CHAIR'S REMARKS

Chairman Hunt made presented a plaque of appreciation to Director Patrick Wright on behalf of the California Bay-Delta Authority. Secretary Chrisman presented Director Wright with a commendation on behalf of U. S. Senator Dianne Feinstein and expressed his own appreciation and that of the Administration for Director Wright's service.

ADOPTION OF THE APRIL 13 AND 14, 2005 MEETING SUMMARY

It was moved and seconded by both BDPAC and the Authority to approve the April 13 and 14, 2005, Meeting Summary.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director Wright made farewell remarks and welcomed Acting Director Joe Grindstaff.

LEAD SCIENTIST REPORT

 Lead Scientist Dr. Johnnie Moore said that 142 proposals were submitted in response to the 2004 CALFED Science Program Proposal Solicitation Package (PSP). The Selection Panel met in early May to make strategic funding recommendations on those proposals, requesting more than \$142 million in funds. The panel selected and streamlined the budgets of 20 proposals that total \$16.6 million in requested funds, and public comments on the selections must be received by 3 p.m. on Friday, June 17, 2005. Dr. Moore said the Selection Panel will re-convene June 28 to consider written comments and, if appropriate, revise funding recommendations to be taken before the Authority in August for its approval.

 Dr. Moore also discussed his vision for CALFED Science in the face of changing circumstances. He said limitations in funding and concerns over long-term funding strategies were driving much discussion, but they also include concerns over Program focus and priorities.

Dr. Moore said his vision is reduced in scope and breadth from what is described in the CALFED Finance Plan. This realignment of the Program would: 1) substantially reduce the commitment to directly invest in the scientific information needs of CALFED via the proposal solicitation process; 2) discontinue Program-specific boards in favor of a single independent science board; 3) increase the science oversight and review functions of the Science Program, without any additional means to effect changes within the 10 CALFED Program elements; and 4) reduce the suite of communication products generated through the Science Program.

He said the revamped program would require the expenditure of approximately \$10 million/year (\$1 million for staff and \$9 million for direct costs). The Science Program can meet this budget target for the next three years without any additional funds. Beyond three years, the Science Program needs continual funding of at least \$10 million/year to support it.

INDEPENDENT SCIENCE BOARD REPORT

Chair of the Independent Science Board (ISB), Dr. Thomas Dunne, discussed a report drafted by the ISB Levees Subcommittee entitled, *Report and Recommendations Regarding Levee Integrity in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta*.

Dr. Dunne noted that the potential for catastrophic failure of levees in the Delta has been apparent for many years but has received renewed attention due the Jones Tract failure of 2004, which resulted in damages estimated at \$90 million, and recent studies pointing to the continuing nature of subsidence in the Delta. Other recent studies estimate costs associated with widespread levee failure under optimal conditions. Lower bound impacts to agricultural users in the San Joaquin Valley range from \$300 to \$500 million, while costs to urban water districts and their customers will range from \$500 million to \$3 billion, depending on the scenario.

He said the recommendations presented by the ISB Subcommittee aim to focus studies concerned with reducing risks to the full range of CALFED interests in the Delta, ensuring that CALFED Program decisions and policies are informed by the most current scientific understanding of the issues involved.

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PROGRAM PRIORITIES AND FINANCING

BDPAC and Authority members discussed the directions contained in the Governor's May budget revision for an independent review of the CALFED Program; a refocusing of the efforts of the Authority and the other CALFED State agencies on solving conflicts associated with Delta water supply, water quality, levee stability, and the environment; and developing a 10-Year Action Plan for the Program to be developed with stakeholders and the Federal agencies.

Director Grindstaff indicated that negotiations were underway to hire a widely recognized contractor to conduct the Independent Review, and that the Governor would likely ask the Little Hoover Commission to review and make recommendations about the CALFED and Authority governance structure.

BDPAC and Authority members also discussed recent cuts in the proposed budgets of the State CALFED agencies, especially DWR and DFG.

Assembly and Authority member Lois Wolk said the reductions were intended to send a message to the agencies and stakeholders about the need to put the CALFED Program on a solid financial foundation and determine priorities. Dennis O'Connor, designee for Senator Michael Machado, noted that the reductions mostly were for programs and projects funded by bonds and that although this might cause delays in Program implementation, the money could be spent in later years.

Several BDPAC and Authority members raised concerns that the budget reductions and the replacement of Director Wright were handled outside the CALFED process. They also discussed the need to develop a vision for the Delta so that scientists, as well as ecosystem and water managers, can ask the right questions and make the right decisions.

Adjournment

Chairman Hunt adjourned the BDPAC and Joint meeting of the Authority and BDPAC at 3:25 p.m.
