

November 9, 2009 California High-Speed Train Update Board Puts Out a Call to Local Governments and Private Entities In Central Valley for Heavy Maintenance Facility Locations

Sacramento – The California High-Speed Rail Authority Board Thursday approved issuance of a Request for Expressions of Interest (RFEI) to identify locations for maintenance facilities along the planned high-speed train route.

The Authority set a January 15, 2010, deadline for proposals from local governments, public transportation agencies, private companies and others interested in offering proposals for both heavy and other maintenance facilities that could meet the Authority's requirements, minimize environmental impacts and offer the financial incentives and other economic benefits to the State and local communities.

Maintenance centers will be required throughout the state, but a heavy maintenance facility is expected to be situated in the Central Valley because of its central location at the heart of the system.

"The maintenance facilities needed to help operate our planned highspeed rail system will be job creators and economic engines in the communities in which they are built," said Board Chairman Curt Pringle. "We expect that across the state there will be competition for these facilities, and we're saying that that competition has begun – bring us your ideas."

Site requirements for the heavy maintenance depot between Merced and Bakersfield include availability of at least 154 acres located within proximity to the mainline trunk of the system, with connections to highways and utilities.

High-Speed Train Board Approves Cooperative Agreement With Southern California Cities

Sacramento – The California High-Speed Rail Authority approved a memorandum of understanding Thursday with Southern California communities for close cooperation in the development of the state's 200+ mph train.

The agreement approved Thursday is the latest in a series of memoranda of understanding with local government agencies around the state – this one with the Gateway Cities Council of Governments representing cities along the Los Angeles-Anaheim section – providing for cooperation and collaboration in development of the high-speed train through their region.

"We can't build this important project alone – we need partners. This agreement and others we entered into like it are designed to establish a positive and clear working relationship between the Authority and our regional partners," said Board Chairman Curt Pringle.

In other action, the Board set a January 15, 2010 deadline for "requests for expressions of interest" from local governments, public transportation agencies, private companies and others who want to participate in the planning, development and operation of maintenance facilities on the 800-mile network linking the state's major cities.

Maintenance centers will be required throughout the state, but a number of facilities – particularly a heavy maintenance depot – are expected to be situated in the Central Valley because of its central location at the heart of the system.
