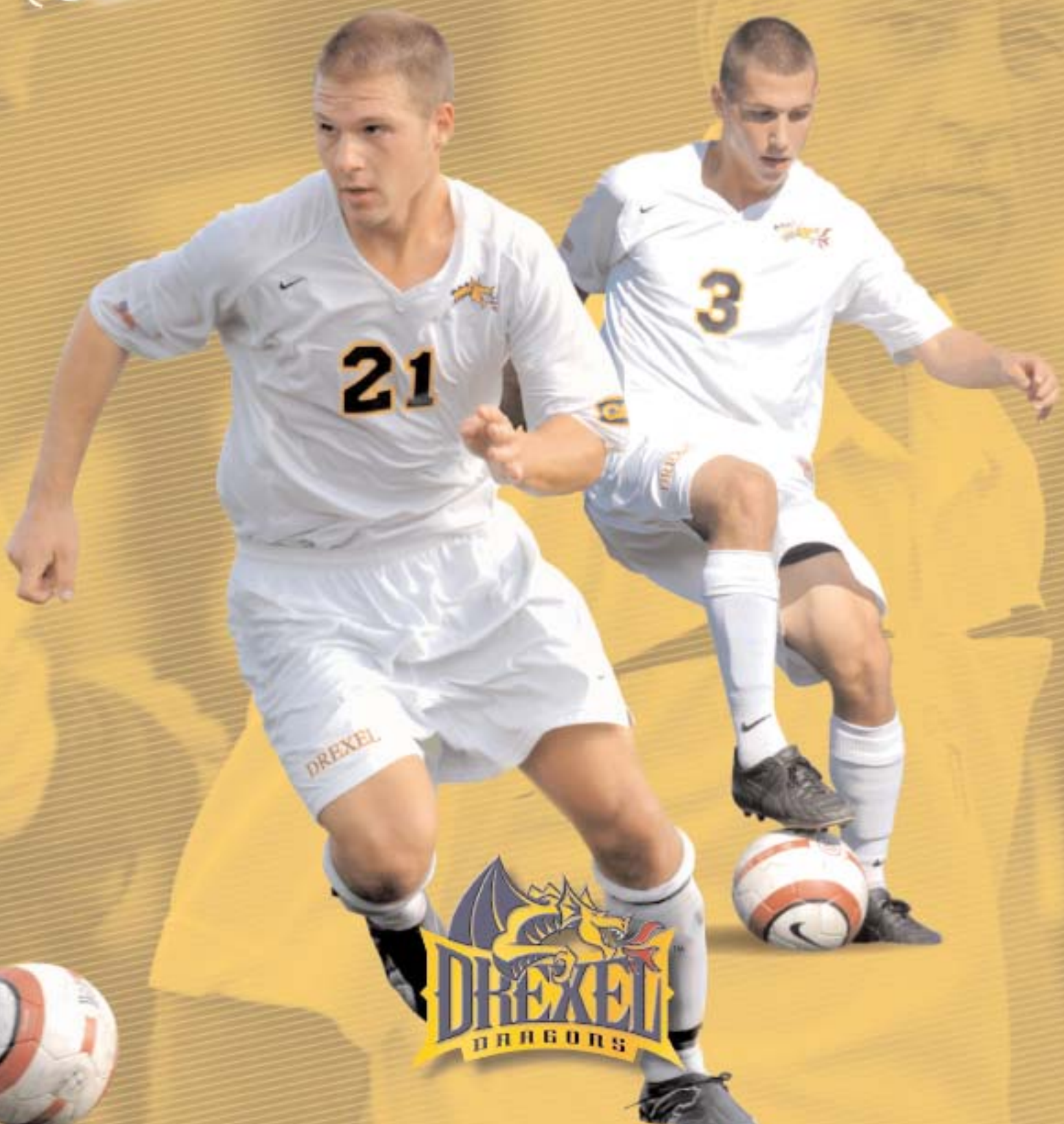

HEAD COACH LEW MEEHL



16th Season | Temple '69

As Lew Meehl enters his 16th season in University City, the man who has been a fixture on the Philadelphia soccer scene for more than 40 years is now establishing a legacy for himself at Drexel. Last season was a signature one for Meehl in University City as he led the Dragons to their best season in nearly two decades, a share of the regular-season conference championship and a top 10 regional ranking. The CAA's Coach of the Year proved once again that the system that has brought him success throughout his 25-plus years on the sidelines is still a championship formula and one that generates excellent student-athletes both on the field and in life after soccer.

In 2007, arguably Meehl's most successful season at Drexel, the savvy coach molded his team into a defensive unit that was nearly impenetrable during the year. The Dragons allowed just 14 goals all season while posting an 11-5-3 record. In 10 of the team's 11 victories, Meehl's squad held its opponent off the scoreboard. Under Meehl's watchful eye, six Drexel players earned All-Conference honors at season's end. The Dragons finished with an 8-2-1 record in Colonial Athletic Association play and entered the CAA Tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time ever. During the season, Meehl coached his team to the program's first victories against William & Mary and James Madison.

