


# **Drug Offender Sentencing Alternative**

**Combining Incarceration and Chemical Dependency Treatment** 



### Mission Statement

The mission of the Department of Corrections is to improve public safety.

### What We Do

The Department of Corrections is responsible for administering adult corrections programs operated by the State of Washington. This includes state correctional institutions and programs for offenders supervised in the community.

DOSA is a sentencing alternative designed to provide chemical dependency treatment and supervision for addicted offenders who committed a drug crime or another crime that is related to an addiction. Only offenders without violent or sex offense are eligible.

The goal of DOSA is to reduce or eliminate confinement time for addicted offenders in exchange for full participation and completion of chemical dependency treatment and adherence to strict supervision requirements.

### There are two elements of DOSA:

- 1) Throughout the prison term and community supervision an offender must successfully complete chemical-dependency treatment and comply with all other community supervision and outpatient treatment requirements. If an offender enrolled in DOSA fails to comply with chemical-dependency treatment, the DOSA sentence can be revoked and the original prison sentence can be imposed by DOC.
- 2) Community Residential DOSA provides residential chemical-dependency treatment for a minimum of 90 days to be completed at a DOC-funded community treatment site. This element also requires outpatient treatment to be completed when released from the residential program. If an offender enrolled in DOSA fails to comply with chemical-dependency treatment, his original prison sentence can be reinstated by the court.

### **Residential DOSA Option**

Beginning in October 2005, an enhanced DOSA sentencing alternative became available to the sentencing judges which allowed them to sentence an eligible offender to community based residential treatment. One hundred treatment beds are operational and have admitted a total of 507 community residential DOSA offenders from January 1, 2007 through June 30, 2008. The residential treatment term is three to six months, which is ordered by the sentencing judge.

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### **REVOCATIONS**

Of the 507 Offenders sentenced to Community DOSA between fiscal years 2006 and 2008, the courts have revoked 40, which required the offenders to serve the remainder of the sentence in prison or jail. The top 3 reasons why sentences were revoked were:

### Prison Based DOSA Option -**Treatment**


The Department's policy requires DOSA offenders to receive the highest priority for prison and community based treatment. DOSA offenders continue to receive treatment in the community after they are released from prison.

### Revocations

Of the 9621 offenders who were sentenced to DOSA between fiscal years 1999 and 2008, the Department has revoked 3,632, which required the offenders to serve the remainder of their sentences in prison. 1683 DOSA offenders have been released from prison from January 1, 2008 through June 30, 2008. Of those prison DOSA releases 408 were revoked The top 3 reasons why sentences were revoked were:

- 1) New felony
- 2) Offender is terminated from treatment
- 3) Drug-use violation
