to the ACHIEVE Center were completed in the summer of 2005, allowing the Center to serve more student-athletes and provide a variety of opportunities for academic enhancement. Since its opening, the ACHIEVE Center has been a hub of academic activity at the Daskalakis Athletic Center. The Center is open more than 60 hours each week including evenings and weekends. Student-athletes refer to the center as "The ACHIEVE" and have made it a place where they like to study, utilize computers and interact with the staff about academic questions and concerns. The renovation has made it possible for more private advising and tutoring to take place while maintaining the general use area for computers and study halls. The ACHIEVE Center will continue to be used as a gathering and instructional space for workshops and meetings to promote and encourage life skills, leadership, personal development, career readiness and community outreach. The quality of Drexel's academic services program is punctuated by this renovation and further evidence that at Drexel, the "student" in student-athlete really does