While last season was certainly a highlight of Meehl's prestigious coaching career, this sort of performance is one of many exceptional seasons in a coaching system that has generated 225 career victories for Meehl. He is ranked among the top 40 coaches in the NCAA in career victories and he is on an exclusive list of coaches who have amassed 100 or more wins at two different Div. I institutions.

Meehl had an instant impact at Drexel when he arrived in University City in 1993. He led the Dragons back to the North Atlantic Conference Tournament and earned Coach of the Year honors in his first season with the program. In his second season at the helm, Meehl coached the Dragons to a Philadelphia Soccer Seven Championship and was named the league's Coach of the Year. By 1995, his third year at Drexel, Meehl's Dragons were rolling. The squad finished first in the North Atlantic Conference with just one loss during the regular season and Meehl was once again named conference Coach of the Year. In 1998 Meehl completed a trifecta by restoring the Drexel program to regional prominence with an America East Tournament Championship, winning a second Soccer Seven title with the Dragons and taking home his third Soccer Seven Coach of the Year award. Meehl retained the Soccer Seven's coaching honor in 1999, winning it for the eighth time in his career, after taking Drexel to the America East Conference semifinals with a 9-7-2 record.

In his 15 seasons, Meehl has led the Dragons to eight top-five finishes in conference play that has spanned stints in three conferences. He has also produced four Philadelphia Soccer Seven championship teams, including back-to-back titles in 2002 and 2003, and boasts a 122-131-25 overall record at Drexel.

Today, Meehl continues to recruit and develop top-notch student-athletes. He has coached 22 all-conference players, eight all-region selections, two Soccer Seven Rookies of the Year, and one Soccer Seven Player of the Year. Drexel alum Jeff Parke, who completed his four years with the Dragons in 2003, was selected in the Major League Soccer SuperDraft and now plays for the New York franchise.

Last season, six of Meehl's recruits earned All-Conference honors. Junior defender Bryan Ruff became the first Dragon ever to earn a place on the All-CAA First Team. Sophomore Fabio Assumpção was named to the All-CAA Second Team for the second straight year. Anthony Bafile, Pat McCaffery and Cory Robertson all received placement on the All-CAA Third Team while Brazilian rookie Thiago Assumpção was named to the All-Rookie Team.

Prior to his time at Drexel, Meehl established himself as an elite collegiate coach with a highly successful nine-year (1984-92) run at Philadelphia Textile, currently Philadelphia University, where he led the Rams to a 103-52-23 record. This mark still stands as the program's second best coaching record. He also guided the team to success on a national stage and produced four All-Americans. He earned four Soccer Seven Coach-of-the-Year awards in his nine seasons at Textile while leading the Rams to four Soccer Seven titles and three NCAA at-large tournament bids. In 1988, he was selected the Mid-Atlantic Region Coach of the Year after his squad advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. At Textile Meehl coached four All-Americans and three Soccer Seven MVPs. Seven of his players went on to careers in professional soccer including four Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL) draft picks.

Meehl, who began his coaching career as an assistant at Princeton University, is a 1969 graduate of Temple University where he was a three-time All-America midfielder. A 1985 inductee to the Temple Athletic Hall of Fame, Meehl also enjoyed an 11-year professional soccer career highlighted by a 1973 championship season as a member of the North American Soccer League's (NASL) Philadelphia Atoms. A former player-coach for the Philadelphia Fever of the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL), Meehl also competed for numerous teams in the American Soccer League.

A native Philadelphian, Meehl holds a U.S. Soccer Federation (USSF) "A" coaching license and served as a member of the USSF national staff for 22 years. He retired from Bensalem High School where he taught health and physical education for 30 years.

Lew and his wife, Jo-Ann, live in Bensalem, Pa. They have three children - Lewis, Gregory and Kristin - and have five grandchildren, Shane, Brooke, Hayley, Jacob and Morgan.

Woody Hartman 16th Season Temple '75

Woody Hartman returns for his 16th season on the Drexel sidelines. Hartman, who starred as one of the top goalies in Philadelphia's professional soccer history during the late 1970s, has been Head Coach Lew Meehl's top coaching confidant since 1984 when they paced the sidelines at Philadelphia Textile (currently Philadelphia University).

Since then, the duo has combined for 225 career coaching victories at the Div. I level.

The veteran assistant has been a part of the Philadelphia soccer scene for more than 35 years. He attended Frankford High School and made a name for himself in goal as a four-year starting keeper for Temple University. After graduating from Temple in 1975, he moved on to a professional career with the Philadelphia Fever for three years and one season with the New Jersey Americans.

Hartman's acuity for decision making in net translated well into the coaching realm. In his first season as a coach, at Father Judge High, Hartman led the Crusaders to a Philadelphia Catholic League title in 1976. The Hartman-coached squad was the first team other than Cardinal Dougherty and Northeast Catholic to win the prestigious Philadelphia Catholic League championship. He went on to successfully coach four more years at Father Judge. Since then, Hartman's meteoric rise through the coaching ranks has included stints at Philadelphia Textile, the Philadelphia Kixx and Drexel. Hartman currently holds a U.S. Soccer Federation "A" level coaching license.

At Drexel, Hartman plays a vital role in all aspects of the program, including recruiting, game preparation and individual instruction. Hartman draws on his years of experience between the posts to train Drexel's goalies. Four of Drexel's top eight career saves leaders have been guided by Hartman, including America East Conference First-Teamer Mike Haberman and Philadelphia Soccer Seven All-Star Brian Herr. In 2005, Nick Macri, who worked with Hartman as a backup goalie for his first three seasons, ended the season among the top goalies in the nation in saves per game. Last season, one of Hartman's prized pupils, Cory Robertson, led a Drexel defense that allowed the fewest goals in the CAA and ranked nationally for fewest goals allowed. Under Hartman's tutelage, Robertson posted eight shutouts on the season, ranked sixth in the nation in goals against average and 11th in save percentage while helping the Dragons earn a share of the CAA regular-season title for the first time ever.

Hartman resides in Bensalem, Pa. with his wife Kerry and her children Courtney and Brittany. Hartman has two children who have followed in their father's footsteps. Joe played for his dad as a goalie for the Dragons and Kate completed her collegiate career last fall as a four-year goalkeeper on Drexel's women's soccer team.

Volunteer Assistant Coach



Rick Tompkins 16th Season Penn State '75

Rick Tompkins is the third member of Drexel's coaching staff, completing a triumvirate of coaches who have all patrolled the sidelines together for the past 15 seasons. The Penn State graduate joined Meehl and Hartman at Philadelphia Textile in 1992 and has coached with them ever since.

Tompkins' soccer coaching career had its roots at the Shipley School in Bryn Mawr, Pa. where he was head coach of the girls' team and an assistant on the boys' side as well. Tompkins held the post after returning to his native Philadelphia to attend law school following a successful three-year playing career at Penn State.

Since then, Tompkins has been involved in coaching local soccer at all levels. He is a U.S. Soccer Federation A-licensed coach and has been involved as President of the Eastern Pennsylvania Youth Soccer Association and the Inter-County Soccer League. Tompkins serves on the U.S. Youth Soccer Risk Management Committee and has served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Youth Soccer Olympic Development Program.

Throughout his years of coaching Tompkins has been recognized as one of the game's best teachers. In 1993 he received the U.S. Soccer Federation's Bob McNulty Award for coaching excellence and in 2005 he was inducted into the Philadelphia Soccer Hall of Fame.

At Drexel, Tompkins primarily assists with scouting and is also involved in some aspects of game coaching and running practices. Tompkins also spearheads Drexel soccer's youth and community outreach efforts. He has played an integral part in getting several youth soccer programs out to support Drexel soccer.

Tompkins currently resides in Abington Township with his wife Marianne. He has three children, Rachel who is a Penn State alumna, and sons Mark and Paul, who are currently attending Penn State, and one grandchild, Aidric Li. Tompkins is a partner in the Norristown law firm Morrow, Tompkins, Trueblood and Fittipaldi.



2008 SEASON OUTLOOK

Drexel men's soccer took the Colonial Athletic Association by storm in 2008. After being picked to finish second to last in the preseason coaches' poll, the Dragons reeled off six straight victories to open conference play and finished with a 11-5-3 overall record and an 8-2-1 mark, which was good enough for a share of the team's first ever CAA regular-season title. Led by the toughest defense in the conference, which featured All-CAA First-Team defender Bryan Ruff, Third-Team selections Cory Robertson, at keeper, and Pat McCaffery and All-Tournament pick Brandon Fischer on defense, Drexel entered its conference tournament as the No. 1 seed for the first time since 1995. While the season came to an abrupt finish at the hands of Towson in the semifinal match, the Dragons' performance made inroads toward establishing the program as a contender in the highly competitive CAA. The tournament exit also left the team lacking fulfillment at the culmination of an historic season. Ten of the 11 starters on the field that day will be returning this season looking to put that memory behind them and push forward toward another successful season and a shot at redemption in the CAA Tournament.

The Defense

The Dragons return all but one player from the CAA's stingiest defense in 2008. Drexel let up just 14 goals all season, and only five in conference play. Keeper Cory Robertson, who will be a senior this year, posted eight shutouts and led the CAA with five blankings in conference

matches. To the credit of the defense in front of him, Robertson was tested the second fewest times among CAA keepers, but he was equal to the challenge when called upon, ranking 11th in the nation in save percentage and sixth in goals against average. Bryan Ruff, Pat McCaffery and Brandon Fischer return as seniors to protect Drexel's territory in front of Robertson. Ruff and McCaffery were two of Drexel's six All-Conference selections last year. Ruff, who anchored Drexel's central defense along with departed senior Mark Stevenson last year, was also recognized as a First Team All-South Atlantic Region selection at season's end. Ruff combined his athleticism, physical strength and soccer savvy to set the tone for the Dragons in each match last season. McCaffery, who played on the right wing is a heady defender, as well as a skilled distributor and striker of the ball. He has been the team's top-scoring defender in each of the last three seasons and tallied a career-high five points on two goals and an assist last year. The third member of the trio, Fischer, is likely the hardest working player on the pitch but often goes overlooked for his efforts on the left side. But his play at the CAA Tournament certainly raised some eyebrows as he, along with striker Anthony Bafile, were Drexel's representatives on the All-Tournament Team. Also returning for the Dragons' defense are veterans Chris Schieve, and Kyle O'Connor. Both seniors have started during their Drexel careers and either could be called upon as adequate replacements in the back. Sophomores Cory Rohlfesen and Justin Johnson both saw time on defense last season and could work their way onto the field more often this year to give the Dragons additional depth and fresh legs off the bench.

The Midfield

An integral part of Drexel's ability to keep opponents off the scoreboard last season was its possession offense, which started at midfield. Fabio Assumpção followed up a sensational freshman season with an equally stellar sophomore campaign. The Brazilian center midfielder used his exceptional ball-handling skills to confound opponents and initiate many of the Dragons' offensive build-ups. The Second Team All-CAA selection was second on the team in assists and ranked in the CAA's top 10 in helpers on the season. Assumpção was also honored as a Third Team All-South-Atlantic Region selection and a Philadelphia Soccer Seven All-Star. Thiago Assumpção joined his brother at midfield last season with excellent results. The rookie made an impact early in his career, setting up Drexel's game-winning goal, along with his brother, in overtime against nationally ranked Lehigh in the Dragons' season opener. Thiago's speed, skill and aggressive maneuvering on attacks helped him earn a place on the CAA's All-Rookie Team. Junior Greg Ermold settled in as a midfield starter last season after joining the team as a walk-on in 2006. Ermold's 6-foot-2 stature, along with his fearless play, made him the team's primary target on headers last year. The lanky junior was likely the most versatile player on the team last year. He displayed the ability to shift back into a defensive position as well as distributing the ball at midfield and pushing

forward on offensive build-ups. Veteran midfielder Cole Feffer made a strong return after an injury-plagued freshman season to make seven starts and play in 14 matches last year. Feffer is a solid player who makes good decisions with the ball and plays the possession game well. Experienced midfielder Todd Wampler and rookie Andrew Stolle combined to give the team strong play off the bench. Both players made the most of their opportunities last season and contributed positively when the call came. Junior Leland Raum was one of the team's pleasant surprises last year. His hard work in practice and the off-season earned him playing time early and his tireless play on the pitch paid immediate dividends for the Dragons. Raum scored the game-winner in overtime in Drexel's season-opening upset of No. 16 Lehigh on the road. He also knocked home the golden goal in the Dragons' double-overtime triumph at UNC Wilmington. Raum's play earned him time in every match and he also started in nine on the season. All-CAA Third Team selection Anthony Bafile is versatile enough to see starts at both midfield and up front for the Dragons. The rising junior led the team with six goals, six assists and 18 points last season. In addition to earning All-Tournament team honors, Bafile was also named a Philadelphia Soccer Seven All-Star. Also in the mix for minutes in the middle this year are sophomores Buzz Conzentino and Justin Johnson and newcomers Ryan Zimmer and Jonathan Volpatti. Conzentino and Johnson played sparingly in their freshman seasons due to the abundance of experienced midfielders on the squad last year. Volpatti and Zimmer, who both committed to Drexel in the off-season, will attempt to break into the experienced lineup with their play in the preseason. Volpatti, a 6-foot-2 midfielder, is the next in a long line of quality Canadian players to attend Drexel. His playing résumé includes stints with some of the top club teams north of the border, including the Erin Mills club from Ontario, Canada that produced standout defender Kwesi Klass, who graduated from Drexel in 2006. Zimmer matriculates from a highly touted Merritt Island, Fla. team that was a perennial state championship contender during his tenure. The 5-foot-11 defensive midfielder led his team to the state semifinals as a junior and senior and was named regional Player of the Year in 2008.

The Forwards

Drexel played some of the most efficient offense among conference teams last year. While the Dragons' attack would certainly not be considered high-scoring, the team played well together and came up with the offense necessary to win 11 matches. Anthony Bafile found his touch as the team's most consistent finisher and set-up man throughout the year. But Drexel's scoring seemed to come from a different source in every match, making the Dragons' one of the toughest teams to match up with in the CAA. Sophomore Nate Baker impressed fans during his rookie campaign, finishing second on the team with three goals and wowing spectators with his powerful shot and the ability to unleash it in a matter of seconds. Transfer Carlos Ruthner proved to be a pleasant surprise early in the conference season. The Burlington County College product scored the game-winner on the road at Virginia Commonwealth and also tallied in Drexel's road win over James Madison during the same week. His performance earned him a spot on *College Soccer News'* National Team of the Week. Drexel will have the services of Mike Crosse available once again this year. Crosse would be entering his senior season were it not for a slate-washing injury two matches into last year. If he returns at full strength, the talented Brit will give the team some height up front. His excellent aerial ability will also help to swing the team's odds on headers at midfield. Sophomores Max Crockett and Dan Vignola could see time up front this season as well. Crockett and Vignola are two six-footers who are still developing in the college game and could emerge as important contributors on offense. In addition, freshman Eric Lynch, who played alongside Eric Zimmer at Merritt Island High will stake his claim for time at striker. Lynch set a single-season school record with 38 tallies as a senior while captaining the team to its second straight appearance in the state semifinals.

The Goalkeepers

Senior keeper Cory Robertson is coming off the best season of his career. The Dragons' veteran net minder allowed just eight goals all season and led the CAA in shutouts and lowest goals against average. Robertson earned a spot on the All-CAA Third Team and finished the season ranked among the nation's best in save percentage and goals against average. When Robertson is at the top of his game behind Drexel's defense, goals are hard to come by for Drexel opponents. Backing up Robertson this year is Alex Reber. The senior has worked hard to become a reliable backup while playing behind good keepers for the past three years.

The Schedule

Drexel will host the Soccer Seven's preseason exhibition games this year on Aug. 23. Opening day for the regular season is set for Aug. 29 against Hartwick at the Black & Decker Classic hosted by Loyola (Md.). Drexel plays on Vidas Field for this first time this season on Sept. 5 against Saint Joseph's. The Dragons host UNC Wilmington on Sept. 27 in the team's CAA opener. Drexel also plays Delaware, Georgia State, Northeastern and fellow 2007 CAA co-champion Old Dominion at home. The Dragons' match against the Monarchs on Nov. 1 is slated for the team's Senior Day celebration before closing out the regular season at William & Mary on Nov. 7 with a CAA Tournament bid in sight.

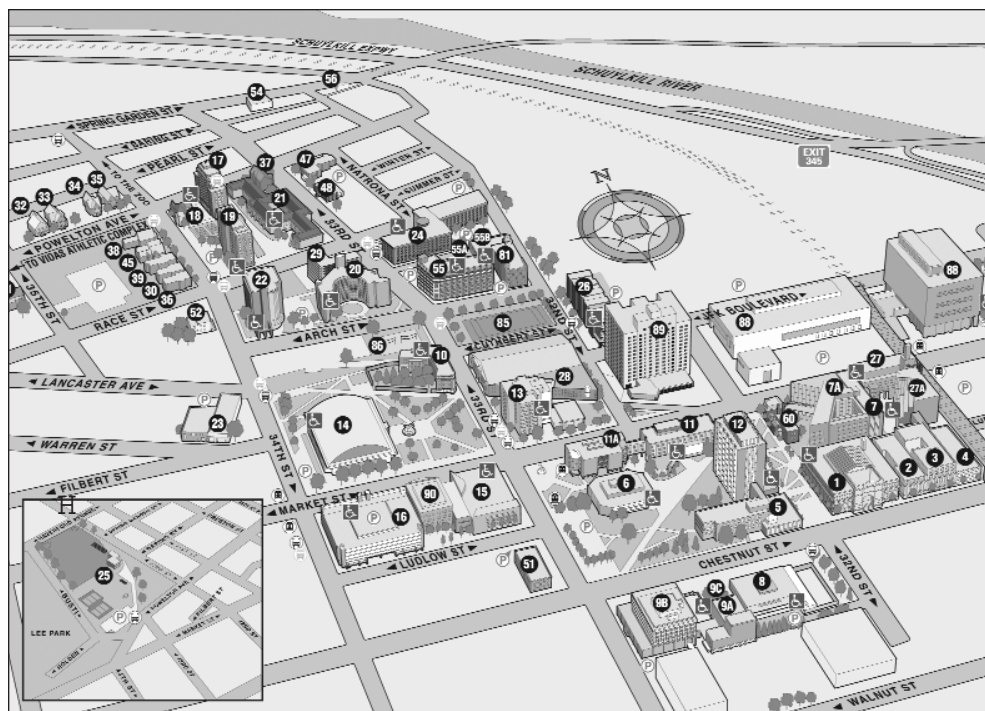

Directions to Vidas Field

From the North 95 South to 676 West. Take 676 West to 76 East. Follow 76 East to the 30th St. Exit. At the top of the ramp go right and at the first light make a right. Go to the next light (Market St.) and make a right. Take this down to 43rd Street. Turn right on 43rd Street and continue until it dead ends into Powelton Avenue. Cross Powelton Avenue and enter the parking lot at 43rd and Powelton.

From the South Take 95 North to 76 West. Take 76 West to Exit 40 (South Street). Make a left at the top of the exit. At the second light (33rd St) make a right. Make a left on Market and take this to 43rd Street. Turn right onto 43rd Street and continue until it dead ends into Powelton Avenue. Cross Powelton Avenue and enter the parking lot at 43rd and Powelton.

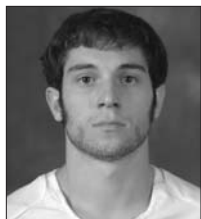

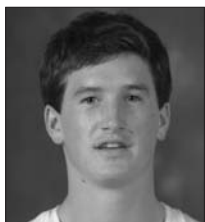

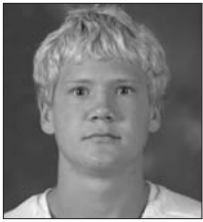

VIDAS ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Renovations to Drexel's athletics fields were completed in 2006. The field complex at 43rd and Powelton Ave. now boasts a synthetic Sprinturf field, and an Astroturf field in addition to resurfaced tennis courts and a newly renovated softball field.

Drexel athletes compete on state-of-the-art fields equipped with exterior lighting. This allows teams to play night games and have morning and evening practices to better accommodate the schedules of student-athletes. Thanks to the efforts of alums Robert Buckley ('58) and Vince Vidas (B.S. '59, M.S. '64), whose fund-raising and support enabled these improvements, Drexel's field complex is now one of the best outdoor collegiate athletics venues in Philadelphia.



Vidas Field

The lower field, which bears the name of Drexel legend Vince Vidas, was converted from a natural grass field in 2005. Vidas Field plays host to all home men's and women's soccer and lacrosse competitions. The field has already played host to the Drexel Invitational Soccer tournament, the 2007 CAA Men's Lacrosse Semifinals, the 2008 CAA Men's Lacrosse Finals and it served as a practice site for the 2006 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Final Four.

Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center

The latest additions to the field house complex are the Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center and the renovation of both the men's lacrosse locker room and coaches' offices. The center allows Drexel's sports medicine staff to provide student-athletes with immediate medical attention and treatment at the athletics field complex.



Kopp Lounge

In addition to the top-of-the-line sports medicine center and locker room facilities, Drexel's field house also houses the Kopp Lounge. The lounge is a unique venue where today's fans gather to support their Drexel teams while paying homage to some of the program's all-time greats. A mural depicting Drexel's history of success in field sports adorns the east wall of the lounge. The east side of the room opens to a patio overlooking Vidas Field. The Kopp Lounge plays host to alumni gatherings, post-game celebrations and fan rallies.

THE DASKALAKIS ATHLETIC CENTER

The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center houses Drexel's intramural and intercollegiate athletic programs. The DAC opened in February of 1975 and covers a three-acre area on the north side of Market Street between 33rd and 34th streets in the University City section of Philadelphia. The facility includes a collegiate-sized, six-lane swimming pool and a separate three-board diving well on the lower level. The Independence Blue Cross Wellness Center houses exercise rooms, Nautilus, free-weight and cardiovascular training areas, a multi-purpose classroom, a dance studio and a conference room on the lower level of the building.



The DAC Sports Medicine Center

The Sports Medicine Department of Drexel University Department of Athletics provides high quality medical care to all student-athletes participating in Drexel Intercollegiate Athletics. Head Athletic Trainer Michael Westerfer is in his fourth full season overseeing Drexel's training staff. Westerfer completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Temple University then earned his master's degree in exercise science from the University of Massachusetts in 1996. Prior to his arrival at Drexel, Westerfer served as the assistant athletic trainer at Temple where he coordinated all phases of health care for five athletic teams. He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and is a Pennsylvania Athletic Training Licensure.

Drexel's Sports Medicine Center at the Daskalakis Athletic Center is staffed by an experienced sports medicine team that provides the student-athletes with a vast amount of medical services, ranging from injury prevention and treatment of athletic injuries to post-surgical rehabilitation. The athletic training staff consists of four full-time certified athletic trainers and a graduate assistant athletic trainer. In addition to the athletic trainers, the sports medicine team consists of two team physicians, an orthopedic surgeon and a primary care physician, and a physical therapist in order to ensure that the student-athletes have the best medical care possible. The team physicians serve in a daily consultant role and are available on-campus to evaluate and treat student athletes in a private examination office in the DAC athletic training room on a weekly basis. The department's physical therapist facilitates the student-athletes' rehabilitation from major injuries and is available on-campus to evaluate and treat student athletes in the DAC Sports Medicine Center. This facility includes dedicated treatment, taping, and hydrotherapy, rehabilitation, office space and doctor's examination room areas equipped with state of the art modalities and equipment.

The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room

The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room, which opened in March 1997, serves as the strength-training epicenter for all Drexel University student-athletes. Director of Strength and Conditioning Michael Rankin oversees a staff of certified strength and conditioning coaches who manage the physical development of all 16 varsity teams. Rankin who holds degrees in kinesiology and education, is in his sixth season at Drexel. He is recognized as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a Certified Personal Trainer through the National Strength and Conditioning Association. In 2007 Rankin was selected as one of two finalists for the NSCA Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year Award.

The Strength and Conditioning Program at Drexel University is dedicated to pursuing excellence. A variety of techniques are incorporated and designed to help our student-athletes improve speed, agility, power, endurance and flexibility. This is achieved through the implementation of current and sound research in the field of strength and conditioning. The program offers student-athletes an environment in which to excel both as individuals and team members. Recent upgrades to the weight room provide student-athletes with a variety of strength training machines and free-weight equipment. The 2,040 square-foot facility also features three lifting platforms for performing explosive Olympic-style lifts and more than 25 work stations for performance training. This environment is



designed to instill leadership, work ethic, discipline, dedication, and determination which will carry over on the field of play.

The ACHIEVE Center

The Drexel ACHIEVE Center is located on the lower level of the Daskalakis Athletic Center. It is the place on campus where student-athletes can utilize computers, academic coaching, study groups, life skills workshops and much more. "The ACHIEVE," as it is known to the student-athletes, is also a place where student-athletes meet for private advising, tutoring and study halls. The staff is devoted to helping Drexel's student-athletes reach their academic potential and excel both in the classroom and on the playing field.

The Drexel Athletic Club

The Drexel Athletic Club is a non-profit organization funded by private donations in support of the Dragons' 16-sport NCAA Div. I athletic program. Contributions greatly assist in enhancing the entire program, and increasing its visibility locally, regionally and nationally. ABOUT DREXEL UNIVERSITY

History

Founded in 1891 by Philadelphia financier and philanthropist Anthony J. Drexel, The Drexel Institute of Art, Science and Industry became Drexel University in 1970. Today, Drexel is Philadelphia's technological university. It continues to move up the rankings as one of the best national doctoral universities.

Campus

Drexel's 60-acre campus is located within walking distance of Center City Philadelphia. The campus includes 25 academic buildings, eight residence halls and four outdoor recreation fields. Ten fraternity and sorority houses, as well as other off-campus housing, are located adjacent to campus in the historic Powelton Village section of University City. An 18-acre outdoor athletic complex, with two lighted artificial turf fields, nine tennis courts and a softball field, is located just west of Powelton Village. On July 1, 2002, Drexel formally acquired the former MCP Hahnemann University, which now includes the Drexel University College of Medicine, College of Nursing and Health Professions and School of Public Health. Drexel's most recent addition to its campus is the Earle Mack School of Law, which opened its doors in the fall of 2006.

Students

More than 12,000 full-time undergraduates roam Drexel's University City campus. The school's student body in its entirety is comprised of more than 20,000 total students from 49 states and 118 different countries.

Faculty

The school also has a highly qualified faculty, and with a 10:1 student to faculty instructional ratio students ensured a quality education. Approximately 95 percent of Drexel's full-time faculty members hold a Ph.D. or the highest degree granted in their field of study. Many of the faculty members of Drexel's engineering school are registered professional engineers. Faculty members are engaged in cutting-edge research in subjects ranging from biomedical technology to business methods and educational outreach. These innovators also take the time to teach undergraduate level courses and serve as advisors.



Technology

A leader in curricular and technological innovation, Drexel became the first university to require all students to have microcomputers in 1983. In 2000, Drexel became the first major university to operate a fully wireless campus. In 2002, the University launched Drexel One Mobile, the first wireless Web portal service for students. Since then Drexel has regularly been recognized as a paragon of technological innovation within the context of higher education.

Several major publications have recognized Drexel as a paragon of technological, scientific and business education.

- *C/O* magazine presented Drexel with 2006 CIO 100 award for being among the nation's top 100 organizations that have distinguished themselves by creating business value through the effective and innovative use of information technology.
- LeBow College of Business's undergraduate business program is 58th in *Business Week's* inaugural rankings of the country's best undergraduate business schools. The College ranks 14th in median salary of graduates, 24th in enrollment, 27th in academic quality, 48th in average SAT score and 15th in cost.
- *The Princeton Review* ranked Drexel among America's "Top 25 Most Connected Campuses" in 2006.
- The Intel Corporation ranked Drexel No. 22 out of 100 in the country on its "Most Unwired College Campuses" survey.
- In March 2006, the *Financial Times* ranked the LeBow College of Business's MBA in pharmaceutical management program as one of the top 25 distance learning programs.
- *Entrepreneur Magazine* ranked the LeBow College of Business entrepreneurial program among the nation's top 25 in entrepreneurial emphasis.

Academic Programs

The University offers 73 bachelor's programs, 78 master's programs, 32 doctoral programs, a doctor of medicine program, a juris doctorate and 13 graduate-level certificate programs. Drexel's colleges include: The College of Arts and Sciences; LeBow College of Business; Drexel University College of Medicine; Engineering; Information Science and Technology; Media Arts & Design; Nursing and Health Professions; The Earle Mack School of Law and Goodwin College of Professional Studies. The schools are: Biomedical Engineering, Science and Health Systems; Education; and Public Health.



and fitness. The facility will also provide a new gymnasium for basketball and net sports, an elevated jogging track, a climbing wall, two squash courts, as well as social space and a juice bar for Drexel persons to interact with and meet new people before and after a workout or on their way to class or the office.

Philadelphia

Philadelphia encompasses Fairmount Park, the largest urban park system in the country; is home to hundreds of neighborhoods, each with its own distinct personality and attractions. Drexel students can take advantage of Philadelphia’s many attractions through region-specific courses (often including field trips), a comprehensive transportation network, and Drexel’s campuses, which are all close to the heart of the city. If you do choose to live on campus, you’ll have even more to look forward to with residence hall-sponsored excursions and the daily activities that take you into Philadelphia’s neighborhoods and communities.

Drexel Co-Op

One of the trademarks of a Drexel education, since its establishment in 1919, has been the school’s co-operative education program which gives students a chance to work in the “real world” as part of their college education. The only mandatory co-operative education program in Pennsylvania and one of three in the United States, Drexel’s 88-year-old experiential learning program is among the nation’s oldest and largest. More than 4,000 Drexel students are placed with 1,500 employer organizations in the business, government, health care industry and education sectors in 27 states and 12 international locations to fulfill their co-op requirements. Drexel’s co-op program was ranked among the nation’s top 10 experiential-learning programs by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Student Life

More than 160 student clubs, societies, and organizations bring like-minded people together for social, professional, or service activities. Our thriving fraternities and sororities have active schedules and housing in Powelton Village. The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center has a fully equipped wellness center, swimming pool, and basketball and squash courts. Varsity sports teams, intramural sports, and club sports provide a multitude of chances to play or cheer on a team. This summer, Drexel University began construction of a new state-of-the-art student recreation center to be located in front of the Daskalakis Center along Market Street. This glass facility with natural lighting will provide the Drexel campus with a transformational facility to service the health, fitness and recreational interests of students, faculty and staff. The facility will feature 18,000 square feet of fitness and weight equipment and a Wellness Resource Center to educate the campus on lifelong health

Moving Ahead

One of the main reasons for Drexel’s recent innovation and expansion is President Constantine Papadakis, Ph.D., who has been the president of Drexel University since 1995. Since becoming president, Papadakis has seen undergraduate applications, the endowment and co-op employers triple and full-time undergraduate enrollment, research funding, philanthropy, net assets and number of co-op students double.

Alumni

After modest beginnings in 1891, today’s Drexel University boasts more than 90,000 alumni worldwide and is known internationally as one of America’s best technical universities. Some of Drexel’s best-known alumni include: former NASA astronaut Dr. James Bagain (’73); television producer Chuck Barris (’53), creator of “The Newlywed Game” and “The Gong Show;” Robert J. Hall (’67) former publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Philadelphia Daily News; Hon. Sandra Schultz Newman (’59) Justice of Pennsylvania Supreme Court; Malik Rose (’96) forward for NBA’s New York Knicks; N. Joseph Woodland (’47) inventor of the Universal Product Code (UPC) also known as the “bar code” and ESPN sportscaster Chris McKendry (’90).

Drexel and Beyond...

In 2004, 2,095 students earned bachelor’s degrees. Of these Drexel graduates, 50 percent found gainful employment within six months of graduation and 86 percent of them obtained employment in their field of study. Eight percent are pursuing graduate or professional school.

The ACHIEVE Center

The ACHIEVE Center, which stands for Athletes and Coaches Having an Impact on Education, Volunteerism and Employment, is utilized exclusively by student-athletes for academic coaching, study groups, study skills and NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills seminars, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and career management workshops. The ACHIEVE Center is one of the premier academic study, advising and assistance programs of its kind. Developed by Dr. Rebecca Gigli in 1997, the Center is in place to help student-athletes manage the rigors of their simultaneous roles as students and athletes. Gigli, who has been nationally recognized for her visionary work, staffs the ACHIEVE Center with dedicated advisors and mentors who are committed to helping student-athletes achieve their full academic potential.



The ACHIEVE Center's goals include the following:

- To facilitate a high retention rate
- To provide quality academic and support services to all student-athletes
- To work effectively in developing partnerships with professional staff and faculty
- To serve as liaisons with the academic community and advocates for student-athletes
- To promote Drexel's athletic reputation and public image through involvement within the local community
- To prepare student-athletes to be adaptable in all aspects of their lives through the delivery of "Life Skills Education"
- To achieve continued academic excellence in the conference
- To assist coaches with the recruitment of student-athletes
- To provide experiential learning opportunities for graduate students

Renovations to the ACHIEVE Center were completed in the summer of 2005, allowing the Center to serve more student-athletes and provide a variety of opportunities for academic enhancement. Since its opening, the ACHIEVE Center has been a hub of academic activity at the Daskalakis Athletic Center. The Center is open more than 60 hours each week including evenings and weekends. Student-athletes refer to the center as "The ACHIEVE" and have made it a place where they like to study, utilize computers and interact with the staff about academic questions and concerns. The renovation has made it possible for more private advising and tutoring to take place while maintaining the general use area for computers and study halls. The ACHIEVE Center will continue to be used as a gathering and instructional space for workshops and meetings to promote and encourage life skills, leadership, personal development, career readiness and community outreach. The quality of Drexel's academic services program is punctuated by this renovation and further evidence that at Drexel, the "student" in student-athlete really does come first.
